KING TO VISIT IRELAND

GOOD FEELING OVER LAND BILL INSURES WELCOME.

Edward and Alexandra Announce Their Tour for Next Summer— Ireland Filled With Joy.

LONDON, March 30.—It is officially announced that King Edward and Queen Alexandra will visit Ireland in July or August of this year.

The announcement of their Majesties' intended visit has been received with great satisfaction in Dublin and Belfast, where it is predicted the visit will be a triumphant success, as they will see Ireland in a happier frame of mind than she has been for many years. Nothing is known regarding the itinerary that the King will follow, but it is believed their trip will be made on the royal yacht and several places will be visited.

It is hoped that the visit may coincide with the auto-car races for the James Gordon Bennett cup and a great deal of speculation is already indulged in as to the possible functions which may be granted by the presence of the royal visitors. In political circles the announcement of the Irish trip is accepted as an augury that the land bill may be passed without any undue friction.

SHOOTS AT A NOVELIST.

Emma Tournet Seeks Revenge on Prevost for Neglecting Her.

PARIS, March 30.—Much stir was created here this afternoon by the news of an attempt to shoot the well-known novelist, Marcel Prevost. It appears that, as M. Prevost was nearing the office of the Society of Men of Letters, in the Rue Rougemont, where the election of officers for the coming year was about to be held, a stylishly dressed young woman, whose name was afterward given as Mlle. Emma Tournet, alighted quickly from a carriage and fired two shots from a revolver, at the same time calling him by name. Both shots missed, and the woman was about to fire a third time when M. Prevost dashed her.

She was taken temporarily into custody and explained that she had known M. Prevost in London some time ago. His avoidance of her since that time had prompted her to seek to avenge herself, but she did not intend to kill the novelist. M. Prevost refused to follow up the matter, and Mlle. Tournet was set at liberty. It is said that the woman's brother vainly tried to force a duel on M. Prevost.

M. Marcel Prevost was elected president of the Society of Men of Letters at the election which followed the shooting affair.

BRITISH CAPTURE SOKOTO.

Center of Mohammedanism in North Nigeria Is Conquered.

LONDON, March 30.—Brigadier-General Sir Frederick Lugard, High Commissioner of North Nigeria, at the head of a British force, occupied Sokoto March 23. After feeble resistance the Sultan of Sokoto and his chiefs fled.

Sokoto is the religious center of Mohammedanism in North Nigeria. Much

importance is attached here to the Lugard expedition.

High Price for Old Engravings.

LONDON, March 30.—William Blake's "Illustrations of the Book of Job" was sold at auction here today for \$28,000. The volume, which was published in 1825, contains the 42 original proof impressions of engravings and original designs in colors. The bidding started at \$500 and rose by leaps to the sensational bid at which the book was knocked down to a dealer. Another of Blake's works brought \$300. Sixteen other works were disposed of. They were all the property of the Earl of Crowe.

King Edward Starts for Lisbon.

LONDON, March 30.—King Edward, with a suite consisting of half a dozen persons, started for Lisbon today, having a few hours previously seen Queen Alexandra off for Copenhagen. The Portuguese Minister to Great Britain accompanied the King on his journey. Owing to the rough weather prevailing, King Edward decided to remain at Portsmouth tonight.

Test of Marconiograms.

LONDON, March 30.—The publication of the Marconiogram news message by the Times today was the result of an arrangement between Signor Marconi, the Times and the general postoffice, the latter having been desirous of testing the system, which is not yet open to the public or other newspapers.

Austria Seeks Chinese Trade.

VIENNA, March 30.—The Austro-Hungarian government is supporting a powerful commercial and financial syndicate which is arranging to establish an Austro-Chinese bank at Tien Tsin with a capital of \$4,000,000 to develop Austro-Hungarian trade with the far East.

Empress Is Doing Well.

BERLIN, March 30.—The bulletin issued today by the physicians attending the Empress, who sustained a fracture of the arm by being thrown from her horse in the Grunwald forest on Friday, says there is no change in the satisfactory condition of the patient.

