The Chicago produce dealers alone, according to the Modern Grocer have lost \$100,000 by buying up orchards early in the season; orchards which were then very alsing, but in which the peaches went wrong before maturity. The Michigan peaches have never been so poor in quality as this year. One dealer bought up 1500 baskets at 10c a basket, and shipped them to an interfor town for disposal. A few days later he re-ceived a report of sales and a check for \$7.50, with a statement that it was all that could be realized from the shipment.

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
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
