Slight Prospects of Any Agreement.

DEMOCRATS STAND IN WAY

Republican Senators Agree on Compromise.

IS A QUESTION OF POPULATION

Parties Disagree as to Number of People Necessary to Make Arizona Separate State—Democrats Want Date Fixed.

The Republican Senators have agreed on a compromise on the statehood bill, and have submitted it to the Democrats. It is expected that the Democrats will reject it and submit a counter proposition.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—All day there has been talk of compromise on the statehood bill. It was generally understood that what was known as the Spooner compromise, being the two-state bill drawn by the Wisconsin Senator, would be satisfactory to the Republicans. The terms of this compromise have been given heretofore, save that the provision for the State of Montana provides that before Arizona can be set off as a separate state the population of Montana must be 700,000, of which 300,000 should be in Arizona.

The Democrats, while talking in a conciliatory spirit, said that they had little hope that the Republican proposition would be acceptable to them. It is quite likely that, when this proposition is submitted, the Democrats will have a conference. Probably a counter-proposition then will be made providing that, when Arizona has a population which is the average for a Representative in Congress, it shall be admitted as a state, and also that a census shall be taken every year. The Democrats say that they want a provision fixing the date which will bring Arizona into the Union. This would not be satisfactory to the Republicans. While the efforts toward a compromise continue, there are only a few Senators who expect an adjustment to be reached, and the prospects for statehood legislation are still remote.

There was an earnest conference in the Senate chamber after adjournment, participated in by Senators Aldrich, Quay, Hanna, Foraker, McCumber, Heyer, and Keane, when it was definitely decided that propositions for a compromise on two states should be submitted to the Democrats. Senator Quay presented a memorandum of the important features of the compromise to Senator Hale, who will present it to a conference of Democrats called for 10 o'clock tomorrow. It is expected that the Republican proposition will be rejected and a counter-proposition made. Democratic leaders say they cannot accept the compromise suggested and the Republicans say that no further concessions will be made.

PLACES FOR LAME DUCKS.

Roosevelt Will Be Generous With Defeated Members of Congress. OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 23.—Unless all signs fail, President Roosevelt is going to be nearly as liberal as was President McKinley in taking care of the lame ducks whose terms in Congress end with the present session. Already Turner has been provided for, and there is an intimation that Jones of Arkansas and Harris of Kansas will be given places on the Indian Bureau. Commissioner Just what will be done for Republican Senators that retire is not yet known, although Pritchard of North Carolina and Deboe of Kentucky are both candidates for something that will give them a salary. Mason of Illinois does not expect anything at the hands of the Administration. It is intimated that Henderson is going to get something, and also that Lord of California and Mercer of Nebraska will be taken care of, the latter with a position on some court in the District of Columbia.

Morris of Minnesota has been given a judgeship in his state.

There is always a pressure by "exes" and their friends for this sort of care when their services are no longer wanted by their constituents. A great many Senators and Representatives object seriously to the importunities of men who are going out of Congress for support in order to get good positions. Two years ago, at the close of Congress, President McKinley took care of McBride of Oregon, Thurston of Nebraska, Carter of Montana, Lindsey of Kentucky and Allen of Mississippi, on the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Commission. Rodenburg of Illinois was given a place on the Civil Service Commission, and Herman of Oregon was taken care of six years ago. Each succeeding Congress has seen some of the Congressional lame ducks have to secure Federal patronage. Of course, all of the lame ducks cannot be taken care of, but it is observed that the most prominent among the defeated very often catch onto a fat position in the Federal service.

HOUSE INSISTS ON RIGHTS.

Maintains That Cuban Treaty Must Be Ratified There Also. OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 23.—There is some discussion among members of the House of Representatives about insulating the rights of the House to take part in any treaty legislation which affects the tariff. It has been suggested that a resolution should be passed by the House declaring that any treaty which contains tariff legislation should have the sanction of the House before it can become operative.

While this may be put through, and may be attempted, some doubt exists

among Republican members whether it would be good policy or not, as it might embarrass the Administration at this stage of the proceedings. Some members of the House are apprehensive that the President, in case the Cuban treaty is ratified without being passed upon by the House, or in a special session of the Senate, will at once put the treaty in operation. In which event there might be a Supreme Court decision. If this decision should sustain the Government, it would mean that the President and the Senate could legislate upon tariff questions through reciprocity treaties. The House is determined to hold its right to originate revenue legislation, and that is why there is talk of a declaratory resolution. If the statehood tangle could be straightened out perhaps the Cuban treaty would be passed in time for the House to confirm it, which would obviate any difficulties which are now apprehended.

