

LANE TO CONTEST

He Will Make Pardee Fight for Office.

CHARGES CROOKED WORK

Democratic Candidate Says He Was Robbed of Votes.

RETURNS SHOW DEFEAT BY 3000

Republican Nominee for Governor Loses San Francisco by 3000, but Sweeps the State—Legislature Won by Good Majority.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from 1505 precincts out of 2277 in California outside of San Francisco give Pardee 58,472, Lane 74,143. The same precincts gave McKinley 96,077, Bryan 29,911.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—"There is no doubt that a majority of the people of California cast their votes for me for Governor," said Franklin K. Lane, to the Associated Press tonight.

"Then what do you think of the situation at this hour," (7:30 o'clock) he was asked.

"The result is undecided. There have been several suspicious facts in connection with the count which lead me to believe that frauds have been committed. I have information that 8000 votes cast for me were thrown out in Alameda County; 20 per cent of the Democratic vote in San Bernardino was likewise treated, and that the totals in Humboldt and Los Angeles Counties were withheld in order to ascertain what number of ballots in the count would be necessary to overcome the majority that San Francisco gave the head of the Democratic ticket.

"About 1:30 o'clock this morning I heard from Alameda that the officials were withholding all returns until this city's vote was given. I chartered a tugboat and dispatched many union men, headed by Mr. Copeland, of the Typographical Union, to investigate the situation. They started to many of the polling places and found discrepancies between the returns and the actual vote. In numerous booths they were refused access to the returns, one set of officials going so far as to remove the ballots into another room, where they were counted."

"Then it is to be inferred, Mr. Lane, that there will be a contest in the event that the returns show the election of Dr. Pardee?"

"Most assuredly there will be a contest," said Mr. Lane.

PARDEE IN BY 3000 TO 3000.

Republicans Lose Two Members of Congress in Kahn and Long.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from San Francisco and partial returns from all over the state indicate that George C. Pardee, the Republican nominee for Governor, is elected by a majority of 3000 or 2000. The plurality of 5000 given by San Francisco to F. K. Lane, the Democratic nominee, has been almost wiped out by Republican majorities in the interior counties. The Republican vote for Pardee in Southern California is justifying the estimates of the Republican campaign committee, and has undoubtedly elected him.

Complete returns from 1185 precincts out of 2277 in the state outside of San Francisco give Pardee 58,460, Lane 60,637. The complete vote in San Francisco stood: Pardee 24,129, Lane 23,627. The Legislature, which will choose a United States Senator is largely Republican on joint ballot. The Republicans have lost two members of Congress—Kahn in the Fourth and Long in the Fifth. They will be succeeded by Livernash and Wynn, Union Labor-Democratic candidates.

The First and Second districts are still undecided, with a Democratic leaning. The delegates to stand: Republican, four; Union Labor-Democratic, two; doubtful, two. In the First Congressional District, 246 precincts complete out of 550 in the district give Gillette, Rep., 19,551; Ford, Dem., 9789. In the Second District complete returns from 228 out of 420 precincts give Coombs, Rep., 12,890; Bell, Dem., 14,288. The 162 precincts to be heard from gave McKinley 7256, Bryan 6188.

Don't Concede Success of Pardee.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Chairman Caminetti, of the Democratic State Campaign Committee, said tonight: "I do not feel warranted, on the face of the returns in conceding the election of Pardee. I am convinced that over 3000 ballots were excluded by Republican boards of election on account of the cross mark being stamped opposite the words 'No nomination.' The matter will be submitted to our law committee. The Republican State Committee tonight claims Pardee's election by 5000."

ARIZONA.

Election of a Delegate to Congress is Still in Doubt.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 5.—The election of a delegate to Congress from Arizona is still in doubt. Whether Republican or Democratic, the majority will probably be less than 300. The Republicans elect Sheriff, Probate Judge and possibly Recorder and Territory Councilman. Chairman Webb, of the Democratic Central Committee, tonight claims the election of Wilson for Delegate to Congress by 300 majority. Republican Chairman Nichols makes no statement.

INDIANA.

Republicans State Ticket Goes Through by 25,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—Estimated pluralities by counties received at state headquarters today indicate the election of the Republican ticket by 25,000. The Congressional pluralities, estimated, are: Hemingway, Rep., 150; Miers, Dem., 65; Zener, Dem., 300; Griffith, Dem., 240; Overhill, Rep., 250; Watson, Rep., 330; Overstreet, Rep., 300; Cromer, Rep., 420; Charles Landis, Rep., 310; Crumpacker, Rep., 510; Fred Landis, Rep., 500; Robinson, Dem., 300; Brick, Rep., 180. The Republicans in the Legislature will have a plurality of 61 and possibly 62. The

INDIANA.

Fairbanks' Re-election is Sure by a Heavy Majority.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 5.—The delegation in Congress, according to the latest returns, will remain as at present, nine Republicans and four Democrats. In the First District Hemingway will be returned to Congress by 500 plurality. The Republican state committee claims 109 of the 150 members of the Legislature, and says that Senator Fairbanks will be re-elected by the largest majority ever given any Senator since the Civil War. Republicans claim the state by at least 20,000.

