

PLEA FOR RESERVE

Baker City Man Will Meet Hitchcock Today.

THE PRESIDENT CONSULTED

Colonel Emmett Callahan Will Show Why He Thinks Blue Mountain Forests Should Be Set Aside.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 13.—Colonel Emmett Callahan of Baker City has arranged for an interview with Secretary Hitchcock tomorrow, when he will lay before the department a compilation of facts showing the necessity of creating a forest reserve in the Blue and Strawberry Mountains in Eastern Oregon. At the same time he will produce maps showing areas of land included in the recent withdrawal, which should not be embodied in a reserve, because they are covered by homestead or other entries.

Colonel Callahan, who raised a company of Rough Riders in Montana, and subsequently served under Colonel Roosevelt in Cuba, called on the President in New York the first of the week and discussed the Blue Mountain project with him at some length. He was surprised to find the President so familiar with conditions in Eastern Oregon, so much so that he asked if he had ever been in the state.

"No," said the President, "I know the mountain country and its people." When Callahan explained to the President the opposition that has developed to the Blue Mountain reserve, from purely selfish motives, the President said:

"It is not the intention of this Administration to injure vested rights of any part of the country, but the public interests must be protected."

The President heartily approves of the forest reserve establishment, although he will take no hand in defining its limitations. Under the law the President has no interest in no way be made subservient to the wishes of a few private interests. The department is seeking full information as to what lands within the withdrawal should be excluded from the reserve, and when this is heard a Presidential proclamation will be issued.

INSTITUTE AT DALLAS.

Much Interest Taken in the Work by the Teachers.

DALLAS, Or., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—The Polk County teachers' annual institute is in session in the Courthouse at Dallas this morning through three days. Yesterday morning the meeting was called to order by Superintendent C. L. Starr, who made several announcements of interest to the teachers. One hundred and twenty-nine teachers registered at the opening hour, which itself shows that great interest is being taken in the meeting. The instructors and lecturers are as follows: J. H. Ackerman, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; S. V. Gillan, of Milwaukie, Wis., editor of the Western Teacher and an educator of national reputation; E. D. Resler, president of the Oregon State Normal School, at Monmouth; D. M. Metzger, of the Clark College, and T. J. Newell, principal of the Independence High School. Superintendent Ackerman led the work of the institute. Mr. Ackerman's lecture last night was attended by a large audience of teachers and townspeople.

Great interest is being taken in the institute by the teachers, and Superintendent Starr is to be congratulated on the successful termination of his efforts.

POLK COUNTY SCHOOLS ADJOURN.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—The independence and other public schools in the county have adjourned, to enable the teachers to attend the annual teachers' convention, now in session in Dallas.

ACTIVITY IN LUMBER.

Grant's Pass Mills Working Day and Night to Supply Orders.

GRANT'S PASS, Or., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—The factory and mills of the Sugar Pine Door & Lumber Company, of this city, are operated day and night with large crews of men and are employed in their endeavor to supply the enormous demand for lumber that is now being made upon the factory. Over 50 residences and buildings are being erected in Grant's Pass, making the home demand for building material of such extent as to tax the capacity of the mills. The hauling in of lumber from the surrounding mills has been brought to a check, owing to the heavy rains and bad roads, but not until some 5,000,000 or 6,000,000 feet of lumber had been stacked in the general yards of the factories in this city, the greatest pile of lumber the factories have ever before accumulated; but every foot of it will have to be used this winter for lumber, building and box material. At night the box department of the factory is operated, filling orders for California orange boxes.

CHEHALIS COUNTY FRUIT.

Inspector Wade Well Pleased With This Year's Crop.

ELMA, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—E. L. Wade, County Fruit Inspector, makes a most cheerful report concerning the fruit crop in Chehalis County. This year's yield is 75 per cent larger than last year, and is 15 to 25 per cent larger than the average annual production. The apple easily takes the lead in the fruit crop, both in the amount raised and the demand for them. Prunes and plums are

next in importance to the apple. The production of these fruits this year was enormous, but not more than one-fourth of the amount raised was put upon the market, for the reason that they could not be dried. Pears have yielded a good crop this year, and the demand in the market for them has been good, as well as the price paid for them. The Bartlett is the favorite. Cherries are rapidly becoming an important fruit here. The quince has not yet passed beyond the experimental stage. A few small fruitgrowers are sure that the experiment will be a success. It is thought that the excessive moisture and porous soil is not conducive to its growth. Mr. Wade says there are fully 2000 small orchards in the county. There are no large growers. In his opinion Western Washington will in time be a formidable rival to California in its fruits except grapes, peaches and, of course, citrus fruits.

