affected the market was a hope that the De-cember disbursements of interest and divi-dends, which are estimated at about \$75,000,000, would afford relief to the local money mar-ket. The payment in London today of \$20. 000,000 to \$25,000,000 on account of the ship-ping combine also aroused hopes of easier conditions in the money market. Actual quo-tations for call money were firm, under the continuing influences of preparations for the December disbursements, and time money rates were unchanged. The opinion of bank-ers, in spite of today's stock market view, is for a continuance of close money condiers, in spite of today's stock market view, is for a continuance of close money conditions over the end of the year. There was some speculation on the assumption that selling of stocks on the ground of supposed antitrust views to be expressed in the President's message would prove unwarranted.