Von Bulow and Prinetti Talk.

NAPLES, March 30.—Count von Bulow, the German Imperial Chancellor, who came here to visit Foreign Minister Prinetti, had a cordial interview of an hour with him today. Von Bulow is going to Sorrento for a holiday.

Greek War Minister Resigns.

ATHENS, March 30.—The Minister of War has resigned. He announced that his reason for resigning is that the Premier refused to support his army reform plans.

Iron Trust in Scotland.

LONDON, March 30.—Final arrangements are being made at Glasgow today to amalgamate 13 Scotch malleable iron firms with a capital of \$6,000,000.

Double Tragedy Sequel to Divorce.

DENVER, Colo., March 30.—A special to the Republican from Durango, Colo., says news was received today of a double tragedy on Sunday at Bayfield, Colo. 30 miles from Durango. E. H. Patterson, a ranchman, visited his divorced wife to see his 6-year-old daughter, and while the child was sitting in his lap, drew a pistol and shot her through the heart and then killed himself.

GOOD FOR PUBLIC LANDS

IMPORTANT LEGISLATION ENACTED BY RECENT CONGRESS.

Filibuster, However, Defeats Opening of Several Indian Reservations.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 24.—(Special.)—Chairman

Lacey, of the House committee on public lands, in reviewing the public land legislation which had been agreed upon for the session, expressed satisfaction, both as to the amount of business transacted and as to the policy and public good. Speaking on this subject, he said: "Taken altogether, there is more accomplished in the way of public land legislation at the short session of the Fifty-seventh Congress than has been accomplished at any time previous in the same length of time."

"There were some disappointments in this connection, however, as one of the disastrous results of the Democratic filibuster in the House during the closing days of Congress was the failure of legislation which had been agreed upon for the opening up for settlement of 2,150,000 acres of agricultural lands in several of the largest Indian reservations of the country. The early part of the session had been devoted by those interested in this legislation to getting a satisfactory basis for the legislation. This had just been reached when the filibuster was inaugurated."

"Members of the appropriations committee, headed by Mr. Cannon, opposed the proposition contained in the first bills introduced, that the Indian lands should be bought by the Government and then thrown open to settlement. There was no opposition, however, from this quarter to the proposition to have the Government act as trustee for the sale of the lands to settlers by the Indians. By this plan the Government was to purchase the lands in trust, and as they were sold to settlers pay the purchase price to the Indians. Under this plan 500,000 acres was to be thrown open in Oklahoma, 600,000 acres of the Rosebud reservation in South Dakota, 1,000,000 acres of the Crow reservation in Montana, and 300,000 acres of the Devil's Lake reservation in North Dakota. The only measure of this class which was allowed to get through was a bill throwing open to settlement 100,000 acres of the Red Lake reservation. It is estimated that if all of the measures had become laws, homes would have been furnished for something like 50,000 families on the very best agricultural land in the country."

Chairman Lacey is optimistic that this legislation will go through early at the first session of the next Congress, and predicts that there will be a stampede on the part of settlers to secure homes on the fertile lands of these various Indian reservations.

Mineral Lands Opened.

"One of the most important accomplishments of the session just closed in the way of public land legislation," he continued, "was the opening up of the phosphate mineral lands of the Uncompagere Indian reservation in Utah. There has been a heated controversy about opening up this mineral deposit for the past ten years. This reservation contains the entire world's supply of gilsonite, so far as known. Gilsonite is a high form

of asphalt or pitch. There are also on this reservation large deposits of celestite, a substance used as roofing varnish. Both minerals are in a very pure state, and it is believed the gilsonite can be profitably used for street paving. If this is proved true the deposits will be of incalculable value to the commercial world. "The question of how best to throw these mineral lands open to the public was one which engrossed the attention of the lawmakers for some time. The conclusion reached was that the old discoveries, or locations made prior to 1891, should be held valid. At the time these first discoveries were made this land was under 'executive order,' and the general belief at that time was that the mineral lands of such reservations were subject to location the same as other mineral lands. In order to prevent these lands falling into the hands of a monopoly, the law which provides for their opening reserves every other section of land to the Government. This is somewhat disappointing to many prospectors who have located claims in the last few years, as they will not be allowed to acquire title to the locations they have made should such locations happen to be on the section reserved by the Government."

