# WHEAT GOES HIGHER

Market Advancing Under Demand From Australia,

### AN ORDER RECEIVED FOR CLUB

Crop Prospects in Argentina and Elsewhere-Review of the Past Week in Local Markets-Other Market News.

Under continued inquiry from Australia the wheat market is slowly but steadily climbing-Prices are firm at the moment, club being worth 73c and bluestem \$2c for exporting purposes. One shipper who is buying for Australian account is credited with paying an adwance over these figures, and millers generally order to get wheat to keep their mills running. No new business is being worked for the United Kingdom, ruling prices in the Northwest being prohibitive. A somewhat uncertain factor of the future Australian trade is the possibility of importers there buying in Argentina. Heretofore the Australians would not touch the South American wheat, any more than they would buy club wheat here, taking only our bluestem. A change has evidently come over their views, as the Euphrosyne, just chartered

pect of an enormous Argentine surplus has caused no selling pressure of American wheat, and operators in this country are still inclined to take the bullish side, believing that the demand on America for choice dry wheat for mixing with the rather poor Western Europe stock will necessarily continue throughout the season. Reports from other foreign countries show no material change in the grain situation. In nearly all parts of Europe, with the exception of portions of Russia, the crops are Wintering well and give satisfactory promise. In this country the various state reports and the Government weather report show Winter wheat to be in fine condition, although growing somewhat too rapidly under the fine weather. What injury is reported is in scattered districts and not sufficient to give the crop plarmist a chance to make his appearance.

The local market for other cereals has ruled quiet through the week. Oats have been particularly dull, and the tendency is toward a lower level. Barley is not active.

Hops are slower, after a period of activity following the opening of the new year. The sales lately made show that full values are being maintained. Twenty-seven cents has been offered at Valley points.

The produce trade was not entirely satisfactory throughout the week, the unsteady demand being attributed to the variable weather. The market is sufficiently stocked with all reen stuff proper at this season. Saturday's surplus included a car of cabbage, celery and pound; difflower from Southern California. The sweet potatoes now coming up are superior to those received earlier in the season. A cur of ananas arrived Sunday. Poultry cleaned up in a manner satisfactory to all concerned. SELLS UP TO SEVENTY-NINE CENTS AT CHICAGO.

Unlimited Supply of Buying Orders With Commission Houses-All Advices Ballish.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—There was an active rade in wheat and higher prices were realized, the May delivery making a new record for the crop by sciling up to The.
