

SENATE DAY FOR VOTE

Senate Will at Last End Debate on Canal Treaty.

TERMS REACHED WITH MORGAN

He Agrees to Stop Talking and Allow Vote on Tuesday, on Condition That His Speech Be Published—Move to Amend Rules.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—An agreement was reached in the Senate today that a vote shall be taken on the ratification of the Panama Canal treaty on Tuesday. Voting on the amendments will begin on Monday. Senator Morgan agreed to this arrangement with the understanding that his speech should be published in the Record. He continued the speech in the executive session today.

The Democratic Senators are making an effort under the leadership of Senator Gorman to reach an agreement upon amendments to the treaty to be supported by them, and each one has been asked to give his views upon this point. So far substantial unanimity has been expressed in favor of a modification of article 2, so as to place the control of the canal in American hands. There is general complaint among the Democrats that the provisions of that article preclude the possibility of protecting the canal by American arms in case the necessity for so doing should arise. It is said, however, that no amendments will be offered by the Democrats at this time, authorizing the committee on rules to re-examine the rules of the Senate with the view of ascertaining what changes, if any, are necessary, and especially to make inquiry whether it is expedient in any way limit debate in the Senate, and if so, to what extent. The resolution further provides that the committee is authorized to sit during the recess of the Senate, and is directed to submit a report to the Senate of its conclusions as soon as practicable after the beginning of the session next December. The resolution was referred to the committee to audit and control the contingent expenses of the Senate.

Mr. (Max) explained the need of a manual of parliamentary law, and said he would at a later date introduce a resolution directing the committee on rules also to consider this question.

The manuscript copy of the Cuban constitutional convention, the several orders and circulars of the Department of Cuba, etc., were ordered returned to the War Department.

CUBA RATIFIES TREATY

Lively Debate in Island Senate Precedes Final Vote.

HAVANA, March 11.—The Senate today, by a vote of 16 to 8, ratified the reciprocity treaty with the United States. The treaty was thus ratified by exactly two-thirds of the vote of the Senate.

Fifteen Republican Conservatives, or Administration Senators, or Nationalist voted in favor of the treaty, and five Nationalists against it. There were three abstentions, all of whom, it is believed, favored the treaty. The arguments of Senator Bustamante, as put forward in the Senate yesterday, convinced him that the country would be more prosperous with reciprocity than without it, and, nevertheless, his attitude of opposition and disapproval of the acts of the executive department of the government forbade his voting yes.

The vote was taken immediately upon the conclusion of a forceful appeal by Senator Bustamante. He insisted that whether the trust or the producers were the chief beneficiaries of the 30 per cent reduction of customs duties on Cuban sugar shipped to the United States, it was not possible that such differential would favor sugar in competition with that of Europe could result other than favorably to Cuba's trade. Under the treaty, he said, the European producer would be unable to compete with Cuba. If the European nations were really seeking to prevent the ratification of the treaty in the United States, it was not on account of the little they would lose in the Cuban markets, but because they would no longer be able to sell sugar to the United States. The treaty would also provide the protection that Cuba needed on tobacco. Viewed in another aspect, Senator Bustamante contended, the treaty would give Cuba national entity and allow her to enter into commercial relations with the Nation which she has hitherto considered only her guardian.

"I vote," said the speaker, "for the treaty with the conviction that we, in so doing, are rendering a patriotic duty to Cuba, even if the treaty is not approved by the United States Senate."

The custom of approving the treaty by articles was dispensed with, and the recommendations of the committee were approved in their entirety.

INSTRUCTIONS TO FUNSTON.

LONDON, March 11.—A warrant for the arrest of Whittaker Wright, director of the London & Globe Finance Corporation, was issued today. Following the order issued yesterday to the official receiver of the corporation by Justice Buckley to criminally prosecute Mr. Wright, a summons for the latter was obtained, but when an officer went to his residence to serve it, he was informed that Mr. Wright had gone to the Continent on account of his health, hence the issue of the warrant.

