

TO RAISE LICENSES

Council Committee Decides on New Schedule.

ALL-NIGHT SALOONS PAY \$600

Those With Side Entrances and Boxes Will Be Taxed \$200 Additional, and \$300 More if Concert Halls Are Run.

PROPOSED LIQUOR LICENSE ORDINANCE.

Saloons running all night, \$600. Saloons running from 5 A. M. to 1 A. M., \$400. Saloons having side entrances and boxes, additional license of \$200. Saloons having concert or music halls, additional license of \$300. Restaurants selling liquor from 5 A. M. to 1 A. M., \$400. Restaurants selling liquor all night, \$600. Requiring all houses selling liquor under a Government license to pay the city license. Possible amendment—Grading saloons according to the number of bartenders employed.

These are the changes in the liquor license ordinance which the liquor license committee of the Common Council proposed at a meeting held yesterday afternoon. An ordinance embodying them will be drawn up and if it should be passed by the Council the 238 saloons now conducted in the city will pay an average additional tax of \$200. The total increase in revenue which would result would be \$47,600 annually, but it is doubtful if under the new measure many of the places would maintain the boxes. The income from the restaurants also is doubtful, for many of them may refrain from selling drinks rather than pay the license. The possible amendment will be to levy a tax upon some of the saloons in the business district. They maintain no boxes and as they do a large business they may be rated according to the number of bartenders employed. The ordinance will not be passed for a night now, and the committee will be considered with the one the committee will formulate. The revision of the present liquor ordinance was brought up by Chairman Merrill, who introduced the measure first taken up, and he spoke briefly about its objects. Many of the saloons were open all night, and he proposed to make them pay for the privilege. He suggested \$600 a year as a figure for such places, and he said that at least one-half and possibly two-thirds of the saloons would be willing to pay the sum. He was willing to make the measure more liberal and to be considered with the one the committee will formulate.

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Chairman Merrill favored taxation according to the number of bartenders, which Mr. Zimmerman considered impracticable for the reason that some of the best-paying places employed only a single man. Mr. Bentley suggested that the saloons be divided into five classes, and he took up the question of all-night saloons which he thought should be closed.

"They should be, but they are not," said Merrill. "Saloons are open all night now, and the city should get some revenue from them. Tax them and those that pay the tax will see that the others that do not are not successful."

After hearing the result of Mr. Merrill's investigations, Mr. Bentley and the other members of the committee agreed to a motion to tax all saloons keeping open between the hours of 5 A. M. and 1 A. M. and fixed the rate of \$200 a year in addition to the regular license. The license of saloons having side-entrances leading to boxes was increased \$200 a year. Those having concert and music halls were raised \$300 a year. It was intended to raise the license of restaurants maintained in saloons, but when it was learned that all such saloons and restaurants were the best class, and that they would have to pay for side entrances, the matter was dropped. It was decided not to grant any license to saloons where women are employed in saloons, as the police may regulate such places under the state law.

The committee decided to repeal the section of the occupation tax ordinance affecting such restaurants which may take out a license to sell liquor. All restaurants now pay a tax of \$50 a quarter. It was decided to increase the tax to \$100 a year, and the transfer of a license of one saloon-keeper to another under some compensation is received by the city. All places to which licenses may be granted must be inspected regularly by the license collector and no changes, such as the installation of boxes, etc., may be made unless he is duly informed and the matter reported to the committee.

The ordinance will be drawn up some time next week. Those who will both benefit and suffer by it will be the North End concert halls, which, if it should be passed, and seven of the Councilmen favor it, will have to pay a yearly license of \$100-\$200 for the all-night privilege, \$300 for maintaining music and concert halls, and \$200 for maintaining side entrances to boxes. As the greater part of their business is done after the hour of 1 A. M., the loss, if any, will not be great. The saloons in the business district will be the beneficiaries. Most of them close before midnight, and the fashionable ones have no side entrances "leading to boxes." It is for these that the probable amendment relating to the number of bartenders may be made. A few of the smaller saloons have boxes, but the proprietors say they are a source of annoyance, rather than of profit.
