Total Production of United States.

The situation is not a favorable one for Oregon apple-growers. A big crop has been produced in this state, and there is practically no domand for ordinary stock, except for the no demand for ordinary stock, except for the local trade. There is no shipping outlet for anything except high-grade varieties, such as Spitzenbergs, Newtons and Jonathans, nearly all of which go to markets on the Atlantic seaboard. Most of these shipments are made direct from the growing districts in Southern Oregon and Heod Elver. There are thousands of hoxes of other varieties, Ben Davis, Bald-wins, Winesaps, Ganos and Greenings still in growers' hands, with practically no market, except at extremely low prices. In Southern Oregon there are probably 40 or 50 carloads, running about 600 boxes to the car, that have not been moved, and cannot be at present. In Enstern Oregon, around Lis Grands, and in Southern Habo, 100 or more cars of medium grade apples eannot find a market at prices tion. At present it does not appear profitable to turn the apples into cider or vinegar, and if they are dried they will endounter an allocal trade. There is no shipping outlet for if they are dried they will encounter an already overloaded dried fruit market.

Washington raises enough apples now to supply its own markets, and has no call upon this state. Frult grown around Wenatchee and in the Yakima Valley provides for the Puget Sound trade, as well as the markets of British Columbia and Alaska, and the territory around Oakesdale furnishes apples for the district northeast of it. Apple-growing in the Williamette Valley is practically a failure, with the fruit pests and worn-out orchards that have not been replaced.

It is difficult at present to give any figures on the Oregon apple crop of this year. The state last year produced \$50,000 boxes of fresh and 150,000 pounds of dried apples. At the beginning of the present senson, there was a great deal of talk of a shortage, but from the way that apples have been coming in and the alow movement, it is evidence that the yield has not fallen far short.

As noted in an accompanying table, the apple crop of the United States for the current year is estimated at 43,000,000 barrels, as compared with 26.970,000 barrels last year. As for quality, this is far from satisfactory in the Central and Western States, but in New England it is very much better than last year. New York State has a big crop. In the older established orchard section in the Middle and Eastern states the increase over last year's failure is very pronounced. In the Central West there are sharp gains, while in the Southwest, a territory last year favored with exceptionally good yields, the crop this season unusually deficient.