New National Parks.

"There was some important legislation during the session in preserving the wonderful natural curiosities of the country. The House passed a bill for the second time making the petrified forest of Arizona a National park. This petrified forest contains several thousand of agate trees, which, on account of the lack of authority, are being rapidly destroyed and carried away by curio-hunters. Dynamite has been freely used on some of the most valuable of the specimens. "The wonderful wind cave of South Dakota was made a National park. This remarkable cave is an extinct geyser. Crater Lake, in Oregon, was also set apart as a National park. The works of the cliff and cave-dwellers of New Mexico were also made the subject of legislative action, but no final action was reached in the effort to preserve them under special Governmental jurisdiction."

"Under the leadership of President Roosevelt an effort was made to pass a bill creating lands of refuge for game in the forest reserves of the country. A bill was introduced both in the House and Senate. Opposition developed in the House, and the bill introduced there failed. The Senate succeeded in getting its bill through, but the measure came to the House too late in the session to secure action, although the House committee took favorable action on the measure."

Alaska Homesteads.

"A new homestead law for Alaska was passed. This law increased the size of the homestead that can be taken up in Alaska from 80 to 120 acres. Under the Alaska homestead act of 1898, the size of the homestead was fixed at 80 acres, and not a single entry has been made under that law. The reason for this was explained to be that no one in search of a home would go to Alaska and be restricted to 80 acres of land when they could obtain 120 acres in any of the states where public land was to be had."

"A bill allowing special surveys to be made of coal lands in Alaska was passed by the House, but met defeat in the Senate, being objected to by Senator Heitfeld as his last official act as Senator. There are from 20,000 to 30,000 acres of coal lands in Alaska which could be worked if special surveys were permitted to be made for the location of the lands. This, however, would interfere with the coal trade of some of the Northwestern

States to that country, and this is given as the reason for the objection."

DISTINCTION IS BROAD.

"Our Country" Is United States, "Old Country" Is Europe.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 30.—The United States Court of Appeals handed down a decision today defining the expression "our country" and "old country." The point came up in a copyright suit on soap labels, in which it was claimed by an Eastern company that "old country," used by an Iowa firm, was an infringement of "our country."

The United States Circuit Court for the Iowa District held that it was no infringement in the new name, and the Court of Appeals, in an opinion written by Judge Caldwell, affirms that decision. The opinion states that by long usage the phrase "old country" has come to mean Europe, while "our country," when used in this country, means the United States.

Burglar Known by His Sister.

CLEVELAND, O., March 30.—The body of the burglar who was shot and killed in the battle at Bedford last Saturday has been identified as that of Frank Adams, of Toledo. The identification was made by a sister of the dead man, who arrived here from Toledo today.

The woman gave her name as Mrs. Jennie Wilkinson, of Toledo. She said the dead man is her brother. They are the children of Peter Adams, a former prominent resident of Toledo, who died a year ago. The son was reckless and ran away from home five years ago. Mrs. Wilkinson says the burglar under arrest is James Bradley.

John D. Long Is Well Again.

BOSTON, March 30.—Ex-Governor John D. Long, who for nearly three months has been a patient at St. Margaret's Hospital, is now able to be out.

Train Jumps Track; One Injured.

CORY, Pa., March 30.—The Erie Railroad's fast Cleveland train, which left here at 9 o'clock this morning, was wrecked at Concord, six miles west of this city. The train, made up of a baggage and cafe-car, three Pullmans and two

coaches, jumped the track and turned over. Mrs. C. T. Hennessey, of New York, an occupant of the cafe-car, was slightly injured.
