J. B. ZEIGLER EXPLAINS HIS POSITION.

"I did not ask for the rebate of \$1.50 on my occupation tax for the sake of the money," declares J. B. Zeigler, who runs a grocery and drug store at Sixteenth and Jefferson streets. "I merely wished to be taxed in the same class with those who do something like the same amount of business that I do, and not with those who do 10 or 12 times as much. The statement published concerning my petition to the City Auditor entirely misconstrued my motive. I pay \$1 per quarter occupation tax, and I know that others who do much more business than myself pay only 50 cents. Some of my neighbors who do nearly 20 times as much business as I pay \$1.25. I am in favor of a high occupation tax, and refused to sign a petition some time ago asking that no such tax be levied. One of my neighbors runs two delivery wagons, and has two clerks, yet he pays only \$1.25. I have no clerk, and drive my own delivery wagon, and pay \$1. I stand it up that his interpretation was very easy on the big business houses and that to right themselves they had to charge the small fry way out of proportion."

DEPUTY SHERIFFS RAID CHINESE.

Two deputy sheriffs, Schneider and Adkins, suddenly swooped down on a badly-scrubbed crowd of Chinamen engaged in playing a game resembling fan-tan, on Second street, near Oak, Wednesday night, and although the Chinamen were taken away, no prisoners were made. Extraordinary precautions were taken to keep the raid secret, which are best known to those who made it. Some surprise is expressed because the Chinamen were not arrested any of the Chinamen, but it is understood that the latter are heavier and stronger than the average heathen, and that their muscles have been hardened by working in lumber camps, etc., all season. Sheriff Scott telephoned to Justice of the Peace Reid, yesterday, telling him the facts connected with the case, and the conclusion was reached that not enough evidence has been secured to warrant a conviction. The police treat the efforts of the deputy sheriffs to suppress gambling with derision.

How They Do It in Philadelphia.

"They don't do that way where I come from," remarked a man yesterday as he watched the cable and donkey engine tearing out the side of the Trinity Church, "Where's that? Philadelphia, I suppose. There's been in that business for 14 years. There they can't waste lumber like that, and every piece is piled loose with picks and bars. A good gang of men would tear down a building like that church just as fast as the steam engine does it, too. This seems to be the spirit of the West, though, to take hold of a big thing and try to do it all in a hurry. The kind of kind should be reminded of the Missouri man's saying of 'Don't bite off more than you can chew.'"

M., at the First Baptist Church, Third and Taylor streets. Rev. E. L. House, D. D., of the First Congregational Church, will address the meeting on the theme, "Standing Against the Dark." Dr. House has addressed large conventions in Eastern cities. The other speakers will be: Rev. Dr. Edgar P. Hill, of the First Presbyterian Church, and H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. All are earnestly requested to be present.

BROKEN-DOWN CAR BLOCKS STREET.

Car 27 of the Sixteenth-street line broke an axle at the crossing of Fifth and Washington streets last night, at a late hour, and for over an hour the entire system was blocked. At first both the Washington and Fifth-street lines were tied up, but the superintendent soon arrived on the scene and had the damaged car moved from the crossing, so that the Fifth-street cars could carry home the rapidly increasing crowd of people who wanted to get to supper. At 7 o'clock the car was taken to the truck and taken to the barn to be repaired.

REWARD FOR ARREST OF "GAMES HOGS."

Game Warden Quimby has offered \$50 reward to any one who will give him information leading to the arrest and conviction of hunters who violate the game law in killing more than 10 ducks apiece in one day. Mr. Quimby is in earnest about bringing to account those who have been slaughtering ducks for the mere sake of killing. He believes by offering the reward and keeping in the field special deputies he will be able to lay hands on some of the guilty parties.

ARRESTED FOR HALLOWEEN PRANKS.

One of their Halloween pranks led to the arrest yesterday of three East Side boys, Frank Thompson, Albert Richardson and Carl Turner. The latter was arrested by Policeman Reising, and the other two boys by Policeman Burke. It is charged that the boys broke into L. H. Libby's toolhouse, Halloween night, and took a quantity of tools, and then returned all released on their own recognizance, to appear in the Municipal Court.

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FOOTBALL TOMORROW.

DOOM PROMISED FOR CARP.—Duck-hunters are mostly all-round sportsmen, and as much interested in fishing as shooting, and they all have a grudge against the carp, which destroys the water and all vegetation on which ducks feed, and have obliged them to spend many thousands of dollars for what to feed the ducks with. The sportsmen are now rejoicing because the black bass has secured a "foot-hold" in the Columbia and Willamette, and say this voracious game fish will soon thin out the carp. There are some so sanguine as to believe that carp may be made so scarce by the bass destroying the young ones that it may some time be possible for the duck lakes to be stocked with waterfowl again, and the noble canvasback again be plentiful here. The big-mouthed black bass may not be so game a fish as the small-mouthed bass, but they are heartily welcome here, as their large mouths will enable them to eat more young carp. While young carp are plentiful and easy to catch, the bass will not be trying to exterminate the salmon.

MAY CAN SHAD.—It is not improbable that shad may come to the Columbia in May in operation on the Columbia next season, and it is not impossible that shad-canning may vie with salmon-canning on the Columbia some day. It is not many years since shad was plentiful in the Columbia, and they have so increased and multiplied that the annual catch is very large. At first they were despoiled on account of their numerous small bones, and of interest to the people of the Northwest in the river. However, they rapidly grew in favor, being a really excellent and fine-flavored fish. The shad of the Columbia excel those of the East in size and quality, and now the shad in the market is very large, and the demand for shad is so great that it is not possible to supply the market. Experiments made in canning shad here show that the process does not injure their fine flavor, and that the small bones, so annoying to some, are entirely dissolved and disappear from the great heat used in cooking. The experiment of canning shad is worth trying on a commercial scale.

EXPOSITION JOURNAL APPEARS.

The first number of the Exposition, a journal to be devoted to the interests of the Lewis and Clark Fair, was issued yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Edythe Todd Weathered, well known through the Northwest, is the editor, and personally superintended getting out the first number. The magazine is well illustrated with pictures of interest to the people of the Northwest and contains all the reports and addresses of the officers of the Exposition up to the present time. The Exposition will be in session at the Metropolitan Printing Company, and any matter pertaining to the welfare of the 1906 fair will be greatly appreciated by the editor. One thousand copies constitutes the first edition of the magazine, and its circulation is increased as the magazine gets a footing. A big double number will be issued at Christmas time.

CHINESE MERCHANT TO VISIT HONG KONG.

Chen, Chan, who has been a Chinese merchant in Portland for many years, will soon visit his wife and two sons in Hong Kong. He has lived in Portland since boyhood, except the few years which he has spent in other parts of the world. He is in the habit of visiting his family every few years, for it is the custom of many of the Chinese here to keep their families in the Celestial Kingdom, even when they have established themselves in this country. Chen Kee Dan's periodical visits to China cover a span of 12 months, 10 of which he passes in the company of his wife and children, and the remainder on route.

REV. HUBER FERGUSON'S RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

The resignation of Rev. Huber Ferguson as pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church was accepted at a meeting of the congregation last night. After serving here four years, he will leave to accept a call from the Tenth United Presbyterian Church at Allegheny City, Pa. C. C. Trippe was appointed committee to present to the presbytery the resolutions of the congregation commending Mr. Ferguson's able services as pastor. It was decided to give him a farewell reception tonight at the church, Sixth and Montgomery streets.
