Organization of an international union, com-prising the greatest number of countries in-terested, especially maintaining a constant propaganda by means of the press and other wise so as to develop to the maximum the use of good coffee in the whole world. Elimination from the sale or exportation of certain quantity of the universal production, to reduce the supply to such limits of connump-tion, and besides a balance of a certain quan-tity of coffee to be withdrawn from the visible stock of the world.

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
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
