

## SEATTLE HAS WON

## Transport Business Awarded to Her Bidder.

## SHE GETS AT LEAST ONE-HALF

Secretary Root yesterday decided to accept the bid of the Boston Steamship Company to conduct the Philippine transport business from Seattle.

The sole condition is that the provision in the bid that the company be given 75 per cent of the business be waived. This condition has been accepted.

Some of the transports will be operated from San Francisco for the present, and that port will have nearly all the business this winter. Seattle and Tacoma will get half the business at first, and an increasing proportion as they show ability to handle it.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 17.—Secretary Root late this evening decided to accept the offer of the Boston Steamship Company for carrying troops and supplies to and from the Philippines, on condition that the provision in its bid that it be given 75 per cent of the business be eliminated. President Winsor has assured the Secretary that this will be done and the contract awaits only formal acceptance when Mr. Winsor reaches here tomorrow or next day.

Puget Sound, under this contract, will get perhaps half of all Government business for the time being, and if Seattle and Tacoma show themselves equal to the emergency and successfully handle both troops and supplies, it is quite probable that in time greater portions of Government trade will find their way to Northern ports.

For the present, some of the transports will be retained and be operated from San Francisco, and during the winter months will probably carry all, or almost all, troops to and from Manila.

The news of the Secretary's decision was first announced by Senator Lodge, who has been deeply interested in the affair and has done a great deal in behalf of the Boston Steamship Company. It was he who late this evening carried the news of the award to Senator Foster. Mr. Foster, two days ago, after his conference with the Secretary, announced that it was all up, that San Francisco had won her fight and Puget Sound had lost.

The significance of the award lies in the fact that Secretary Root is taking the initial step in the direction of abolishing the Army transport service on the Pacific. Whether or not the transports as they are later abandoned, will be turned over to commercial lines, as suggested by President Winsor, is yet to be decided. It is probable, however, that whatever disposition is made of these ships, the condition will be imposed that the Government maintain the right to purchase them back whenever necessary arises. The rapidity with which the Army transport business is absorbed by commercial lines depends largely upon the manner in which the Puget Sound firm carries out its contract.

## DREDGE PUT FOR THE GRANT.

Contract Let for Machine to Cut Down Columbia Bar.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 17.—A contract has been awarded to the Elliott Machine Company, of Baltimore, for building the hydraulic pump, to cost \$16,000, to be installed on the transport Grant, which is to be converted into a dredge for cutting off the crest of the bar at the mouth of the Columbia River. The pump will be a duplicate of that now installed on the largest Government dredges, with a diameter of 36 inches and a capacity of handling about 500 cubic yards of material an hour.

The engineer officer at San Francisco has been authorized to issue the advertisements and award a contract for remodeling the Grant to make her suitable for dredge purposes. Much of her present fittings will be replaced by bins to receive the sand brought up by the pump.

## NO HOPE FOR NEW LAND LAWS.

Bills to Repeal Timber and Commutation Laws Cannot Pass.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 17.—No mention was made at the meeting of the House public lands committee today of the bills proposing the repeal of the timber and stone homestead commutation or desert land laws. A member of the committee afterward stated that there is no use discussing these measures, that a majority of the committee is against them, and they cannot pass this session. All that remains is for the committee to place its seal of disapproval on the proposed legislation. It is possible this will be done during the holiday recess.

## MRS. GRANT'S FUNERAL.

Preparations by Veterans for Military Honors at Riverside.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The executive committee of the Grant Monument Association held a short meeting at the Chamber of Commerce today to discuss arrangements for placing the body of Mrs. U. S. Grant in its final resting place in the Grant monument. The exact time at which this will be done and the character of the services cannot be determined until General Fred D. Grant reaches Washington. All that has been done here as yet has been to arrange for the lifting of the top of the granite sarcophagus in which Mrs. Grant's body will lie. A committee to have charge of all arrangements was appointed today, to consist of General Grenville M. Dodge, Edwin Root and Henry W. Hayden, vice-president and secretary of the association; Cornelius N. Bliss and Colonel A. L. Noel Blakeman. Colonel Blakeman, who has immediate charge of details, and has gone to Washington to meet General Grant.

## General Henry M. Cist Dead.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 17.—General Henry M. Cist, a well-known lawyer and author of this city, died in Rome, Italy, today, aged 75 years. He enlisted as a private in the Civil War, won promotion after promotion and retired from the Army as a brevet Major-General. He was the author of the "Army of the Cumberland."

