

JEALOUS MAN'S DEED

Shoots Woman in Wardner Boarding House.

HUSBAND GRAPPLES ASSAILANT

But Cannot Reach Him Until Five Shots Take Effect in His Wife and Another Gun is Turned on Him.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Jealousy by the woman, Arthur Goode, a gambler, fired five shots into Mrs. James Aubrey, at Wardner, Idaho, tonight. The woman died a few minutes later. Her husband, who was with her, drew a second revolver and tried to shoot Aubrey, when the latter grappled with the big gambler's hand until the weapon was dropped.

The tragedy occurred at a sporting-house. Goode, commonly known as "Kid" Goode, lived with Mrs. Aubrey for over two years. Recently the woman, who bore the name of Goode, though not married to the gambler, became interested in Aubrey, a barber. The affection was mutual and the couple were married. Goode expressed considerable feeling, and trouble was feared. Tonight he walked to the Russell house and was admitted by the landlady. He asked where Mrs. Aubrey was and was directed to the dining-room where Mrs. Aubrey was conversing with her husband. Goode walked into the room and drawing a revolver, opened fire, five of the six shots taking effect. As Goode began shooting Aubrey dashed forward but could not grapple Goode until the gambler had emptied his revolver. Goode then drew a second gun and tried to shoot Aubrey, but was forced to drop the weapon when Aubrey hit his hand. Goode was quickly overpowered.

He expressed some regret at not being given an opportunity to kill Aubrey, but seemed rather pleased at the result of his assault.

CONVICTS MAKE ESCAPE.

Break From Starbuck Jail While En Route to Penitentiary.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 22.—Word was received at the state penitentiary at noon today of the escape of two convicts en route from Chelan County to the prison. They were in charge of Sheriff H. Keller, and, having missed the train at Starbuck, where they tarried too long at dinner yesterday afternoon, were obliged to remain in the city jail over night. It seems the prisoners were unguarded, and some time during the night they tore up the floor of the wooden structure and tunneled out.

Advises received from Sheriff Keller late this evening are to the effect that the convicts were followed three miles, and that it is almost certain that they did not get away from the town by train. Guard Carson, accompanied by a newspaper man, left here this evening with the famous prison bloodhounds, going by way of Wallula to Grange City, whence they will walk miles to Starbuck in the early morning.

NEGROES FIGHT WITH RAZORS.

Discharged Walla Walla Cavalrymen Slash Each Other.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 22.—Two negroes, discharged from the Ninth Cavalry, fought with razors tonight in a local saloon, and William Johnson almost backed the nose off F. Reeves, a colored man, who was with them. He delivered himself up at the Police Station and was locked up. Reeves was arrested, but later was released on his own recognizance. Both men had been drinking and Reeves declared the fight was the result of an old grudge engendered while soldiering in the Philippines.

ORDERS MONEY RETURNED.

Judge Orders Sweeney's Attorneys to Answer Contempt Charges.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—In the case of Kennedy J. Hanley vs. Charles Sweeney et al., Judge Bentley today issued an order that the money taken from the First National Bank at Wallace be deposited, and that Hanley and M. A. Folsom, his attorney, appear and answer the charge of contempt of court.

The order of the court, after reciting the allegations of the petition, says: "Now, it is hereby ordered that the complainant and said M. A. Folsom shall pay and return to the said First National Bank of Wallace, Idaho, within five days of the service of this order upon them, the sum of \$232.42 so wrongfully taken therefrom by them on the 18th day of November, 1902, as aforesaid."

"It is further ordered that the said Kennedy J. Hanley and M. A. Folsom shall appear before this court at the City of Boise on the 15th day of December, 1902, there to show cause, if any they have, why they and each of them should not be punished for contempt of the orders of this court in removing said money from said bank as set forth in the petition and affidavits upon which this motion is based."

TWO GRANTS PASS TICKETS.

The Labor Party and Business Men in Opposition.

GRANT'S PASS, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Municipal politics are attracting some little attention in Grant's Pass at the present time, owing largely to the drawing near of the city election, which occurs December 1. A Mayor, Treasurer and four Councilmen are to be elected. Two tickets have been placed in the field, one known as the "Labor ticket," and the other as the "General Citizens' ticket." The "Labor ticket" is backed up by the local Federated Trade Union and its several branches. This ticket has placed J. F. Baskin in the field as candidate for Mayor, while for councilmen they have: J. P. Galester, T. A. Hood, J. A. Renkoff and H. C. Perkins. Baskin is an employee of the Southern Pacific and will have a strong following from railroad circles as well as from the labor organizations.