LAND TANGLE AT AN END.

South Oregon City People Breathe Easier by Reason of New Deal.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Over 100 people breathe easier because of the purchase of a 200-acre tract, known as South Oregon City, by County Judge Thomas F. Ryan and Resident Director Norman R. Lang, of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company, and the subsequent resale of over \$5000 worth of property, which had been tumbled into lots and sold. The land was formerly owned by Captain J. T. Apperson, and in 1893 was sold to a syndicate of seven men. T. L. Charman was made trustee. The property was one of the best farms in Clackamas County, and at one time the late W. S. Ladd offered \$30,000 for it. The hard times of 1893 struck the syndicate, and it was forced to pay a high rate of interest to save the property, on which it had paid a large sum and had given Captain Apperson a mortgage for the remainder. Last year the release of the lots and land had been asked for, and this precipitated a suit for foreclosure. When the land was finally foreclosed it brought enough at Sheriff's sale to satisfy Captain Apperson's claim of over \$10,000 and something more besides. The title of the land has been made good to the purchasers, and now the trustee's deeds are valid.

Oregon City Court Notes.

Judge McBride has handed down the following decisions in the Circuit Court: Henry Johnson vs. Mary Johnson, dismissed; Mary E. Gray vs. William E. Lyons, divorce, decreed for plaintiff, with \$500 alimony; Ida M. McClellan vs. P. E. McClellan, decree of divorce and custody of children awarded to defendant; Mary F. Hicklin vs. Stephen K. Hicklin, decree of divorce and plaintiff allowed to resume her maiden name of Mary F. Miles.

An information has been filed by the District Attorney against Lester Lewis, who is charged with having been made drunk at Wilsonville. He will be arraigned tomorrow in the Circuit Court. The culprit is only 17 years of age. He was suspected of having robbed the Tualatin Postoffice last night, but Postoffice Inspector Thomas J. Flavin, who came up from Portland today to see the boy, found no ground for action against him.

RECEPTION TO CHAFFEE.

Business Men of San Francisco Greet the Returned General.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Representatives of the seven great commercial organizations of San Francisco met Major General Chaffee at a reception tendered the military commander in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, this afternoon. George A. Newhall, president of the Chamber of Commerce, with General Chaffee, occupied seats on the platform of the assembly-room. On the floor were several hundred of the best-known men of the city, members of the Board of Trade, the Merchants' Association, the Chamber of Commerce, the Manufacturers' and Producers' Association, the Mining Exchange and the State Board of Agriculture. The general was greeted by prominent business men, and General Chaffee, in a short speech, expressed his pleasure at having been able personally to meet so many of the business men of the city. General Chaffee said that his party was for Chicago tonight in the private car of Vice-President McCullough, of the Chicago & Northwestern road.

NORTHWEST DEAD.

Fred Fitz, of Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Fred Fitz was found dead in his bed at his home near S. 12 miles north of Vancouver, this morning. Fitz had not been well for some time, but not serious, and when he retired last night nothing unusual troubled him. He was 62 years of age, and had a family of five children. The finding of Fitz gave rise to a report early this morning that the body of Fuller, the missing Portland man, had been found, but later news proved the report untrue.

James Wheeler, of Polk County.

INDEPENDENCE, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—James Wheeler, a man well up in the 90s, died at his home at Suver, Polk County, this week as a result of a fall he recently received at Corvallis. He walked from a second floor, falling to the ground. He left several children.

H. A. South, of Prosser.

PROSSER, Wash., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—H. A. South, who died here November 1, 1902, was a pioneer of Eastern Washington, and is prominently mentioned in Hawthorne's history of Washington.

Vancouver Barracks Notes.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Second Lieutenant Walter V. Cotchett is now at Vancouver Barracks, awaiting his examination for promotion to the rank of First Lieutenant. Lieutenant Cotchett belongs to the Ninety-fourth Company of Coast Artillery, stationed at Fort Flagler, where he is Commissary, Quartermaster, Ordnance Officer and post treasurer. Lieutenant Leonard J. Mygatt, one of the survivors of the Bremer massacre, has just left for New York, where he will remain for two months, the time granted him for a sick leave.

John S. Simons, of the Hospital Corps at Vancouver Barracks, has been ordered to report to the surgeon on board the transport Warren, now at Seattle, to relieve Joseph H. Taylor, who will then report for duty with the hospital at Vancouver Barracks.

