Many New Land Officials Soon in Oregon.

DELEGATION MAKING SLATE

NAMED AFTER THE BRAVE. Official Designation of Military Camps in Philippines.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Major-General Davis, commanding the Department of the Philippines, has designated the temporary military stations established in the vicinity of the places named below as follows:

At Bayambang, Province of Pangasinan, as Camp Greig, in honor of the late Captain J. C. Greig, Fourth Infantry, who was killed in action in 1899, near Marikina, at San Fernando, Province of the First Division, in honor of the late First Lieutenant John Morrison, Jr., Fourth Cavalry, who was killed in action near Gapan, in 1901; that near Angeles, Province of Pampanga, as Camp Stoenburg, in honor of the late Captain J. M. Stoenburg, Sixth Cavalry, who was killed in action at Quingua, in 1899, while serving as Colonel of the First Nebraska Volunteer Infantry; that near Buesay, Island of Guimaras, as Camp Jossman, in honor of the late Second Lieutenant Albert L. Jossman, Twenty-seventh Infantry, who was mortally wounded in 1901, in the battle of Bataan; that near Calbayog, Samar, as Camp Connel, in honor of the late Captain Thomas W. Connel, Ninth Infantry, who was killed in action at Balanga, in 1901, and that near Ormoc, Leyte, as Camp Downes, in honor of the late First Lieutenant Edward Downes, First Infantry, who was killed in action near Salogdo in 1901.

SMUGGLERS ON A TRANSPORT. Silk, Silver and Liquors From Hong Kong Seized at Manila.

MANILA, March 10.—Collector Shuster has seized a quantity of silk, silver and liquors brought from Hong Kong on the United States transport Eward, but not recorded on the manifest, and has ordered the arrest of Captain Harry Chamberlain and the quartermaster, who were in charge of the transport. The goods were purchased in Hong Kong at the request of prominent Army officers, who say they had no knowledge of the plan to conceal their cargo. The officers say they are determined to put a stop to it.

Editor Convicted of Libel. Manila, March 10.—William Crozier, editor of the American, with a reporter of the paper, was arrested March 2 on the charge of libeling General E. C. Baker, commander of the American troops, has been convicted, but not sentenced.

MAY USE CAR TRACK. Pedestrians Have Rights Motorcars Are Bound to Respect.

ST. LOUIS, March 10.—In the United States Court of Appeals an opinion handed down by Judge Thayer, concurred in by the other judges, has affirmed the right of pedestrians and vehicles to use the tracks of street railways at any point between the regular crossings, and to use the tracks for any distance for a matter of safety or convenience where they do not unnecessarily interfere with or obstruct the passage of the cars.

GREET'S ENGLISH CATHOLICS. Pope Leo Receives Loyal Address and Says He Is Well.

ROME, March 10.—The pope today received the Duke of Norfolk and a delegation of British Catholics, who presented him with greetings and offerings. The Duke read a loyal address, which the pope answered, expressing his appreciation. The pontiff looked very well, considering his late illness. He said he felt quite himself again.

ENORMOUS COST OF WAR. Vast Sums Which Britain Pays for Army and Navy.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Mr. Brodricke, who is in charge of the British war estimates, says the Tribune's London representative have never been approached except in time of war, and the navy estimates, which exceed the current year's figures by \$150,000,000, are the result of the fact that the total national expenditures will reach \$150,000,000. The outlook for the British taxpayer is gloomier than ever.

BRODRICK STANDS FIRM. Declares Army He Asks is Necessary to Empire's Defense.

LONDON, March 10.—The House of Commons today, in committee of the whole, commenced the debate on the army estimates. War Secretary Brodricke began by firmly announcing that the government intended to fight it out on the proposition to make the estimates \$55,387 men of all

FORTY YEARS MARRIED

KING EDWARD AND HIS QUEEN CELEBRATE EVENT.

Anniversary Observed With Family Dinner at Which Children and Grandchildren Are Gathered.

LONDON, March 10.—The 40th anniversary of the marriage of King Edward and Queen Alexandra was celebrated today with the customary supper and a ringing of bells. Their Majesties received many telegrams of congratulation from public bodies.

There was a family dinner at Buckingham Palace tonight which was attended by the Prince and Princess of Wales and all the royal family. For the private dinner which followed 400 invitations were issued. The atmosphere was beautifully decorated with flowers. There was a total absence of crushing, which is usually the result at state dinners when a couple of thousand invitations are out.

SOCIALISTS ATTACK KAISER. Allege Sympathy With Dueling and Question Military Skill.

BERLIN, March 10.—Herr Bebel, the Socialist leader, during the debate on the military budget in the Reichstag, said the higher classes of society were in a state of permanent conspiracy against law and religion. So far as dueling was concerned, all the military courts and the fixed opinion of the military class, including His Majesty, regarded dueling as necessary in the army, notwithstanding the Reichstag's resolutions on the subject and against the weight of public opinion. The Socialist leader then spoke on the unfavorable criticism of the Kaiserhoff maneuvers in the French and English press as well as high German military writers.