Colonel W. Johnson, who has held the office faithfully for many years past, is the choice of both tickets for Treasurer. The "General Citizens' ticket" have put up W. E. Dean as candidate for mayor. Their candidates for Councilmen from the four wards to be supplied are: W. M. Haly, Lee Calvert, J. T. Chausse and Henry Schmidt. All of these men are merchants, so that the campaign has been practically resolved itself to a fight between the labor organizations and the business men.

SUIT FOR EXTRAS FILED.

Olympia Capitol Commission Sued by Construction Company.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The much-talked-of suit for extras was filed in the Superior Court today by the F. H. Goss Construction Company against the State Capitol Commission. The complaint is a repetition of that filed with the Attorney-General some time ago calling for extras on account of the difference in height of basement walls and width of footings. The amount of extras is \$24,000, \$4000 of which the contractor agrees to

stand for. The amount of damages asked for is \$25,000.

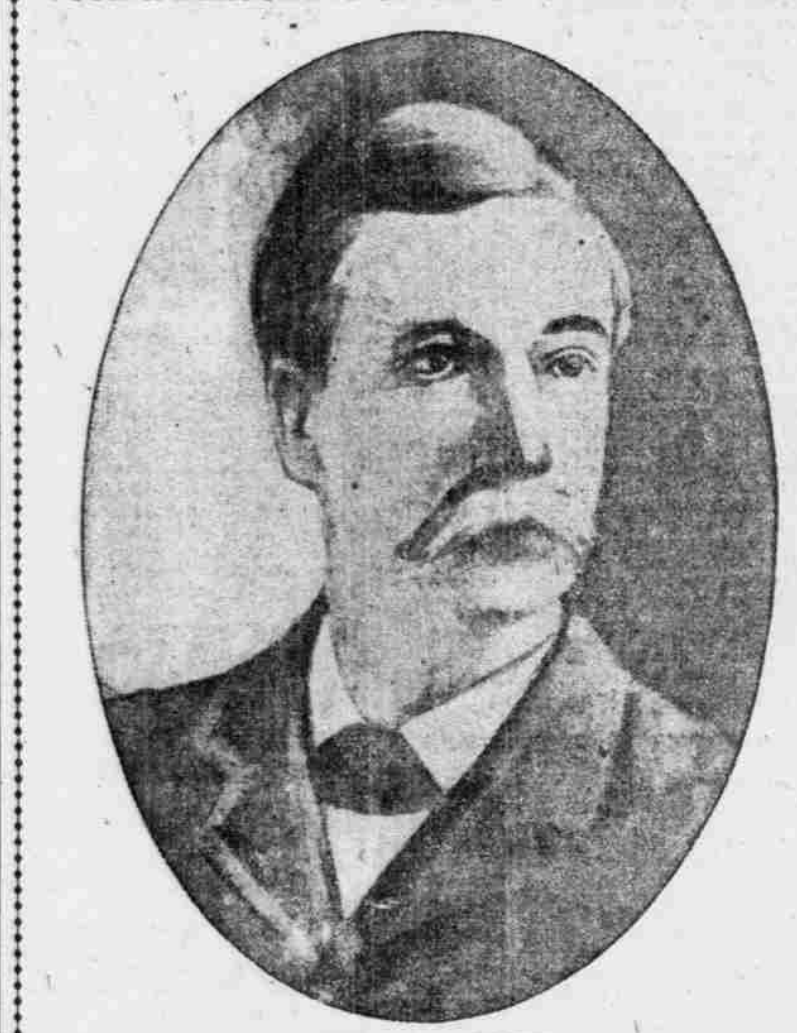
The complaint also covers that part of the Capitol bill wherein it is stated that the amount to be expended shall not exceed \$500,000, and also that all sub-contractors shall be paid before the general contractor. Goss claims that all of the amount due him should be paid before the plumbing, heating, etc., is done, so that if it is necessary to pay any of the contractors in advance it shall not be the Goss Construction Company. The complaint is very voluminous, and covers each claim in detail.

DALLAS BURGlar CAUGHT.

Admits Store Robbery and Is Given Four Years in Penitentiary.

THE DALLAS, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Andrew Geary, an itinerant resident of this community, was arrested and brought to this city from Umatilla yesterday by City Marshal Wood, who had followed him to that place on suspicion that he had perpetrated the robbery of a J. M. Williams department store in this city last Tuesday night. Wednesday the officers discovered two new traveling bags, which were identified as coming from the Williams store, checked for Baker City. In the baggage-room of the O. R. & N. Co. investigation brought forth the stolen goods, together with some articles which had not been missed from the store. It was also learned that the man, who checked the bags had left town on an east-bound freight. Marshal Wood immediately left for Umatilla, where he over-

FOURTH DEMOCRATIC GOVERNOR OF RHODE ISLAND



LUCIUS F. C. GARVIN.

