CAUCUS WILL CHOOSE HIM

Legislature Organizes and Will Hold Election Next Week—Wolcott Stays in Colorado Fight, but Combination Favors Teller.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 9.—At a caucus of Republicans held in this city to choose officers for this city to the Legislature, which meets in biennial session next Monday, Thomas Hill, of Salt Lake City, was chosen Speaker of the House on the first ballot, and E. M. Allison, Jr., of Weber County, was nominated for the Presidency of the Senate without opposition.

WILL STRIVE FOR HARMONY.

Colorado Republican Committee Called—Wolcott's Hopes Slight.

DENVER DEMANDS MADE IN DENVER.

DENVER, Jan. 9.—The demands of the members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen employed on the Colorado & Southern Railroad for an increase in wages will be presented to a committee of the board of directors at a meeting at which Mr. Dyer has promised for next Monday. It will amount to 20 per cent of the present scale in some instances.

NO STRIKE ON RAILROADS

Managers of Western Lines Say They Will Meet Demands.

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—After a conference of general managers of Western roads centering in Chicago, it is declared there will be no strike upon the various roads. It is believed the demands of the trainmen, conductors, engineers and firemen will be compromised.

MAY STRIKE IN WEST VIRGINIA.

Demand of Soft Coal Miners for Higher Wages Denied.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—According to a representative of the Chesapeake & Ohio Coal Company, a strike of the soft coal miners in West Virginia for large increases in wages will probably go into effect April 1. These miners are not thoroughly organized, said the Chesapeake & Ohio man, so the strike will not begin until President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers, gets out of the hands of the anthracite coal commission and can give his attention to the West Virginia coal field.

DEALERS IN CONSPIRACY

GRAND JURY IN CHICAGO TO INVESTIGATE COAL FAMINE.

Evidence That Mineowners and Big Dealers Are Guilty—Senate Committee Holds Inquiry.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 9.—A special grand jury will meet in Chicago tomorrow to investigate the alleged conspiracy between certain coal operators and dealers to increase the price of coal on the Chicago market.

AFTER THE BIG GAME.

Mineowners and Wholesale Dealers Are the Ones Accused.

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—To determine whether a conspiracy has existed to force up the price of coal, Judge William McDermott, on the petition of the State's Attorney Dineen, summoned a venire of 75 men of whom 23 will be selected for a special grand jury tomorrow morning. Forty witnesses named in subpoenas given to the Sheriff to serve.

SHORTAGE IN WASHINGTON.

Large Companies Sell to Small Ones to Maintain Prices.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The Senate committee on the District of Columbia today continued its investigation into the shortage of the coal supply in Washington. Joseph Crawford, general agent of the Pennsylvania Railroad, during the past year, there had been a decrease in the quantity of anthracite coal brought to Washington over his line amounting to 20 per cent, but that during the months of November and December there had been an increase over the normal receipts.

COAL STILL \$10 A TON.

Independent Operators Continue to Maintain This Price.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Domestic sales of anthracite coal were quiet at \$10 a ton at tidewater yesterday by the independent operators. By the coal-carrying roads the same grades of coal were quoted at \$5. Representatives of the big companies said there was no decrease in the amount of their coal coming to this city and none of it was being sold as independent output. The market is expected to fluctuate with the weather and the amount of anthracite on hand.

Will Supply Poor With Coal.

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—In view of the scarcity of coal and to alleviate the suffering among the poor, Swift & Co. today announced that they would go into the coal business, not only in Chicago, but also other cities where there is a coal shortage. The firm has a contract for the whole output of a mine and has been selling coal at cost to its employees. Having more coal than they require, the surplus is to be placed at the disposal of the poor. One can obtain more than a bushel at a time. The price will be: One bushel, 30 cents; half a bushel, 10 cents; a peck, five cents.

Canada May Admit Coal Free.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 9.—D. O. Gallery, M. P. of Montreal, conferred with Premier Laurier today regarding the advisability of removing the duty on anthracite coal. Sir Wilfrid promised to take the matter under consideration.

Highest Price Since the Civil War.

COSHOCTON, O., Jan. 9.—The local operators ended the strike of coal miners today by granting a 5-cent increase in wages. Retail prices have advanced to 30 cents a bushel, the highest price since the Civil War.

WRECK ON BIG FOUR.

Two Passenger Trains Collide—Firemen Killed—Three Injured.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 9.—Running at 90 miles an hour, two Big Four passenger trains collided tonight while rounding a curve between Moro and Bethalto, Ill., and so far as known up to 1:30 o'clock, one fireman was killed and three others seriously injured. Information is meager, owing to the isolation of the wreck. Some reports say that many passengers were hurt, but a message to the Associated Press by long-distance telephone at 1 o'clock from a witness to the effect that all the passengers had escaped with minor bruises.
