Editor Gonzales Wounded to Death.

BY LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

Street of Columbia, S. C., Scene of Blood-Letting.

RESULT OF POLITICAL FEUD

Nepew of Senator Tillman Draws Revolver and, Without a Word, Shoots Down Editor of the State—Death is Probable.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 15.—In the very shadow of the South Carolina Statehouse Lieutenant-Governor James H. Tillman this afternoon shot and probably mortally wounded Narciso Goner Gonzales, founder and editor of the Columbia State, a newspaper which has since its inception bitterly opposed the so-called Tillman faction in South Carolina politics.

Gonzales is of Spanish descent, being the son of Ambrose Jose Gonzales, who, with Narios Lopez, began the struggle for Cuban independence in 1848. He is 45 years old. He himself served in the ranks of the Cuban insurrection in 1895. He organized the Columbia State newspaper in 1891 and has been always a bitter opponent of the Tillman faction in South Carolina politics.

In a statement before the operation Mr. Gonzales made it plain that he sought no difficulty; that to avoid collision with Tillman, who was walking with two Senators, he cut across the pavement and passed by without touching or speaking to him.

Gonzales said he saw Tillman two days before and Tillman said he had not done so and he was positive Tillman fired before he said a word.

At midnight the surgeons issued the following bulletin as to Gonzales' condition: "Pulse, 121; respiration, 31; resting easily."

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 15.—At 1:15 this morning the hospital bulletin on the condition of Mr. Gonzales read:

"Pulse, 113; respiration, 30; temperature, 99.5. Mr. Gonzales is sleeping quietly."

Chances 90 Per Cent for Death. COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 16, 4 A. M.—The physicians in attendance on Gonzales say he is resting quietly but that the chances for recovery are 90 per cent against him.

ONE GINE OBSTACLE

DEMOCRATIC FILIBUSTERS ALONE CAN DEFEAT TREATY.

IF THEY TALK DOWN JUSTICE TO CUBA, Extra Session Will Be Called and Republicans Carry It Through.

ORIGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash., Jan. 15.—If Justice is not granted to Cuba in accordance with the promises of President McKinley and the efforts of President Roosevelt, it will be on account of the opposition of Democratic Senators.

It is generally believed now that every Republican Senator will support the treaty. The beet-sugar interests are appraised by the amendments that have been made, and they have decided that it will be much better to have the question settled than to continue the fight longer.

While it was never brought out before, yet there was a feeling that the Democrats did not really want Cuban reciprocity. The Florida fruit interests and the Southern tobacco interests have been opposing the treaty quietly, and now openly.

Yet these Southern Senators give technical reasons almost exclusively for their opposition to the treaty. Whether they would be able to hold it up doubtful, as the Republicans seem determined to put it through.

COMMITTEE AMENDS TREATY. Grants Beet-Sugar Men's Demands and Increases Preference to Cattle.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The Senate committee on foreign relations today agreed to report the Cuban reciprocity treaty to the Senate with two amendments. The first is a further reduction of the sugar tariff, which was adopted yesterday, and the other makes a reduction of 40 per cent of the beet-sugar tariff.

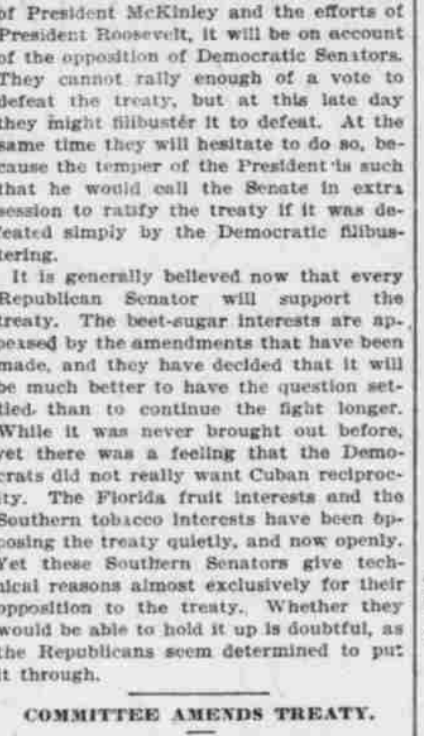

FOR INDIANS OF OREGON. New Building at Chemawa-Klamath Treaty to Be Ratified.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash., Jan. 15.—Senator Mitchell today offered an amendment to the Indian appropriation bill providing for new buildings at the Chemawa School as follows:

Brick dormitory, \$15,000; brick hospital, \$15,000; building for employes, \$200,000. He also offered an amendment to the bill a provision for the ratification of the treaty with the Klamath Indians and the payment to them of \$37,000 for lands which they are to relinquish to the Government. After paying just debts from this fund, the amendment provides the balance, together with \$250,000, shall be paid to the Indians or expended for their benefit by the Secretary of Interior, payments not to exceed 10 per cent of the fund per annum.