Lucius F. C. Garvin, Governor-elect, will be the fourth Democrat to occupy the chief executive office in Rhode Island since 1797. Three other Democratic Governors have served terms as follows: Governor Allen, 1850-51-52-53; William Sprague (Dem.-Conservative), 1860-61; "Honest John" W. Davis, 1887-88-89-91. Dr. Garvin's plurality is greater than the majorities received by all the other Democratic Governors while candidates for their sixth terms. "Honest John" Davis, of Pawtucket, received a majority of one hundred and thirty-four votes in the election of 1887. Dr. Garvin will have a strong working force, as the Legislature is Republican by 22 on joint ballot, and the House is Republican by only four votes.

Dr. Garvin is a Vermont boy by parentage, reared in Tennessee and North Carolina, where his father, an Amherst graduate, taught in two colleges. Young Lucius was graduated from Amherst in 1892, and immediately enlisted in Company E, Fifty-first Massachusetts, remaining until his company was mustered out. He then entered the Harvard Medical School, from which he was graduated in 1897. At first a Republican, he objected strenuously to the restrictions on suffrage, and though he cast his first vote for Grant, he supported Tilden in 1876, and has fought under the Democratic banner ever since.

He entered Rhode Island politics in 1883, when he was elected to the General Assembly, and, with the exception of two years, has served continuously in one branch or the other of that body, where he has been the most conspicuous advocate of the people's cause. He has championed nearly every reform adopted in the state during that period, including practically all the legislation in the interest of the working people.

Geary was born and reared in The Dalles, but has not resided here for some years except as an itinerant.

Proposed Beet-Sugar Plant.

NORTH YAKIMA, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—A meeting of the leading business men of this city was held here last night to consider the proposition of E. D. Dinning, representing some Eastern capitalists, relative to the establishment of a beet-sugar factory at this place. Mr. Dinning asks the farmers of the Yakima Valley to take \$100,000 in stock to be paid for in beets. This is to insure a sufficient quantity to keep the plant running. The delegation of citizens accepted Mr. Dinning's proposition and he left here at once to confer with the men he represents. He says he will report inside of 10 days, and is very confident of success.

South Bend City Ticket Named.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The following city officers were nominated at a mass convention last evening: Mayor, J. H. Driscoll; Councilmen: J. R. Wright, L. R. Larson, George Heim and T. E. Pearson; Treasurer, F. A. Hazlett; Clerk, Val Heath; City Attorney, William H. Gude; Health Officer, J. L. Myers. All of the nominations were approved by acclamation, and it is believed that there will be any opposition. There would have been a campaign for high license, but at its last meeting the Council took steps to increase the license fee from \$50 to \$800, and that settled the license issue.

Death From Attack of Hicough.

GRANT'S PASS, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The funeral of Riley Moore, aged 33 years, occurred from his home in this city yesterday. Moore was a well-known citizen, and the result of a violent attack of hiccoughs, the only case of the kind ever known here. He was ill but four days. He was a resident of Grant's Pass, near here, and left a wife and six children.

Sheepman Killed on Railroad.

BOZEMAN, Mont., Nov. 22.—John T. Huffe was killed this morning about 3 o'clock while attempting to cross the Northern Pacific tracks near here. Huffe was wealthy, and was one of the best-known ranchers in Gallatin County. Huffe's body was thrown 100 feet and terribly crushed.

SAILOR SHOT AT GARDINER.

Captain Nelson, of the Lily, Shoots a Drunken Sailor.

GARDINER, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Theodore Lurden, a sailor, was shot by Captain Nelson at about midnight last night. Captain Nelson, who had been attending a show in town, returned to his ship, the Lily. He heard an altercation in the forecastle and inquired into the cause. He found that an intoxicated sailor from the Dora Blum, which was tied up nearby, was aboard the Lily apparently seeking a fight.

DEATH FROM COAL GAS.

Two Men Bunking in a Cat Built Fire in Tin Can.

ST. HELENS, Nov. 22.—Coroner Dalton returned from Goble this morning, where he held an inquest over the dead man found in a refrigerator car. Letters in the clothes indicate the name is John Sullivan. He is about 35 years old. The verdict was death by accidental coal gas asphyxiation.

Joe Murphy and Sullivan went into the car Monday, closed the door and built a coal fire in a tin can. Then they fell asleep. When discovered yesterday, Sullivan was dead and Murphy almost gone.

WITHOUT FOOD FOR 56 HOURS.

