SAGASTA IS DEAD

The Aged Spanish Statesman Passes Away.

HIS KING MOURNS FOR HIM

Heart Failure Brings His Illness to a Sudden End—Fifty Years in Political Life—Headed Ministry Which Fought United States.

MADRID, Jan. 5.—Ex-Premier Praxedes Mateo Sagasta died at 11 o'clock tonight in his 76th year. At 6:30 he had an attack of heart failure and it was then thought he was dead; he rallied, however, and lived for four and a half hours. His funeral will probably take place next Wednesday.

Senor Sagasta's death was due to bronchitis and gastric trouble. His family was at the deathbed, and former Liberal members of the Cabinet were near their old leader. A bishop administered the last sacrament this afternoon.

The news of the ex-Premier's death created a painful impression throughout Madrid. King Alfonso expressed profound regret.

Senor Sagasta's intellect was unimpaired until his last hours. He talked to his daughter, the President of the Senate and of Congress, and to the archbishop of Toledo.

King Alfonso has written a letter of sympathy to Senor Sagasta's family. During the ex-Premier's illness, the Queen mother and other members of the royal family frequently sent officials to inquire as to his progress.

Praxedes Mateo Sagasta, one of the greatest of Spanish statesmen and Premier during the war with the United States, was born at Torrecilla de Comeros, Spain, July 21, 1827, received his early education in the School of Engineers at Madrid and was elected to the Constituent Cortes in 1854. He took a prominent part in the insurrection two years later and was forced to flee to France, but returned to Spain when the amnesty was proclaimed. He became a professor in the School of Engineers, where he had received his early schooling, and also editor of La Iberia, the principal organ of the Progressist party.

Another unsuccessful insurrection caused him to flee to France a second time but returned soon after the fall of Queen Isabella II. He was made a member of General Prim's first Cabinet, and in January, 1870, became Minister of State and declared for the monarchy. Subsequently he held the office of Minister of Foreign Affairs, Minister of the Interior and President of the Council in 1874, under Marshal Serrano. In 1875 he gave his adherence to Alfonso XII and became connected with the new Liberal party in 1890.

The next year he became prominent as the head of a coalition which was soon after succeeded by a Cabinet formed from the dynamic left.

On the death of Alfonso XII on November 25, 1885, he again assumed the reins of the government at the request of the Queen regent, but his ministry was overthrown and the Conservatives under Castillo came into power five years later. When the Conservative leader resigned in 1892, Sagasta again took charge, but on his resignation in March, 1898, he was once more superseded by Castillo. In the Spring of 1898 shortly before the declaration of war by the United States, Senor Sagasta formed a Liberal ministry which conducted the war that lost Spain nearly all her colonies. He recently retired to give place to a Conservative ministry headed by Senor Silveira.

BRODRICK MARRIED AGAIN.

British War Secretary Weds Daughter of Famous Judge.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Mr. Brodrick, the War Secretary, and Madeline Stanley, daughter of Lady Jeune, were married at St. George's Church, Hanover square, this afternoon. The scene was brilliant and the church was crowded with fashionable people. Premier Balfour was the best man. The bride, who was given away by her stepfather, Justice Jeune, was supported by seven bridesmaids. There were upwards of 600 present. King Edward gave a massive silver gilt inkstand, bearing the royal arms.

Among the guests in the church were Princess Christian, the Duke of Cambridge, Lord Lansdowne and other members of the Cabinet, Lord and Lady Roberts, Sir Henry and Lady Stanley and Mr. White, the United States Charge d'Affaires.

Public interest in the event was marked by the crowd outside, which was so great that people broke through the police lines and almost mobbed the carriage containing the bride and groom, in their anxiety to see the latter.

This was War Secretary Brodrick's second marriage. His first wife who died about a year ago, was a daughter of the Earl of Wymore.

Miss Stanley, now Mrs. Brodrick, is a daughter of Lady Jeune, wife of the Judge Advocate General, Sir Francis Jeune, by her first husband, the late Constantine Stanley.

