Saturday's sharp drop in prices had the result of spreading a wave of doubt all over the country, so that the advances brought into country, so that the advances brought into opmmission-houses a large accumulation of ceiling orders to be thrown upon the market. Many commission-houses also had sent out notices to customers that they must widen their margins or sell their holdings. The bears were also active in raiding the

The bears were also active in raiding the market to uncover orders. The dissemination of a rumor of J. P. Morgan's illness was traceable to the bear element, and was promptly denied and followed later by Morgan's appearance at his office.

The troubles of one of the newer trust compadies over its holdings of securities of one of the newer trust compadies over its holdings of securities of one of the newly formed combines were ventilated on Saturday, and seemed to be taken quite seriously as an object lesson, although not regarded as important in themselves. The fact that it was found necessary in effect to underwrite an underwriting syndicate was regarded as a rather typical example. Apple and Pear Crops Also Above the Ten-Year Average.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 .- The prelimiwashington, Nov. M.—Ine preimi-nary estimate of the average crop yield per acre of corn, as published in the monthly report of the Statistician of the Department of Agriculture, is 28.8 bush-els, as compared with an average yield of 16.7 bushels in 1901, 25.3 bushels in 1900 and 1896, and a 10-year average of 23.4 bushels. The largest percentage was that of Missouri, 39. The highest 10-year average is that of Iowa, 26. The general average as to quality is 80.7, as compared with 73.7 per cent last year, 85.5 per cent in 1900 and 87.2 per cent in 1899. The preliminary estimate of the average

yield per acre of buckwheat is 18.1 bush-els, against 18.6 bushels in 1991, 15.0 bushels in 1900, and a 10-year average of 17.2 bushels. The general average as to quality is 88.1 per cent, against 93.3 per cent last year, and 90.2 per cent in 1900.

The preliminary estimate of the yield per acre of potatoes is 35.4 bushels, against an average yield per acre of 65.5 bushels in 1901, 80.8 bushels in 1900, and a 10-year average of 75.9 bushels. The average as to quality is 90.4 per cent, as compared with 78.4 per cent in November and 38.1 per cent in November, 1960.

The apple and pear crops are considerably above the 10-year average, and near-ly all the states in which the raising of these fruits is of any importance, and the grape crop is slightly below such aver-