IOWA.

Republican Plurality on State Ticket is 70,000.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 5.—Full returns place the Republican plurality on the Republican ticket in Iowa at a little over 70,000. The plurality of P. D. Birdsall, who will succeed Speaker Rowell, in the Third District is 2555, and that of J. Wade, in the Second District, the only Democratic member of Congress elected, is 1169.

KANSAS.

Republicans Win Complete Victory, and Will Elect Senator.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 5.—The Republican victory in Kansas is complete. A good majority of the Legislature, all the state officers, and a large part of the county officers were taken by the Republicans. The vote was close to 50,000. Chairman Bartchfield, of the Republican state committee, says Bailey's plurality for Governor will be close to 35,000. About 12 per cent of the ballots were illegally marked. The 120 pluralities of the members of the Legislature, allowing them to elect a successor to Senator W. A. Harris, Dem. The seven members of the Congressional delegation are Republican.

MARYLAND.

Republicans Carry the State, but Lose Two Members of Congress.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 5.—Complete returns from city and state show that Maryland's representation in the next house will be four Republicans and two Democrats, a gain of two seats for the Republicans. Except in the county districts, the Third and the Fourth, the candidates were elected by comfortable pluralities. Wachter, Rep., in the Third, had 120 plurality, with one precinct in dispute, which, when counted, it is believed, will swell his plurality over Meyer, Dem., to 200. Denny, Dem., in the Fourth, has 26 plurality over Schirm, Rep.

MINNESOTA.

Van Sant's Lead Growing—Democrats Get One Member of Congress.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 5.—With the receipt of nearly complete returns the majority of Governor Van Sant assumes tremendous proportions. It is at least 50,000 and may go as high as 75,000—a record-breaking majority in Minnesota for a gubernatorial candidate. The Governor has a

parently run considerably ahead of the balance of the state ticket, although the entire ticket is elected by about the normal majority. Eight of the nine members of Congress are Republicans, the one Democrat being ex-Governor John Lind, who defeated Loren Fitcher in the Fifth District.

The majorities estimated for the successful Congressional candidates are: First, James A. Tawney, Rep., 300; Second, James J. McClary, Rep., 620; Third, C. R. Davis, Rep., 600; Fourth, P. C. Stevens, Rep., 590; Fifth, John Lind, Dem., 550; Sixth, C. B. Buckman, Rep., 500; Seventh, A. J. Vreeland, Rep., 500; Eighth, J. Adam Bede, Rep., 600; Ninth, Halver Steenerson, Rep., 500.

Dr. Dubers, Dem., still claims a victory in the Sixth District, but figures so far received indicate that Buckman is an overwhelming majority. He is somewhat shaded, the estimate given above. The Republicans made substantial gains in the Legislature.

MISSOURI.

Republicans Elect One Member of Congress in St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 5.—The definite returns from the election in Missouri tend largely to increase the Democratic plurality on the state ticket over the earlier estimates. Secretary of State Cook places the plurality at 40,000. J. M. S. Elbert, ex-chairman of the state committee, at not less than 30,000. Governor Dockery, who is in the city, is satisfied the official figures will place the plurality above 30,000, and in the view of Charles Rowell, of the state committee, concurs. There was a big slump in some of the heavy Democratic counties, the total of which will probably reach 15,000, but this loss was compensated for in the gains made in St. Louis, Kansas City, St. Joseph and some of the close counties in the state. The majority in St. Louis of Representative Bartholdi is the only Republican of 16 elected, is 2023.

UTAH.

Republicans Have Legislature, and Smoot is Likely to be Senator.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 5.—Returns received up to 9 P. M. make no change in the former estimates. Howell, Rep., for Congress, and McCarty, Rep., for Supreme Court Justice, are elected by majorities of at least 400. The Republicans will have a majority on joint ballot in the Legislature of at least 20. The Salt Lake Telegram today prints an interview with Apostle Reed Smoot, of the Mormon Church, whose election to the United States Senate, to succeed Senator Rawlins, seems assured. "While the returns are not complete," said Mr. Smoot, "there appears to be no doubt of the election of men who will sustain my candidacy."

TENNESSEE.

Democrats Elect Governor and Will

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 5.—Tonight Chairman Thompson, of the State Democratic Committee, gave a statement in which he estimates the majority of James B. Frazier, Dem., candidate for Governor, at 50,000 votes, with a probability of its reaching 52,000. The Congressional race in the Eighth District has been a close one, but returns leave no doubt of the re-election of T. W. Sims, Dem., over Davis, the Republican candidate. The anti-slavery league has cut quite a figure in the legislative election, the lower house being overwhelmingly its way, while from 20 to 22 of the Senate's 33 members are claimed to be in sympathy. Both houses of the Legislature are largely Democratic.
