

BODY LIES IN STATE

Reed's Funeral at Portland, Me., Today.

ARRIVED FROM WASHINGTON

Services in Unitarian Church to Follow Viewing of Body by His Hosts of Friends—Only Room for Distinguished Visitors.

PORTLAND, Me., Dec. 8.—In the parish-house of the Unitarian Church tonight lies the body of Thomas Brackett Reed, for 22 years one of the most distinguished statesmen of the nation, and for six years Speaker of the National House of Representatives. Tomorrow forenoon his friends, who include every man, woman and child in the city of Portland, will be permitted to gaze upon the face which for so long a time they have known in the city of Portland, and in the afternoon in the main body of the church will assemble distinguished statesmen from Washington, prominent men from New York, Governors of the New England States and the most noted residents of the Pine Tree State to honor his memory. There will be read a few passages from the Bible, a brief prayer will be said and a eulogy delivered by the pastor, Rev. John Carroll Perkins. After the benediction is pronounced the body will be placed in the tomb at Evergreen cemetery.

The funeral party arrived here from Washington in a special train shortly after noon today. It consisted of the widow, the daughter, Miss Catherine Reed, Colonel Augustus G. Payne, of New York; C. D. Burrows and his sister, Miss Burrows, Congressmen from New York, Mr. Reed's immediate successor in the First District, Asher C. Hinds, his private secretary, and State Senator Mitchell, of New York County. A committee of arrangements was in waiting. Mrs. Reed and her daughter were escorted to a hotel, while the body, which rested in a plain black casket, was borne to a hearse and conveyed to the parish-house.

The committee decided that, in view of the large number of delegations and distinguished persons who had signified their intention of being present, it would be impossible to throw open the church generally. Mrs. Reed's permission was then obtained to have the body lie in state, and tomorrow, between 11 and 1 o'clock, the public will be admitted to the church. After that the edifice will be closed to all except those holding tickets. The pallbearers have been selected from the Cumberland bar and the Cumberland Club.

The main body of the church will be reserved for Governor Hill, staff and counsel, Governor Crane, of Massachusetts, Collector H. L. Lyman, of Boston; members of the Home Market Club, the Cumberland bar, Cumberland Club, Loyal Legion, Grand Army and members of the city government.

None of the immediate family will be in the body of the church, but will occupy seats in the parish-house, the broad doors of which lead directly into the large edifice.

At 10 o'clock tomorrow there will be a meeting at Greenleaf Law Library of the Cumberland bar, at which fitting resolutions will be adopted.

During the funeral services the city bells will toll for strokes and all public buildings will be suspended.

TRIBUTE TO LAWMAKERS.

House of Representatives Passes Resolutions Voicing Its Sorrow.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The House today paid a remarkable tribute to the memory of ex-Speaker Thomas B. Reed. His death created a profound impression, and there was a universal desire among the members that the House show a signal mark of respect to his memory. For the House to take action on the death of a former member had only three precedents in its history, namely, the deaths of Alexander Stephens, when the House adopted resolutions and adjourned out of respect to their memories. It was decided to follow these precedents in the case of Mr. Reed.

The chaplain, at the opening of the session, made a feeling reference to the death of the ex-Speaker. No business was transacted beyond the formal reading of two messages from the President, and an arrangement to postpone the special order for today, the London dock bill, until tomorrow. Mr. Sherman, of New York, then, amid profound silence, arose, and in a few feeling remarks offered the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the following minute be spread upon the record of the House of Representatives:

"Hon. Thomas Brackett Reed died in Washington, December 7, 1902. For 22 years he had been a member of this House; for six years its Speaker. His service terminated with the 53th Congress. Within this chamber the scene of his life's great activities was laid. Here he rendered services to his country which placed him in the front rank of American statesmanship. Here he exhibited characteristics which compelled respect and won admiration. Forceful ability, intrinsic worth, strength of character brought him popular fame and Congressional leadership. In him depth and breadth of intellect, with a full and well-rounded development, had produced a giant who towered above his fellows and impressed them with his power and wisdom.

"A distinguished statesman, a lofty patriot, a cultured scholar and incisive writer, an unmatched debater, a master logic, wit and satire; the most famous of the world's parliamentarians, the great and representative citizen, has gone into history.

"Resolved, That in honor of the distinguished dead, the House now adjourn."

In presenting the resolution Mr. Sherman said:

"Mr. Speaker, the life of ex-Speaker Reed ended yesterday. His span measured many years less than the allotted life of man; and yet there was within it so much of moment that his fame became great and will become lasting. He was a citizen of my state since his retirement from public life, although it was as a Representative from the State of Maine that he rendered his services to the public and it is in the State of Maine that he will have his final resting place.

"To have served with Mr. Reed was an honor; to have been in close touch with him an inspiration; to have enjoyed his confidence and friendship a delight. He was so great, his service to his country so valuable, that it seems to me we may fittingly depart from what is the usual custom when the House when one in public life dies, therefore, Mr. Speaker, offer the resolution which I send to the clerk."

When the reading of the resolutions had been concluded, Speaker Henderson asked if there was any objection to their present consideration. The silence remained unbroken. The resolutions were then unanimously adopted, and accordingly, at 12:15, the Speaker declared the House adjourned out of respect to the memory of Mr. Reed.

Can't Bring Nast's Body Home.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—A brief cablegram from Robert B. Jones, Vice-Consul-General at Guayaquil, dated yesterday, announced to the State Department the death of General Thomas Nast. The dispatch gave no details of the end. Owing to the contagious nature of the disease which caused Mr. Nast's death, it will probably be impossible for the department to follow the usual custom of bringing the body to the United States.

HONOLULU, Dec. 2, via San Francisco.

Dec. 8.—Chinese Minister Wu Ting Fang arrived in Honolulu last night as a through passenger to China, on the Hong Kong Mail. While here he met many of the locally prominent Chinese, and had some severe comments to make on the way that the exclusion act is enforced here. In an interview in the Pacific Commercial Advertiser, he said:

"I find that business men here complain bitterly of the way in which the exclusion act is carried out here. Of course, their business has suffered through the cutting out of laborers, but they do not complain of this so much as of the outrageous way in which the immigration authorities treat merchants, students and bona fide travelers. As an instance, I mention a young man of 18, who came here to secure an education. He had proper papers, but was quizzed in many ways by the authorities, and of course, the boy was not able to answer all questions. He was held, and after \$400 had been spent in trying to land him an appeal was made to me. After a good deal of trouble he was allowed to land.

"You interpret the exclusion act in such a way that students are put to an enormous expense in trying to land. You make it hard for Chinese travelers. The sooner this is put a stop to the better. If you wish to keep out the laborers, well and good, but do not put such difficulties in the way of merchants and travelers."

The Minister said that he attributed the thing of which he complained to over-zealousness on the part of officials. Land Commissioner E. S. Boyd is about to offer a tract of about 450 acres of public land for sale on this island. It is to be offered at auction at an upset price of \$1 per acre. The purchasers are to be required to keep the land free of the islands, and to make improvements.

FOR ALASKA CABLE.

Secretary Root Recommends an All-American Line.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 8.—I wish to call attention to the importance of a cable between the northwestern coast of the State of Washington and the southern point of our Alaskan territory, so as to connect the telegraph system of the United States with the telegraph system in Alaska.

The Government of the United States is maintaining troops in Alaska at various points. It is responsible for the maintenance of order. Disturbances are always liable to occur in new mining camps, and there is always a possibility of their occurring along a frontier line. Our only present means of communicating by telegraph with our officers, or with anyone concerned in the government of Alaska, is over the Canadian land lines.