In the House of Commons today Swift MacNeil, Irish Nationalist, asked Home Secretary Asquith what steps were being taken to prevent Mr. Wright attempting to escape from justice. The secretary declined to answer such a question without notification.

According to Wright's wife, he went to Egypt five weeks ago for his health. She says she is convinced he will return when she informs him of what has happened.

As the House of Commons was rising tonight Secretary Asquith-Douglas announced that it was the government's intention to bring Whittaker Wright to justice.

SHAW IN NEW YORK.

Denies His Visit Has Any Connection With Money Market.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Secretary of the Treasury Shaw arrived here today from Washington. He visited the Sub-treasury shortly before the opening hour and conferred briefly with Acting Assistant Treasurer Dantz and Cashier Marler and Collector Stranahan. Concerning his visit he said:

"I am not here especially to discuss money matters with the bankers. I have no opinion to express regarding the situation. The primary cause of my visit was to discuss certain details of customs production with Collector Stranahan. There is no question of bond interest anticipation before me. In fact, I know of no need for it. I do not expect to see any bankers during my stay, which will probably be quite brief."

Secretary Shaw left tonight for the South on a pleasure trip.

British Shipowner's Claim.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—The British Ambassador has called the attention of Acting Secretary Loomis to the failure of Congress to provide for the settlement of a claim of Gallatly, Hankey & Co., of London, owners of the British steamship Mowat, for damages alleged to be due them by reason of a collision between the Mowat and the United States transport Warren in Manila Bay, December 12, 1901. This claim was thoroughly examined by the United States officials, who found that the Warren was at fault and fixed the amount which was to be paid. This statement was submitted to the last Congress, but in the general deficiency bill the only provision in the case was for another examination and no money was appropriated to pay the award. The Acting Secretary has agreed to again submit the estimates to Congress at its next session.

Consulate for Keene, of Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, March 11.—Francis G. Keene, of this city, received notice from Secretary Hay that he would be appointed Consul to Florence, Italy. Mr. Keene is a former member of the Wisconsin Legislature, a prominent businessman and a former classmate at Harvard of President Roosevelt.

Answer of Northern Securities Made Known.

Authors of Merger Seek to Defend Their Acts by Saying Others Did Same With Impunity.

ST. PAUL, March 11.—The report of the testimony taken before Frederick G. Ingersoll, special examiner in the case of the United States against the Northern Securities Company and others, has been filed with the clerk of the Federal Court. The report comprises four volumes of approximately 500 pages each, and much of the testimony has been published from time to time as it was taken.

The filing of the report makes public for the first time the proceedings at an interesting session held November 12, 1902, in New York, in which the contentions of the Government and the defendant are outlined. day is that several members of the grand jury have been warm supporters of Hummel in each campaign.

Chief of Police Sullivan, whose indictment is, voted on the same charge, refuses to talk. It is plain, however, that if there is any merit in the defense of Mayor Hummel it extends to Sullivan, so far, at least, as this charge is concerned.

It is admitted that the jury has considered allegations of more serious nature, but the evidence obtainable seemed to warrant charging only an offense of omission.

Walter S. Fulton, ex-Prosecuting Attorney, is not so reticent as others under the jury's displeasure. He considers the charge against him as very far-fetched. He maintains that gambling and such offenses are subjects of municipal laws intended to be enforced by city officers.

He never felt it his duty while in office to interfere in the management of the affairs of Seattle wherein gambling and other lawbreaking was practically licensed by monthly arrests and fines.

An incident of the last city campaign is known to have been discussed in the grand jury room and may have had some bearing on the indictment of Fulton. The gamblers had made a contribution to the Republican campaign fund. The Democratic managers demanded a similar contribution, which was refused. The Democratic managers then demanded of Prosecuting Attorney Fulton that he close the gamblers unless they came to the front. He refused to touch the deal. One witness before the jury is known to have testified that Fulton refused to close gambling, but the testimony probably did not embrace the circumstances of the refusal.