POPE'S SILVER JUBILEE.

Triple Tiara Will Be Given Him by the Church.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—On February 30 next, Pope Leo XIII will celebrate his pontifical silver jubilee. It is proposed on that day by the international committee having in charge the celebration that each family, parish, diocese and nation shall observe that day as a day of thanksgiving to God for the long and successful reign of his vicar. On that day a tiara of gold will be presented to the pope as "the offering of filial love from all his children," and this will be worn by him on the anniversary of his consecration March 2. The tiara is described as follows:

The three crowns will stand superimposed on high relief, representing the triple power of the papacy. The tiara is surmounted by a cross.

GERMAN WAR ESTIMATES.

Slight Decrease for Army and Navy—None for Shipbuilding.

BERLIN, Jan. 5.—The army estimates show a recurring expenditure of \$112,000,000, an increase of \$17,955 compared with 1902. The naval estimates show a recurring expenditure of \$23,530,192.50, an increase of \$1,634,223.

The nonrecurring naval expenses include \$23,160,250 for such building and armaments, an increase of \$12,250 compared

with 1902, but the total devoted to shipbuilding alone shows a decrease of \$197,752 over last year.

Extraordinary expenditures for the new harbor works at Wilhelmshaven, Kiel and Danzig will require \$250,000 increase over 1902. The bill creates one additional Admiral and 114 additional minor officers.

Among the extraordinary expenditures is the sum of \$5,750,000, of which \$3,250,000 is for fortresses and \$2,500,000 for field railroad materials.

FOR JUDICIAL SEPARATION.

Terms of Writ Against Princess—She Wants Absolute Divorce.

BERNE, Switzerland, Jan. 5.—The writ which the German Consul at Geneva purposed to serve upon the Crown Princess of Saxony is a petition for judicial separation. The document requests the Crown Princess to return to Dresden and appear January 25 before the special tribunal. The Princess, on the other hand, demands absolute divorce from the Crown Prince.

CRANK CAUSES FALSE ALARM.

When He Entered the Ellysee People Cried "Anarchist!"

PARIS, Jan. 5.—Some excitement was caused here tonight by a report that an anarchist had succeeded in entering the Ellysee Palace. Investigation showed that the man in question was an inoffensive crank named Romain, who was convinced the President would furnish him the \$200,000 to complete an invention. Romain was easily induced to go to the police hospital.

DAILY PAPER ON THE OCEAN.

Marconigrams Will Be Published on Atlantic Liner.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—According to the Daily Telegraph this morning contracts have been completed to start a daily paper to be supplied with news by the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy, on board a British liner running between Liverpool and New York. Publication will begin about the end of this month.

VICEROY'S SAY ALL IS QUIET.

Chinese Government Says Tung Is Not Raising Army.

PEKIN, Jan. 5.—The foreign police has distributed copies of telegrams received by them from the Viceroys of Kansu and Shansi Provinces, in which three districts are declared to be quiet, with no signs of hostile preparations on the part of Tung Puh Siang.

TO BEGIN DIVORCE SUIT.

Writ to Be Served on Crown Princess at Geneva.

DRESDEN, Saxony, Jan. 5.—The German Consul at Geneva has received the necessary permission to serve a writ on the Crown Princess Louise in connection with the suit for divorce brought against her by the Crown Prince of Saxony.

Gloomy Outlook in China.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 5.—The revenue derived from the maritime customs at the treaty ports of China for the year 1902 amounted to 20,000,000 taels, as against 25,500,000 taels in 1901. The year 1902 ends with large stocks of goods on hand and gloomy prospects for the import trade, owing to the continued lull in exports and the decline in the purchasing power of silver.

Illness of Senor Sagasta.

MADRID, Jan. 5.—Former Premier Sagasta is seriously ill from bronchitis, complicated by gastric complaints and fever. His temperature is high.

FIGHT ON STAFF BILL

DEMOCRAT SAYS PETTICOATS RULE THE ARMY.