Aged Man Wanders in the Woods of Douglas County.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Hosea Stokes, aged 73 years, wandered away from his home at Looking-Glass at 11 o'clock Monday morning and was lost in the hills until 5 o'clock Wednesday evening, being hours without food or shelter. When found he had lost his hat, coat, shoes and stockings, and his feet were much cut and swollen, but otherwise he appeared in better condition than was expected. The whole neighborhood had joined in the search for over two days.

MOSIER, Or., Nov. 22.—Louis Davenport, well known throughout Eastern Oregon, and an old Oregon pioneer, died at his home here yesterday. He came to Oregon from California about 45 years ago. In the early days he ran a lively stable in The Dalles. About 15 years ago he moved from that city to his farm at Mosier, where he died. He leaves a wife and nine children—Mrs. Rose Robinson, of Portland; Mrs. Mary G. Goss, of Frank Gunning, Mayor of The Dalles; Misses Kate, Nellie and Gertrude Davenport; George and Charles Davenport, of Portland, and John Davenport, of Mosier.

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Vancouver Barracks Notes.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Major Charles St. J. Chubb is now under orders to wear the uniform of the Nineteenth Infantry, at Vancouver Barracks. Major Chubb will fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Major Calvin D. Cowler to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel.

Major William F. Tucker, Paymaster, has been granted a leave of absence for 15 days, with permission to apply for 15 more.

Second Lieutenant Staley A. Campbell, of the Eighteenth Infantry, has been transferred, at his own request, from the Eighteenth to the Seventeenth Infantry, and will report for duty at once to his new regiment.

Major Robert P. P. Walnwright, who is well known in this vicinity, having made Vancouver Barracks his headquarters while purchasing horses for the Government throughout Washington and Oregon, died at Manila November 19 of cardiac embolism.

The officers and soldiers stationed at Fort Davis, Alaska, will have to exist without fresh vegetables the best they can this winter, as the supply intended for them has been sent to the Government some time ago shipped from Seattle a large quantity of potatoes and onions, enough to last the garrison at Fort Davis until next spring, when a new supply will be received. The Government never met a storm which lasted 15 days, and the captain returned to Seattle without delivering his cargo. MURPHY PLEADS GUILTY.

Vancouver Boy Who Attempted Murder of Elbert Pius.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Walter W. Murphy, alias Walter Bailey, who shot and seriously wounded Elbert Pius in an attempt to hold up and rob him, today pleaded guilty in the Superior Court to a charge of assault with intent to commit murder, and was sentenced to serve five years in the penitentiary. Young Murphy appears to have been a confirmed criminal, and now presses no regret for his action which takes him to prison. He served a short term in the County Jail here about a year ago on a charge of petty larceny, and was formerly an inmate of the Reform School. He was also a charge of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Portland several years ago. Sheriff Marsh will take Murphy to Walla Walla next Monday.

CHARGED WITH BURGLARY.

Man Arrested at Canby Thought to Be Insane.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Michael Strantz was brought to the city today and is in the County Jail charged with burglary. Last Tuesday he entered the house of James Evans, near Canby, and was arrested Wednesday by Marshal Graham, of Canby, who brought him to Oregon City. Evans thinks the man is

crazy, and he shows evidences of insanity. Justice Stupp placed him under \$500 bonds to appear at the next term of the Circuit Court. In default of the amount he was committed to jail, but it is possible that he will be examined for insanity.

GIVEN TO ASTORIA FIRM.

Contract for Building \$20,000 Roads at Fort Columbia.

ASTORIA, Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Captain Goodale, constructing Quartermaster, has received a dispatch from the War Department at Washington, stating that the contract for constructing water and sewer systems and building roads at Fort Columbia, Idaho, for which work was opened on November 15, had been awarded to Ferguson & Houston, of this city. The roads are to have plank surfacing and wooden gutters, and the price for the whole contract is about \$20,000. Work is to begin during the coming week and crowded as rapidly as possible, the time fixed for its completion being six months from the date of signing the contract.

FOREST GROVE, Nov. 22.—Clarence Miller, of Gales Creek, said today that he had the machinery now on the way from the East to start a sawmill at that place. He has the site selected, and expects to have the plant, which will be run by steam, in operation by January 1. The capacity of the mill will be 10,000 feet a day.

Catching Herring in the Columbia.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—There is a considerable run of herring in the river at the present time, and fishermen with small-mesh seines are catching many of them in the river opposite this city.

Cold-Storage Plant for Brewery.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—The Star brewery has begun building a cold-storage and ice plant in this city. When completed the plant will have a capacity of 15 tons per day.