COULD NOT MAKE GOOD.

Simon Secures Nothing for Oregon in Public Building Bill. OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 23.—Although a member of the public buildings committee, Senator Simon was not able to "make good" and secure in the omnibus bill reported and passed today any provision whatever for Oregon. It had been expected that he would secure sites at least for both Oregon City and Baker City, but nothing appears. The corn and Spokane each get \$400,000, as in the House bill.

WOULD CUT LOOSE FROM BRYAN.

Democrats Want No More Kansas City Platform and Favor Parker. BEEF TRUST IS MATURE.

Packers Find a Way to Get Around Decisions of Courts.

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—The Post today says: Plans practically are complete for the merging of the interests of the firms that comprise the beef trust. Unless something unforeseen arises, April 1, will see the official announcement of the incorporation of a securities holding company which eventually may control the meat trade of the world. Unlike the popular idea of the packers' merger, however, for the time being it is not to embrace everything in sight, nor is it to be capitalized at \$500,000,000 as announced. Further, the plans contemplate no friction with the Federal courts because of the recent decision by Judge Grosscup against the packing-house combination. The nucleus of the great combination of the world-wide interest is the merging of the smaller independent plants bought last year by the big packers' plan. The merger is planned at that time. The securities to be held by the new corporation are those of G. H. Hammond Packing Company, the Omaha Packing Company, the Anglo-American Packing Company, the St. Louis Beef Company and the United States Dressed Beef Company, and possibly several of the outside stockholders now controlled by Chicago interests. NATION HONORS MEMORY OF GEORGE WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The War Department has sent notices to the Governors of each state that it is prepared to supply them upon demand and according to their legal allowances with "riot cartridges." This is a new form of ammunition prepared by the experts of the Ordnance Bureau to enable officers of the law and soldiers to repel rioters with the least possible loss of life to the innocent bystander. The shell is like the regular shell used in the Army rifle, with the important exception that instead of the long nickel-plated and steel-cased bullet, two balls are placed in the mouth. The design was apparently to secure something of greater range than buckshot, yet not dangerous to persons at a distance.

FOUND NOTHING WRONG.

House Committee on Coal Transportation Reports at Last.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The subcommittee of the House committee on merchant marine and fisheries that went to Boston to investigate the subject of coal transportation reported to the full committee today the results of the investigation.

The report of the subcommittee recited among other things:

The evidence taken satisfied the subcommittee that there was no question as to the sufficiency of tonnage for water transportation. The subcommittee invited testimony and suggestions from all parties interested. There was no evidence before the subcommittee that might be regarded as a deficiency in the manner of water transportation between the terminal coal ports and New England. Nothing appeared that would justify a favorable report on the resolution that gave rise to this inquiry, although it is true that during its pendency there had been a material change in conditions. The committee reported that no deficiency existed in the matter of terminal facilities.

The report reviews the conditions found from the evidence to have existed, but upon the question as to whether any understanding between the coal roads and coal operators existed the subcommittee expresses no opinion. Owing to the fact that the session is so near an end the subcommittee finds it impossible to continue the investigation.

COST OF NEW DEPARTMENT.

Cortelyou Asks \$75,000 for Rent and \$7,000,000 for Building.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—A scheme for the organization of the new Department of Commerce and Labor has been laid before Congress by Secretary Cortelyou in the estimates transmitted to that body today, through the Secretary of the Treasury. In addition to the 12 branches of the public service transferred to the new department, the other departments which have been provided for, Secretary Cortelyou asks for appropriations for salaries aggregating \$60,000. The salaries of the Secretary's office, the Bureau of Corporations and Manufactures and subordinate divisions.

In addition to the salaries are estimates of \$15,000 for rent, \$10,000 for contingent expenses, \$100,000 for traveling expenses of examiners, \$50,000 for printing and binding, including \$20,000 for the census office.

In his recommendation for a building for the department, Secretary Cortelyou urges that the future growth of the department be considered. He asks for \$7,000,000 for the building, exclusive of the site.