Arrests Expected Today.

Prosecuting Attorney Scott is expected to present the formal indictments to the jury tomorrow morning, when warrants will issue for the arrest of the accused officials. It was ascertained today that besides Hummel, Sullivan and Fulton, the jury yesterday voted true bills against Samuel Rosenberg, as owner of the St. Elmo House, which, it is alleged, is used for immoral purposes; Steven G. Meek, charged with shooting a woman, toward acting as Tax Collector for the County Treasurer; H. D. Smith, general agent of the Pacific Mercantile Company, and A. K. Hawthorne, general agent of the Devoe Diamond Company, for conducting alleged diamond swindles.

The indictment of George U. Piper for perjury is not likely to be again discussed by the jury. The matter has been forced upon repeatedly by certain jurymen and as often postponed. Yesterday a majority of the jury went on record as absolutely opposed to any further discussion on this point. The proposed charge was based on unimportant inconsistencies between the testimony of Piper before the jury and that of R. V. Ankeny, cashier of the Puget Sound National Bank. The majority of the jurymen have declared that the divergence is too trivial to waste time on.

Mrs. Pennell Dead.

BUFFALO, March 11.—Mrs. Arthur Pennell died at the Sisters of Charity Hospital tonight at 5 o'clock. For hours today the surgeons worked over the unconscious body of the injured woman. Toward evening a rising temperature and a quickening pulse warned them that the end was near, and word was sent to her brother, who arrived from New York this afternoon. Mrs. Pennell's pulse ceased to beat. Except for a few incoherent words uttered when she was first taken to the hospital, Mrs. Pennell said nothing.

HARD FIGHT FOR LIBERTY

AMES RESISTS EXTRADITION AT EVERY POINT.

Release Refused, He Appeals to New Hampshire Supreme Court, and May Go to Federal Court.

MANCHESTER, N. H., March 11.—Not until all legal proceedings are exhausted will ex-Mayor Ames, of Minneapolis, consent to return to that city and stand trial for alleged bribery. His attorney in this state made a strong effort in the Superior Court today to secure his release on habeas corpus proceedings, and when beaten, then appealed to the Supreme Court of New Hampshire. Should that court decide adversely, the power of the Supreme Court of the United States will be invoked to set him free, so that he will probably be able to stay in New Hampshire for a year or more at least. In the meantime he will be at liberty, providing he finds sureties to the amount of \$12,000, which sum, however, must be furnished before 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. As Dr. Ames has not yet been behind the bars, every effort will be made to secure bail.

The proceedings today occupied two sessions of the court before Judge Pike, and were based on Dr. Ames' petition for release on nine counts, although his attorneys made the strongest plea on the ground that at the extradition hearing before the Governor no evidence was permitted, and also that the charge in the warrant accompanying the requisition from the Governor of Minnesota was incomplete.

When the hearing opened today counsel had a long consultation over a disagreement as to what took place at the hearing before the Governor. It was contended by the attorneys for Dr. Ames that Attorney-General Eastman had objected to the introduction at that time of any evidence whatever, while County Solicitor Tuttle insisted that the Attorney-General had not excluded all evidence, but admitted any necessary to identify Dr. Ames as the man wanted. The court finally set for Attorney-General Eastman, who appeared before the court, to make a statement of the proceedings before the Governor, and Judge Pike at once denied the petition and ordered Dr. Ames to be turned over to the Minnesota officer. Mr. Hamblet excepted to the ruling, and Judge Pike remanded Dr. Ames to the custody of Sheriff Doane, of Hillsboro County. Bail was first fixed at \$5,000, but later reduced one-half at the request of Mr. Hamblet.

After the court formalities, Dr. Ames walked to his hotel.

It is expected that the President will accept the invitation if he does not visit the Coast earlier in the year.
