Colorado Democrats Still Unable to Elect.

EFFORTS TO COMPROMISE FAIL

Blasphemy Member Turns Up, but Another Disappears—Republicans Claim Support of Governor—Senate Chamber Fortified.

DENVER, Jan. 23.—The joint session of the Democratic members of the two houses of the Legislature has been continuous today except for two hours, from 2 o'clock P. M. when adjournment was taken to permit the Democratic members to attend the meeting of the House, until 4 o'clock, when the joint session was again called to order.

Again today action on the Senate bill which, by the absence of one man, Representative Kelly, of Montezuma County, who could not be found yesterday, was present today, but disappeared this morning, and the bill disappeared at a late hour had not been found.

Caucuses and conferences have been held during the day by the different factions, but no settlement of the deadlock appears in sight.

At 10:30 o'clock a ballot for United States Senator was taken in the joint session of the Democratic Senators and Representatives. It was necessary to send for Senators Bailey and Hill, who are sick, and they were brought to the State capitol in a carriage.

The House, which had adjourned on Wednesday until 2 o'clock today, only a brief session this afternoon. No bill was taken towards unseating any more Democrats. A motion to adjourn until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning was carried by a vote of 26 to 22. Most of the Democrats voted for the adjournment, while the Wolcott men lined up in opposition.

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GOOD DAY FOR OUTSIDERS

It is stated that while in America a large sum was offered him by a wealthy New York capitalist for the series of paintings representing Napoleon's invasion of Russia.

IRISH MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

First Conviction for Treason in Many Years is That of Man Who Fought for Boers.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Colonel Arthur Lynch, member of Parliament for Galway, was today found guilty of high treason, and was sentenced to death.

When the trial was resumed today, counsel for the Crown summed up. There was no attempt to deny that Colonel Lynch supported the Boers, but counsel contended that his naturalization was in no way prompted by treasonable motives, but solely for the advantage he would thus secure for journalistic purposes. Subsequently the defendant actively supported the Boer cause in the field, and was a legally naturalized burglar.

Replying for the prosecution, the Solicitor-General, Sir Edward Carson, maintained that Colonel Lynch joined the Boer Army as a disaffected traitor, "in order by committing a most cowardly and most serious act of treason." His naturalization, continued the Solicitor-General, was only a flimsy pretext. Counsel then proceeded to detail the prisoner's alleged acts of adherence to his country's enemies.

The Lord Chief Justice summed up very briefly. He said that if in war time a British subject is found to be aiding the enemy, whatever his purpose, he was guilty of an unlawful act. Naturalization during war time afforded no excuse whatever for subsequent acts. There was abundant evidence to show overt acts in aiding the King's enemies.

Lynch throughout bore himself with unflattering composure. He walked out steadily between the jailers and past the bench where his wife and child were seated. Mrs. Lynch has been given permission to see her husband.

Don't Make Lynch a Martyr.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—The newspapers this morning take it for granted that the sentence passed upon Colonel Lynch will be commuted. They say that a punishment should be inflicted exemplary enough to act as a deterrent upon others, but not sufficiently severe to make Lynch a martyr.

ALL ARE OF SAME MIND.

Every Irishman in Parliament Sympathetic With Boers.

Great Friends in Bucharest.

BUCHAREST, Jan. 23.—Two high officials of the Ministry of Finance have been arrested on the charge of defrauding the government out of several hundred thousands of francs through the drawings of government bonds. Two local bankers are accused of connivance in the frauds. One of them has been arrested, and the other has disappeared. The officials are M. Parisius, vice-president of the M. Dimitrescu, departmental head of the Department of Service and Public Debt.

Crown Prince to Rule Sweden.

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 23.—King Oscar has decided temporarily to intrust the Government of the country to the Crown Prince Gustaf, who will take over the regency next week. This action of the King is taken as a result of medical advice. He has abandoned his projected trip to Norway.