## Military Honors to Moorman.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 17.—The body of General George Moorman, who died suddenly last night, will be taken to Me-

morial Hall this afternoon, where it will lie in state, guarded by veterans. The funeral will occur at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the hall, and all the veteran organizations have been invited to attend. Rev. A. Gordon Bakewell will deliver the sermon.

## Vanderbilt's Condition Serious.

NEWPORT, R. I., Dec. 17.—A message received here from New York tonight stated that the condition of Cornelius Vanderbilt was serious, owing to the weakness of his heart.

## Roosevelt's Hunting Mate Dead.

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—Colonel R. E. Bobo, of Bobo, Miss., whose name was conspicuous in connection with President Roosevelt's bear-hunting trip, died today at the Hahnemann Hospital, of blood poisoning resulting from liver trouble, aged 55 years.

## Mrs. W. G. Clark, Jr., Recovering.

BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 17.—Mrs. William A. Clark, mother of Senator Clark's million-dollar prize-winning grandchild, is reported much better today and the attending physicians have every hope of her recovery.

## Death of Mrs. Bulloch.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 17.—Mrs. Mary E. Bulloch, widow of the late Dr. W. G. Bulloch, was a relative of President Roosevelt, died here today of pneumonia.

## Tennessee Congressman Dead.

BRISTOL, Tenn., Dec. 17.—Colonel Abraham Johnson, aged 70, ex-Congressman from the ninth Virginia district, died at his home here today. He was a Colonel in the Confederate Army.

## H. M. Knowlton Seriously Ill.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Dec. 17.—Ex-State Attorney-General H. M. Knowlton, who was stricken with apoplexy on December 6, is not expected to survive the day.

## TRYING THE GAMBLERS.

## Canfield's Man Bucklin Declines to Defend His Business.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The hearing of the charges against David Bucklin of being manager of a gambling-house at 5 East Forty-fourth street, the Canfield house, was commenced today. Bucklin pleaded not guilty, and declined to make reply to the question, "What is your business?" Joseph Jacobs, the detective who is said to have gathered testimony against the house, was the first witness. He told how he played faro and roulette there. Bucklin, he said, received the men who came in and watched the different games. The hearing was adjourned until tomorrow.

## MUST NOT ATTACK JEROME.

## Anti-Gambling Crusader Threatens Arrest of Newspaper Men.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—District Attorney Jerome in an interview today spoke of the stand taken by the newspapers on his recent actions against alleged gamblers. He said: "When they question my honesty and jeopardize the cause, I will take action and proceed criminally against the managing editors, and, if necessary, make arrests."

## Suspected Bank Robbers.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Dec. 17.—Three of the men thought to be concerned in the bank robbery at Clarence, as well as those of other institutions of the same kind in Central Illinois, were arrested today at Gibson City by the town Marshal and deputies there. A large sum of money was found in their possession and the shoes worn corresponded with the size of the tracks made in the snow around the bank.

## President of Union Indicted.

TELLURIDE, Colo., Dec. 17.—Vincent St. John, president of the Miners' Union, one of the 22 men indicted for participation in the riot at the Smuggler-Union mine in July, 1901, in which two men were killed and five wounded. He was arrested today by the indictments charge St. John with murder, attempt to murder and robbery. President St. John was released on furnishing bonds for \$7000.

## Howard Will Have New Trial.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 17.—The Court of Appeals has granted James Howard a new trial. Howard, who is under sentence of life imprisonment for the Goebel murder, has already been tried twice.

## FRANCE FOLLOWS SUIT.

## Presents Claim Against Peru for Award of Arbitration Court.

LIMA, Peru, Dec. 17.—The French Legation presented to the Peruvian government on November 8 this year a claim for \$16,071,940, in favor of the Dreyfus brothers, of Paris, in accordance with the finding of the Lausanne Court of Arbitration. The present time the government has made no reply to the presentation of this claim, and it is probable that the French Legation tomorrow will reiterate its request for a settlement in stronger language.

## BRINGING IN THE REBELS.

## Columbia Fast Settling Down into Peaceful Condition.

PANAMA, Dec. 17.—The Colombian gunboat Bogota arrived here today from Chiriqui, towing five sailing vessels. She brings the former revolutionary Generals Morales, Bustillo and Gomez, and nearly 2000 men of Panama.

## MANEUVERS OF NAVY.

## Squadron Exercise of Dewey's Fleet—His Christmas Trip.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Dec. 17.—The exercises of the American fleet in squadron formation were continued today. The Texas arrived today and has taken her place in the battleship fleet.

