Domestic government securities were slightly higher, while foreign loans were, to some extent, lower, owing to realization sales. Spaniarde advanced upon purchases from Paris and Spain. A Hamburg house has just chartered a ship to carry old iron to the United States. Coal shares continue to display a weak tendency. Electrical shares were unusually strong, upon the in-creasing number of orders from manufac-turing companies. Cement shares showed a further rise, while transactions in ma-chinery stock were irregular.