Steel of Indiana Raises a Breeze When Hull Tries to Push Bill—Lack of Quorum Prevents.

POISON IN NEW YEAR GIFT

Coachman and His Wife Drink Strychnine in Whisky.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Jan. 5.—James E. Bailey, a coachman, died under mysterious circumstances last night, and indications are that he was poisoned by drinking from a small vial of whisky which contained a white sediment. On the bottle was a label completely hiding the contents and bearing the inscription, "Happy New Year. Have a drink with hand came home at 11 o'clock and after bathing remarked that he guessed he would take a drink from his New Year's gift. He drank about half an ounce and shortly after retiring he complained of cramps and remarked that he believed he had been poisoned. Mrs. Bailey aroused the neighbors, but by the time assistance arrived her husband was dead.

Mrs. Bailey states that when her husband returned home from a barn where he was employed he brought the bottle with him, but did not tell her where he got it. The police authorities are now making an investigation at the barn.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Jan. 5.—Mrs. J. E. Bailey, wife of a coachman of George N. Kilbome, was declared to be out of danger from strychnine poisoning taken into her system last night by drinking from a whisky bottle from which her husband had drunk. He died in agony at midnight. The case promises to develop one of the greatest murder mysteries in the history of the Pike's Peak region. Mrs. Bailey, since her recovery, tells a story that indicates that some one deliberately poisoned her husband by means of a bottle of whisky, given him as a New Year's present. Mrs. Bailey took a drink of the liquor after her husband had been thrown into convulsions in order to see what was in the bottle.

MONTEREY STRIKERS ARE FIRMS. LAREDO, Tex., Jan. 5.—A Monterey, Mexico, special says: "The strike situation here remains practically unchanged. The management of smelter No. 3 has offered to permit the men to return to work under old conditions, that is, the company to continue the payment of a premium for 21 days' consecutive work. The strikers, however,

who was found guilty of robbing and murdering Gee Yen, a Chinese gardener, in this city several months ago, was sentenced by Judge Holoff to serve 40 years in the penitentiary. James Young, who was with Brown at the time the crime was committed, escaped from the Ogden jail the night he was placed there and no trace has ever been found of him. He has a long criminal record in Idaho and Utah.

RETURNS TO STAND TRIAL. IOWA CITY, Ia., Jan. 5.—Mrs. Ella Gallagher, indicted two months ago on a charge of perjury growing out of her trial for the murder of her husband, returned here today and surrendered. She stated that she had been visiting relatives at Kanokas, Ill. A hired man, named Holaday, who was charged jointly with Mrs. Gallagher with committing the murder, was given a life sentence.

PRETENDER RETREATING. SULTAN IS NOW REORGANIZING ARMY TO KILL OFF REBELLION. MADRID, Jan. 5.—Premier Silveira has presented to King Alfonso official dispatches confirming the report of the retreat of the Pretender to the Moroccan throne, thus allowing the Sultan to reorganize the army and stamp out the insurrection.

KING SLIGHTLY IMPROVED. FEVER GONE, BUT HE STILL HAS CATARRH OF LUNGS. DRESDEN, Jan. 5.—A court bulletin issued today says: "The King, who has been suffering from influenza since December 18, has improved somewhat. Since January 3, he has been without fever and his appetite has been better. At the same time catarrh of the lungs, a distressing cough and restlessness at night continue."

SULTAN MAY ABDICATE. FINDS HIS BROTHER MORE POPULAR WITH FEZ CITIZENS. MADRID, Jan. 5.—A special dispatch from Tangier says the Sultan is disposed to abdicate in favor of his brother, Mulai Mohammed, who is acclaimed whenever he appears in the streets of Fez.

GERMAN EXPORTS TO UNITED STATES. BERLIN, Jan. 5.—The total exports from Germany through the American Consulates to the United States during the year 1902 amounted to \$114,666,562, an increase of \$14,578,770 over the preceding year.