STOP SPOKANE GAMBLING

POLICE RAID FOUR HOUSES, AND LEAVE THREE RUNNING.

Prominent Politician Swears Out Warrant—Much Bitter Feeling Exists, and Trouble Expected.

SPOKANE, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—For the first time in 12 years, an attempt to stop gambling was made in Spokane today, and, as a result, four of the big houses are dark tonight, while three others are permitted to run. Sheriff Doust and his deputies swooped down on the Owl, the Cour d'Alene, the O-K and the Combination tonight, but only found a few gamblers in one place and a little paraphernalia. The contemplated raid had been thoroughly tipped in advance, and the gambling halls were deserted, with the exception of one or two men. The Sheriff went about his work quietly, and had no difficulty anywhere.

Charles E. Burnham, ex-secretary of the Populist central committee, and a recent candidate for the Legislature, swore to the complaint, but it is generally believed that Gust Pearson, proprietor of the Stockholm saloon, gambling-house, concert hall and rendezvous, is at the bottom of the movement. Pearson has declared that if he was not allowed to run a dance-hall, he would close gambling, and the close relation existing between Burnham and Pearson indicates that Burnham is being used as a cat's paw to gratify Pearson's spite.

CRACK ATHLETE RETURNS TO PACIFIC UNIVERSITY

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Forest Grove, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Harold B. Mills, 1902, for four years star quarterback and halfback on the "Varsity" eleven, who graduated last Spring, has returned to take post-graduate work this year. He will resume his place at halfback on the football team during the remainder of the season. For four years Mills was the champion all-round athlete of the institution, winning the Swock track cup three times, thus securing permanent possession of it. Some of his records are: 100 yards, 10.3; pole vault, 10 feet 6 inches; long hurdles, 23.3-5. He entered "Varsity" basketball as a second-year man six years ago, and has always taken great interest in athletics. He was president of his class in the senior year, and is a loyal member of Gamma Sigma Literary Society. He is coaching the Forest Grove basketball eleven this year. Coach McFadden says: "He is one of the greatest players that I ever saw, and I place him second to none on the Coast in handling punts and running down the field, as well as being the surest tackler in the Northwest. His speed, coupled with an unusually good eye, makes him a strong offensive player. Although of rather slight build, he never hesitates to buck the heaviest line, and can always be counted on for a good gain. His system of place-kicking is peculiar to himself, and in accuracy he is ahead of Tranger, the famous kicker of Stanford. 'Shorty' would be a credit to any team in the Northwest."



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WANT HEARING IN ALBANY.

Linn County People Interested in Timber Investigation.

ALBANY, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Albany people are holding a meeting in Lake and Klamath Counties, have inaugurated a movement to have the investigating committee, which will be appointed by Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock, hold their sessions for the taking of evidence in Albany, instead of at Lakeview, where the Land Office for the district in question is located. There are about 100 people in Albany who have during the past year taken the land in the Lakeview district, under the law for timber land entries, and have moved up on the same. These men maintain that it would be an injustice for the investigating committee to take evidence in Lakeview, where the Albany people at Lakeview, thus necessitating a long trip overland, entailing expenses which many of them are not in a position to meet. At a meeting of a number of interested people today it was decided to ask the Oregon delegation in Congress to exert every effort to have evidence taken in Albany for the people residing here.

WILL VISIT PORTLAND.

Commissioner Sargent on a Tour of Inspection.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Frank P. Sargent, General Commissioner of Immigration, arrived from Washington, D. C., last evening, and registered at the Palace. He is visiting the Coast on a tour of inspection, and after spending a few days in this city will proceed to Portland, Or. On his return trip to Washington he will visit Los Angeles, Tucson and El Paso. When interviewed last evening regarding his mission here, he said: "I desire to meet the Coast officials of the Immigration Department and also the representatives of the several steamship companies. I think that by meeting them and discussing matters with them we will be able to greatly improve the efficiency of the department. 'What do you think of the exclusion bill recently passed by Congress?' was asked. "I think that it is a very good bill," he replied. "If all Americans observe the law we will have little difficulty in keeping out the Chinese."

COLEMAN IS FREE.