## Receiver for Governor Warmoth.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 17.—On an application of Harry L. Laws, of the firm of James H. Laws & Co., of Cincinnati, Judge Parker, in the United States Circuit Court, today appointed A. B. Wheeler receiver for the Magnolia and other sugar plantations of ex-Governor Warmoth, in Plaquemine Parish. A note held by Laws for \$15,000 fell due on December 1 and was protested and not paid. It is said various creditors were threatening the seizure of the plantations.

## LEAGUE WARRIORS ALERT

## EACH FACTION WARILY WATCHES THE OPPOSITION.

## Players and Public Wait for President Lucas to Move—Henry Harris Confident.

The baseball war is still raging, and in all likelihood, it will continue to rage till somebody does something to break the monotony. In the meantime the players and ever-patient public is worrying till its hair is turning gray, and it is probable that the gray will turn to white before the season closes.

It is a matter of fact, the magnates and players seem to be less stirred up over the matter than the fans, and to see President Lucas' assuring smile is enough to make anybody think that there is no war, and that there is never going to be any. Sammy Vigneux is seen on the street corners and at the cigar stores, and when anybody says baseball he simply says: "It's getting a trifle chilly, isn't it?"

Henry Harris is back at "Prisco-on-the-Bay again, and from what he has to say on the subject, it seems to be a very nice trip north. In an interview he goes on to say that he has met with the most absolute success in Portland, and that he has the best baseball fans and enthusiasts in the city behind him. He also gives a list of the new Portland Pacific Coast club directors, and tells about the dealings with Dugdale. His talk in full is as follows:

"In Portland we have the best men in the city behind our club," he remarked in the course of the interview, "and all the money we want. Among the directors are such men as Mr. Spencer, of the Oregonian, and Mr. Lewis, who are the biggest grocery men in that country; Mr. Fleischer, of the firm of Fleischer & Mayer; Mr. Almsworth, who is president of a National bank; and Mr. Deane, who is a wholesale coffee merchant. We will have the league grounds and the team, but this will be strengthened, I can't say who will manage the Portland club, though I heard some talk of Mr. Marshall. As we hold the franchise in the Northwest League, I fall to see where there can be any opposition in this city."

"Do you look for Manager Dugdale to change his mind and join the Pacific Coast League?" Harris was asked.

"There is a chance for him to come in yet," he replied. "We have left him a block of stock which he can have if he wants to join us. Some of the players are urging him to transfer his club to ours, but if he decides to go with the other league it will be a case of the survival of the fittest. The club that gets the best team in Seattle will draw the crowd, and I feel sure that we won't be second. There has been no manager selected for the Seattle team yet, and there won't be any until we hear from Dugdale definitely. Spokane wanted to desert Lucas and come in with us, but just now it would be inadvisable to admit this city. From what I could observe, that league up there is in a bad way, and as the Bulletin stated last night, Rute is the only good baseball town left in it, but a league cannot prosper on one city. We will have four or five first-class places to draw crowds from, and I look for a great league."

"Notwithstanding all statements to the contrary, I want to say," resumed Harris, "that the clubs here did not ask Portland and Seattle to join them. The Northwest League, which he sought admission. They asked me to visit that territory and look over the field and then decide what I thought was best. I did so, and I think that the time is now ripe for a star club league, which is far superior to a four-club affair."

## REIFF GIVEN DAMAGES.

## French Paper Must Pay for Making False Charge.

PARIS, Dec. 17.—J. Reiff, the American jockey, today was awarded \$10,000 damages by the ninth correctional tribunal in his case against the Vie au Grand Air, arising from that paper's charges that the jockey had been a thief.

A number of American jockeys and trainers testified that they had employed Reiff as a jockey. They said they had examined his English riding before doing so, and had found him to be excellent. They never had cause to complain of Reiff's riding, and said they did not believe he had pulled the horse in question.

The trainer of Saint Sauge declared the horse to be unreliable and said he never trusted him. He ran very badly the day of the race because he was ill. Saint Sauge had been raced against the advice of the trainer, who testified that he could not understand how Reiff could be accused of pulling the horse, as he had ridden him energetically and according to orders.

The owner of Saint Sauge said he was surprised that the horse had lost, as he believed had a good chance of winning and he had been ridden by the best jockey in France. The owner said he had investigated the reason why the horse lost, and had come to the conclusion that Reiff had ridden him too hard. He testified also that he did not think Saint Sauge had been pulled up, and that Reiff had ridden him subsequently.

Foulks, and a niece of Mr. Edson, was in the upper portion of the structure when the fire broke out, and lost her life in the flames.
