MAY AMEND GAME LAWS.—The Fish and Game Association will hold a meeting on January 6, in the Chamber of Commerce building, to arrive at a decision as to what changes in the game laws they shall ask the approaching Legislature to make. A number of proposed changes have been discussed among the members, but have not yet been formally decided upon. Sportsmen have been troubled for fear that some radical and undesirable changes may be made in the laws and assert that one of the modifications which has been talked of in regard to the duck shooting, would, if adopted, have the effect of keeping wild ducks away from this region altogether. It is known that some members of the association have the same idea in regard to this change, and they say that no alteration of the laws will be asked for except such as will be approved by common sense. It is probable that a stringent law in regard to trespass will be passed, which will give a farmer control of the shooting on his own grounds. There has been so much disputing and arguing as to what changes in the game laws are desirable that members of the association, as well as sportsmen, will be relieved when the Legislature meets to consider the matter.

PINE TURKEYS FOR MARKET.—Of all the fine turkeys sent into Portland for the Christmas market the very finest came from a man near Harrisburg. His flock was a large one in every way, for besides all the moderate sized ones he had some 30 birds which ranged in weight from 20 to 34 pounds, and the quality was as extraordinary as the size. For the largest birds there was a turkey which weighed 34 pounds and was a perfect specimen. It received \$7.50 each for a number of them. There ought to be some profit in raising turkeys like these. It is to be hoped that the farmer will keep up the work and show others how to raise the same kind of fowls. It would puzzle a "Philadelphia lawyer" to state the weight of the largest turkey marketed this season. Very large ones were displayed by nearly every dealer, and the weight marked on some of them was astonishing, but it is to be feared that occasionally the truth was stretched for the sake of a few cents. When the label indicates over 40 pounds, one should see the bird put on the scale before he bets on the correct weight.

INVESTIGATION OF NATIONAL GUARD.—The Portland companies of the Third Regiment, Oregon National Guard, will be inspected by the Inspector-General, Tuesday night, December 30, at the Armory, by Governor Geor. accompanied by his full staff, will review the regiment. Muster rolls showing all changes since last quarterly returns, made up to, and including December 31, prepared in duplicate, will be handed to the mustering officer at the time of muster. After the inspection, the members of the regiment will give a dance in the upper hall of the Armory, and Company G will have charge of the floor. Details for the guard are: Senior officer of the guard, First Lieutenant W. W. Willard; junior officers of the guard, Second Lieutenant A. E. Jenkins; Company H, three privates; Company C, one Sergeant and two privates; Company D, three privates; Company E, three privates; Company G, one Corporal and two privates.

WILL GO SLUMMING AGAIN.—Councilmen Flegel and Zimmerman, who made a tour of inspection of the North End dives Saturday night, examined the applications of a number of saloon men, which were held up by the liquor license committee at its last meeting. Neither Councilmen passed upon the application, but they took the names of all the saloonkeepers and will make a personal investigation of the houses. Mr. Flegel intends to make a second trip around the houses in the next day or so, and he expects to be able to present a report of his investigations to the adjourned meeting of the Council, which will be held on Friday.

TRAVELERS TO ASSEMBLE.—The seventh annual convention of the Travelers' Protective Association of Oregon will be held in the parlors of the Portland hotel on Saturday afternoon. Officers will be elected for the ensuing year and other business of the association disposed of. In the evening there will be a grand banquet, when the traveling men will celebrate their annual gathering in a way that only traveling men know how to do. Governor-elect George Chamberlain, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Dr. A. A. Morrison and S. C. Pier will give the addresses of the evening.

AGAIN THAT POWER SITE

CITY & SUBURBAN CROWDING WORK ON TROUT CREEK.

Estimated That 25,000 Horsepower Will Be Available There—What Use Will Be Made of It?

GRESHAM, Or., Dec. 22.—(Special.)—Work has been resumed near the site of the City & Suburban Railway Company's proposed power plant on Trout Creek, east of the Sandy River. In fact, operations have been under way for several months a force of 10 men being now employed in building a road between Trout Creek and Gordon Creek, a distance of about four miles. This is not a railroad but a wagon road, easy grade up a mountain, which will be necessary when the more important work is begun.

Over two years ago the City & Suburban Company began making surveys along the creek to determine the volume of water they could furnish for generating purposes. Afterward a force of men was put to work and considerable space was cleared off, which is said to be the site of the proposed power-house. The two creeks were found to have sufficient volume to furnish 25,000 horsepower if they could be connected, and this was found to be feasible by the construction of proper dams and conduits, and it is to further this work that operations are now being pushed.

George Harburt, a son of the County Surveyor, is also there with a force of surveyors making levels and running lines. No one seems to know just what the object of the surveys is at this time, but it is asserted that they are for the location of the pipe which will connect the two streams.

For a long time, when the work was first begun, there was much mystery about the object of the work, but the mystery was solved by the payment of the men employed in checks signed by C. F. Swigert, of the City & Suburban. For several years all work was suspended and during that period a few pieces of property changed hands in the neighborhood. This has been followed by a resumption of work. There is still much secrecy concerning the object of the company and the use to be made of the power plant when completed, but it is highly probable that another electric railway line through this section will be built in the near future.

MUST BUY THEIR MEDALS

Oregon Exhibitors at Charleston Will Not Get Awards Free.

The Oregon exhibitors who were awarded in all sorts of medals and diplomas at the Charleston Exposition are not likely to be so fortunate as those who were awarded the 234 medals and diplomas at the Buffalo Exposition. The latter were purchased by the Oregon Commissioners and furnished to the winners, and the cost charged to the state. The Charleston Exposition is less of a success financially than the Buffalo Exposition was, as the Oregon Commissioners have no money to buy the prizes awarded at Charleston. From letters received by Commissioner Dosch, it is evident that the exhibitors who were awarded medals and diplomas at Charleston will have to buy them for themselves. Even Mr. Dosch will have to buy the special medal awarded him for the installation of the Oregon exhibit, and the comprehensive, complete and artistic display he produced.

Persons calling on Mr. Dosch can see a picture of the medals awarded and learn the efforts of different kinds of medals. Gold medals cost \$150, and would be very nice as a gift, but when one comes to paying for it himself, a gold-plated silver medal, which costs only \$3, will answer very well. A silver-plated medal costs only \$150, and a bronze medal only \$25. One can have the bronze medal gold-plated for \$4, or silver-plated for \$35. A diploma costs \$1, and an electrolyte of the medal can be had for \$1. It is probable that all who were awarded medals or diplomas will want them, and by calling on Mr. Dosch they will be enabled to make a selection. Medals are struck only to the order of the exhibitor holding an award, and will bear his name in raised letters, which will greatly enhance the medal as an individual award.
