KING'S ILLNESS AND HITCH IN VEN-EZUELAN AFFAIR INFLUENCES.

Wenkness of New York Central One of the Depressing Factors-Sterling Exchange Is Strong.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.-The professional elenent contested the apathetic condition of the stock market today, and developed some show of strength and activity before the close of the day. There was a very meager outside followhig, and very little news on which to base the