TO LEGALIZE HER MARRIAGE. Struggle of American Princess to Obtain Approval of Church.

ROME, March 10.—The Congregation of the Propaganda has received from Bishop O'Connell of Portland, Me., his report on the investigation he made into the marriage of the Princess Rosalige, formerly Reid of Washington, with her divorced husband, Colonel Parkhurst, of Bangor, Me. The Princess wishes to have her marriage with Colonel Parkhurst annulled and thus have it annulled by the church in order to pave the way for a church recognition of her marriage with Prince Rosalige, and an authorization for a religious ceremony here. Bishop O'Connell, in making his report, does not give an opinion, so that the congregation must itself settle the dispute.

EXECUTION OF BOXERS. Chinese Government Beheads Them and Displays Their Head.

PEKING, March 10.—Yuan Shih Kai, governor of Chi Li Province, having informed that the Boxer organization has resumed activity in the eastern part of the province, dispatched troops who drilled at night in a town 100 miles east of Peking. The Boxers were dispersed after a dozen of them and several soldiers had been killed.

FAMINE IN DALMATIA. People Eat Bark and Wild Herbs—Measures of Relief.

VIENNA, March 10.—The distress in Dalmatia is so severe that the people in parts of that province are reported to be subsisting on the bark of trees and on wild herbs. A committee has been formed in Vienna to raise funds for the relief of the sufferers and the Croatian Archeological Society has started excavating at the Dalmatian village of Plavno, where interesting discoveries are expected, the immediate object being to provide work for the famine-stricken inhabitants of the commune of Knin.

BANKER SENT TO JAIL. Sentence on German Who Falsified His Accounts.

LEIPZIG, March 10.—After a second trial lasting three weeks, Herr Exener, manager of the Leipziger Bank, was today sentenced to four years and six months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$500 for falsification of accounts and attempted fraud, the charge of fraudulent bankruptcy having been dropped. The Empire's demands were ever increasing and the proposed estimate would not be well calculated for the colonies, frontiers and for home defense, in the event of the country being called upon to defend the frontiers, which would always be liable to occur.

PROMOTER IN HOT WATER. Prosecution of Whittaker Wright Ordered by English Court.

LONDON, March 10.—Justice Buckley, in the chancery division of the High Court of Justice this morning, made an order directing the official receiver, as liquidator of the London & Globe Finance Corporation, Ltd., to prosecute criminally Whittaker Wright, well-known promoter, and utilize the assets of the London & Globe Company to pay the costs of the prosecution.

Whittaker Wright was head of the London & Globe Finance Corporation, which organized the establishment of the British-American Corporation, which bought the Rio and other noted mines at Roseland, B. S. and turned them over to other corporations, of which the stock was held in England. The failure of the London & Globe a year ago caused a panic on the London Stock Exchange a year ago, and a special investigation revealed many irregularities. The late Marquis of Dufferin was nominal head of the company and was a heavy loser, and the trouble arising from the failure is said to have hastened his death. He has been Governor-General of Canada and Viceroy of India.

FOREIGN POLICY OF FRANCE. Nationalist Deputy Course for Last Thirty Years.

PARIS, March 10.—The Chamber of Deputies devoted its sessions today to the discussion of interpellations on the foreign policy of the government, to which Minister Delcasse will reply tomorrow. The Nationalist Deputy Lucien Millevoye opened the debate by a review of the whole international action on the part of France for 30 years past. He argued that the armed peace of Europe originated in two great errors—the treaties of Frankfurt and Berlin. He argued the establishment of a Latin alliance between France, Italy and Spain, and attacked the policy which excluded the Transvaal from The Hague arbitration conference. The speaker blamed France for watching in silence the massacre of the Armenians, and expressed the hope that she would not observe the same attitude toward the Macedonian question. Her diplomacy, he said, must do its duty and must not fail in what has been the glory of France through the course of centuries.

Germany Needs No New Guns. Berlin, March 10.—In the Reichstag today Herr Bebel, the Socialist leader, inquired whether the government intended to equip the army with new field artillery.

War Minister von Gossler replied: "Our present gun is the result of many years of experiment and it is not a question of a new gun. We have only ordered experiments with a reversible gun carriage.

Chancellor and the Lord Chief Justice, in supporting the adoption of the bill, commented on the increase in the evil and declared that in the interest of morality in business it was necessary to do something to check it.

Americans Buy Swedish Copper Mines. Ostersund, Sweden, March 10.—The Slangelet copper fields, which extend on each side of the boundary between Norway and Sweden, have been sold to an American company for \$1,000,000.

To Stop Bribery in Business. London, March 10.—In the House of Lords today the prevention of corruption bill, which makes it a penal offense to offer or to accept gifts or bribes with the view of influencing business, passed its second reading. The proposed act is similar to a bill introduced in Parliament

Cyclone Wrecks Australian Town. Brisbane, Queensland, March 10.—Townsville, North Queensland, has been visited by a cyclone, in which many persons were killed or injured. A part of the hospital building collapsed during the storm, killing six persons. Schools, churches and residences were destroyed, and many of the inhabitants have been rendered homeless.
