## FALL COODS TRADE

Bulk of the Jobbing Business Is Over.

#### SHIPMENTS ON BACK ORDERS

Heavy Demand for Produce for the Holiday Trade-Wheat Market Dull and No Business. in Hops.

The bulk of the Fall and holiday trade of the jobbing grocers has been disposed of. Shipments are heavy, but they are mostly on back and not a great deal of new business is being worked, except in the ordinary staples or to replenish depleted stocks. Price changes in this line during the past week were not numerous, the most important being the advance per cent in sugar. Coal oil went up 1c, and Eastern lard declined Saturday, the ruling quotation being 13%c.

The demand for canned fruits is good for this time of the year. Reports continue to confirm the estimates of a short pack. If the Spring demand comes up to expectations the clean-up will be very close. Many grades are already out of the market, and stocks of nearly every variety packed are badly broken. 