Kidnaping Case Is Dropped, and Mother Secures Child.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 13.—Captain Coleman of San Francisco, who kidnaped his daughter, Katharine, from San Francisco, where the daughter was awarded to his divorced wife by the California courts, is again a free man. He was arrested here on a warrant from San Francisco, and extradition proceedings were begun. On the arrival of the mother, Mrs. E. C. Smith, an arrangement was made whereby the prosecution was to be dropped if Coleman would return the child to the mother. He agreed, but Judge Wilkema, before whom the case was tried, held Coleman pending an examination into the matter. This afternoon he allowed the settlement to be made, and Mrs. Coleman will return to San Francisco tonight with the child.

TWO MUCH SIGHT HUNTING.

Game Law Violators Do Damage in Linn County.

ALBANY, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—Complaints have reached Deputy Game Warden John Catlin, in this city, that the law prohibiting night hunting is being totally disregarded and violated in the swamps and along the sloughs of Linn County. Some valuable stock has been killed by these night hunters, and today Pat Riley reported the loss of a valuable

horse on his farm near Albany. Teams along the road have been frightened, and in some instances people slightly injured by stray shot. A strict watch will be kept along the marshes of Linn County, and some prosecutions may be looked for.

CANNOT LAND SERVANT.

Lieutenant-Governor Wright Must Leave Chinese Behind. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Luise E. Wright, Lieutenant-Governor of the Philippines, left for the East tonight without a Chinese servant. Lieutenant-Governor Wright applied today to United States Customs Collector Stratton for permission to take his Chinese servant ashore with him while he remains in this country, under the understanding that the servant would be taken back to Manila with the official. Collector Stratton denied the request, it being, in his opinion, a plain violation of the terms of the exclusion act. An appeal was made by Mr. Wright to the Secretary of the Treasury.

CITY HAS BEEN BUNCOED.

Some One to Blame for Failure of Walla Walla Water System.

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 13.—The executive committee of the Taxpayers' League has just instituted an investigation into the city water development at Thomas Springs, and unofficially reported that the work at the springs was ill-advised and there had been a failure to secure the water represented to the Council.

TROUBLE OVER BOYCOTT

DEMONSTRATIONS BEFORE AN ABERDEEN CLOTHING STORE.

Proprietor Does Not Observe Early Closing, and Clerks' Union Plans to Close the Building.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 13.—(Special.)—The Clerks' Union, of this city, succeeded in a week's work in securing the enforcement of a 6 o'clock closing movement, despite the protest of a certain number of business men. A petition was circulated today for a renewal of the 6 o'clock closing hour, and it was fairly well signed. Tonight, however, the boycott of a store was brought to a focus because the proprietor kept open after 6 o'clock. A large banner was prepared, it is said, by the union men, with the words: "Organized labor ask their friends not to patronize stores that keep open after 6 o'clock and on Sundays." The store was closed in front of Fogel & Cross' clothing store, which had been kept open. The crowd gathered, and all evening there were demonstrations, Fogel, one of the firm's hangers-up, the crowd was obliged to force an opening several times, and union men and others took a hand in making speeches, the police between speeches forcing a way through the people. Fogel refused to close, and at a late hour tonight the crowd was still making a demonstration. The street was filled for blocks with excited people.

SALEM CITY CAMPAIGN.

Strong Desire to Eliminate Politics from Local Issues.

SALEM, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—The municipal campaign in Salem opened this morning, when the Salem Statesman came out with the following strong editorial, telling the Republicans of the city upon what kind of a programme they must win, if they win at all. It is conceded that the "Citizens' administration" of the last four years has been an economical one, and the question up to the Republicans is whether they can put up a ticket and platform that will satisfy the members of the party that they mean to conduct affairs as economically in the next four years.

The Statesman is a Republican newspaper, and it expects to remain in the Republican ranks. We believe in the fundamental principles of the Republican party, but in city affairs, unless the leaders of the party have an active interest, and unless they enunciate principles and policies that stand for something more than the mere desire of a few men to secure control of the paying offices of the municipality, we believe it will be useless for them to oppose themselves to the citizens' movement, elected to economy in city affairs, and standing upon a record of economy. There is no use to disguise the fact that at least in this respect the men now in charge of the city's affairs have done well. If the leaders of the Republican party in Salem decide upon a campaign, let them make it upon a platform which says and means something definite and positive in the way of reform, and put up men as candidates who will carry out the programme. It is well to plan, and to make an indictment charging him with perjury. The trial was set for November 24.

FREEHOLD, N. J., Nov. 13.—Dr. C. C. Hendricks, proprietor of a sanitarium at Bayonne, where Laura Bigger stayed for a time after the death of the late Henry H.
