

SOLONS IN A FIGHT

Germans Use Fists When Called Pigs.

ROW IN AUSTRIAN REICHSRATH

Offending Member Is Smashed and Kicked, and Then Thrown Down a Gangway—Tariff Obstructionists Knocked Out.

VIENNA, Nov. 13.—The sittings today of the lower house of the Austrian Reichsrath were suspended on account of the German and Czech members coming to blows. The cause of the trouble was a debate on the advisability of the use of the two languages in the names of stations on the Bohemian Railroads. Herr Schmitt started the disorder by shouting: "You Germans are a lot of pigs."

Thereupon a number of German Deputies cast themselves upon Herr Schmitt, shouting: "Smash him!" "Kick him!" which they proceeded to do. Eventually Herr Schmitt was thrown down the gangway to the bottom of the amphitheater. The fighting continued for a quarter of an hour after the suspension of the sittings. Throughout the disorder the combatants were encouraged by hearty plaudits from the strangers' gallery.

The proceedings, however, demonstrated that the House rules can and will be changed so that the tariff obstructionists will no longer be able to prevent the dispatch of business. By a succession of roll calls, in which the majority commanded over 200 votes out of an attendance of less than 200, the Reichsrath determined to set aside the order of business and take up a motion to change the rules.

MAY GIVE THRONE TO NEPHEW.

Abdication of Archduke Ferdinand, of Austria Is Probable.

DRESDEN, Saxony, Nov. 13.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—A letter received here from Vienna gives some interesting gossip about the Austrian succession. In spite of the official denial, it is not probable that there is some truth in the story recently published by the Neue Budapest Abendblatt of the alleged intention of the abdication of the Emperor, which is controlled by Herr Richter's friends, the Socialist position being that the Berlin Councilmen lacked the courage to resist Emperor William's interference in city affairs. Herr Heine, Reichstag, today delayed the vote by speaking three and a half hours.

The session of the Reichstag lasted until 2:45 P. M., and was of unprecedented length.

"Third-Rail Eye."

Boston Transcript. It is more than a year since the elevated railroad first began to serve the public as a medium of rapid transit from the outlying districts into the heart of the city, yet the familiar term of "third-rail eye" is applied to a great many cases which are brought daily to the attention of the physicians at the various hospitals of the city where out-patient departments are maintained. A great many of the afflicted persons suffer almost unbearable pain, as the small particles of steel are imbedded in the delicate organs. Services of expert physicians are then required to remove the minute pieces of foreign matter, which in many instances are difficult to locate. There is some reason to believe that the burning of soft coal on such a large scale as at present is responsible for a number of the eye cases, but as yet the hospital employees have not substituted the term "soft coal eye" for that of "third-rail eye."
