

NEW BRIDGE BILL

The Multnomah Delegation Changes Its Plans.

PROPOSES SPECIAL ELECTION

Morrison-Street Bridge Bill to Be Brought Up in New Form—Bonds to Be Issued and City & Suburban to Pay Rental.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special).—The Multnomah delegation decided tonight to have the Morrison-street bridge bill amended as follows:

That the question whether the bridge shall be rebuilt shall be submitted to a special election. That the Executive Board of the city shall perform the functions of the Bridge Commission provided for in the present bill.

That the Executive Board shall be empowered in its discretion to make a contract with the City & Suburban Railway Company whereby that company shall surrender its present franchise on the bridge for a new franchise whose duration shall not be beyond the limit of the present blanket railway franchises.

That that company pay 5 cents for the trip of each car across the bridge, and that the minimum charge be \$12.00 per year.

That if the Executive Board cannot make a contract with the company, it be authorized to condemn the present franchise.

That if such condemnation proceedings are successful, the company pay 5 cents per trip of each car. That some bank of Portland be designated by the board as treasurer of the fund.

That the board issue \$400,000 in bonds, or so much thereof as may be necessary, at 4 per cent to run 30 years.

That the new franchise be terminated should the new bridge be destroyed.

That the special election be within 90 days after the bill becomes a law.

That if the board cannot induce the City & Suburban Railway Company to give up its present franchise or if that franchise cannot be revoked by condemnation, the new bridge project be abandoned.

That other companies which may use the new bridge pay 5 cents per car for each trip.

The Bellwood and Albina ferry questions will be submitted to an election to take place in June, 1904.

Two Port of Portland bills before the delegation were postponed until next Monday night.

Several Portland citizens met the delegation, among them being Tyler Woodward and C. F. Swigert, of the City & Suburban Railway Company; W. L. Boke, F. H. Newhall, S. E. Joseph and F. W. Mulkey.

The railway representatives discussed the existing power of the company and convinced the delegation that \$15,000 a year was too high a price for the new franchise. The delegation was in session until 1 A. M.

WANTED HIS AMENDMENTS. Representative Gault Couldn't See Why Everybody Laughed.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special).—"Where are my amendments? They are all left out."

Representative Gault founched around on the floor of the House and got real angry. Orton's bill to prescribe forms of petitions and methods of elections under the initiative and referendum was up for passage.

"Where are my amendments to that bill?" he asked in a still louder voice, and the House roared with laughter. Speaker Harris brought back order with his gavel and Gault sputtered indignantly, "Somebody has played a trick on me," and he looked around wildly for the amendments.

CUPID PLAYS PRANKS AT STATE UNIVERSITY.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 12.—A little episode connected with student life has just taken place at the university and has excited no little amount of interest and gossip among the students. It would not be looked upon as extraordinary for seniors to fall desperately in love, nor would the average student think much about it, if occasionally he would find some of the lower classes manifestly in love, but the rub comes when it is publicly announced that a sophomore has actually married a freshman.

For the past few years Baker City has had in attendance at the university a goodly number of students, among whom can always be found some who surpass the ordinary student. V. V. Sparks, a young man from Baker City, came to the university last year and took up a course in mining engineering. Among the new students from Baker City this year was Miss Daisy Nelson, a very charming young lady. Before the end of the year in attendance two weeks a number of young gentlemen had begun to take special interest in her. But when Sparks arrived a week later everybody said that he was the man and it was useless for others to come near. From his arrival, Sparks was a constant, daily caller.

But a surprising event took place just before the Christmas holidays. When Miss Nelson told her girl friends that she was so lonesome and homesick that she must return home. Soon after she reached Baker City, she decided that it rained too much at Eugene and that she would return if she did not remain in college. Sparks continued and took his mid-year examinations during the first week of February. But as there were several days before the second semester he left immediately for his home. As soon as he reached his destination, letters were received by students in Eugene announcing that Sparks had come in the morning of matrimony and that the bride-to-be was Miss Nelson. Mr. and Mrs. Sparks arrived in Eugene Tuesday night and when Mr. Sparks made his appearance on the campus Wednesday morning wearing a broad grin, he was greeted with a multitude of hearty handshakes and awkward congratulations. However, he appeared not in the least embarrassed, realizing the fact that he had just married a freshman. Mrs. Sparks may again become homesick, and the climate may be too damp for her, yet Mr. and Mrs. Sparks will reside in Eugene and that was the end of the matter.

DIES FROM OPERATION.

George H. Adams Well-Known Eastern Oregon Young Man.

ADAMS, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special).—George H. Adams died yesterday at Walla Walla Hospital from the effects of the amputation of his leg, made necessary by a gunshot wound.

On Monday, February 2, while George Adams and John W. Johnson were out hunting ducks the gun of John Adams was accidentally discharged, the full charge striking his brother in the left leg just above the knee. Physicians cleaned the wound and removed one gun wad and several shot at the time of the accident. On Tuesday evening he was taken to the hospital at Walla Walla, and on Thursday he was operated on by Dr. W. W. Withers above the wound and another gun wad and shot were removed. It was then seen that there was danger of blood-poisoning. The doctors finally performed a third operation on Thursday and Friday decided that an amputation was necessary. This was performed on yesterday afternoon, but he never rallied from the anesthetic. He died at 10 o'clock of the late John F. Adams. He was only 21 years of age and a young man of great promise. He left a mother, two brothers, John, of Adams, Walter, a student at the University of Oregon, and a sister, Helen. He will be buried at Walla Walla Sunday.

(Young Adams was last year graduated with honors from McMinnville College, where he won many honors in athletics and other student enterprises. He was a member of the college football team for several years, and was also a footcrazer of considerable ability. Mr. Sawyer, a splendid physique and was especially fond of outdoor sports, although he was a most diligent student. He was a nephew of Hon. Henry Adams, a member of the Oregon Legislature.)

BIG ELECTRIC PLANT.

Eagle Falls Enterprise Nearly Completed.

BAKER CITY, Feb. 12.—(Special).—The work of constructing the Eagle Falls electric power plant is now well under way. It will be some months yet before the plant is completed. When finished it will be one of the largest electric power plants in the state. The water power capacity of Eagle Creek, from which the water will be taken to drive the generating dynamo, is 10,000 horsepower. A large wooden flume, 100 feet long, 10 feet wide and five feet deep, will carry the water from the dam to the generating power-house. Over 1000 feet of this flume has been completed, and most of the poles for the transmission line between this city and Sparta have been distributed.

The substations already provided for include Baker City, La Grande, Union and the Columbia mine. There will be 107 miles of transmission wire used in the main lines, not to mention the wire for distributing the current throughout the various cities.

HIRES ITS OWN LAWYER.

Seattle Grand Jury Resents Interference of Business Men.

SEATTLE, Feb. 12.—The grand jury was in session two hours today, and the time was taken up in discussing the offer of the business men to furnish a special counsel to conduct the work of the jury. The offer was unceremoniously turned down. Several of the jurors looked upon the action of the business men as an unwarranted interference, and the fact that a lawyer was agreed upon without consulting the grand jury hurt the feelings of some of them.

As a result of the conference, it is practically decided that the grand jury will not consent to have an outside attorney employed to attend to their work.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 12.—(Special).—Jesse Schaffer, a German baker, was arrested this morning for shoplifting. He admitted taking clothing from the store of Ralph E. Gulchard to the extent of \$80. It is alleged Schaffer has been plying his trade for the past month.
