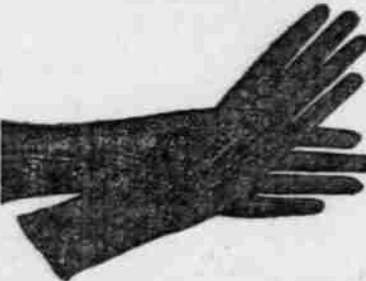

VAUGHN AND HIS JOB

How Cushman Helped Him to Get It.

NOMINALLY BACKED C. G. SHAW

But Really Was Striving to Flank the Ankeny-Foster Combination on the Postmaster-ship.

SEATTLE, April 2.—(Special.)—The appointment of Frank H. Vaughn as Register of the Vancouver Land Office is probably traceable to Representative Francis W. Cushman. Not that the Tacoma man actually recommended Vaughn, for all accounts agree that Vaughn was the selection of the Interior Department officials for temporary register. But Cushman's interference resulted in the compromise. As he was about to start on his tour of the West, the President was confronted with the fight over the appointment of a Register at the Vancouver Land Office. He named Vaughn at the suggestion of the Interior Department to take charge temporarily. Cushman is the man who made the fight, and created the doubt in the President's mind, and he did so without any idea of winning. In fact, he picked out a candidate whom he does not want to see honored and whom he would probably oppose were he a serious aspirant for the appointment.

The man whom Representative Cushman recommended is Calvin G. Shaw. Mr. Shaw is a former member of the Clark County Board of County Commissioners, and at present is an applicant for the position of Postmaster at Vancouver. For this position Shaw has the indorsement of both Senator Foster and Senator Ankeny, while Cushman is supporting Dan Crowley. He is bitterly opposed to the appointment of Shaw, who has been allied with another political faction.

When the vacancy in the Land Office occurred, Cushman promptly suggested Shaw as an available candidate. He knew at the time that Shaw could not accept the place, and he probably advanced his name with the sole intention of injuring the chances of Senators Foster and Ankeny to name the new Register and keep faith with the Washington politicians who wanted H. C. Phillips, of Goldendale, appointed.

Had the President appointed Shaw, there is every probability that he would have promptly resigned. At the same time an opportunity of Shaw would give Cushman an opportunity to claim before the Post-office Department that Shaw had been taken care of and this might aid his fight in behalf of Crowley. But no matter what his success with Shaw might be, Cushman realized he was causing embarrassment to Foster and Ankeny and he stood a chance of securing a compromise from them on the Postmaster question by forcing his new fight.

Cushman Ahead So Far.
The fight over the Postmaster at Vancouver probably stands in Cushman's favor. There is a general understanding in this state that the Postmaster-General has ruled that the appointments of Postmasters outside the Senators' own cities should be made upon the recommendation of the Representatives, and this ruling puts the Senators at a disadvantage. But apparently Senators Foster and Ankeny, by acting in concert, believe they are able to upset any such understanding. They have the opportunity when an appointment they object to comes in of opposing confirmation, and this may be the club that is held over the department and President's heads.

The candidacy of Shaw for Postmaster of Vancouver was not of his own making. Shaw was chairman of the Clark County Board of Commissioners a few years ago and at the time the Northern Pacific began a suit to settle its taxes in Clark County. The Commissioners employed extra counsel and prepared to fight. About this time the railroad compromised most of its suits at about 40 cents on the dollar. In Clark County a compromise was arranged on the basis of about 70 cents.

Postmaster Lloyd Dubois owns a paper in Vancouver which is now conducted by his brother. When the compromise was made, this paper made an attack upon the County Commissioners and the attorney engaged in the case. The attack was repeated, and politicians friendly to Shaw decided to make a fight on Dubois for the postoffice. Shaw was put forward as a candidate with the backing of the Foster-Ankeny forces.

In the meantime Crowley developed as a candidate. He was active in the support of the Cushman-McBride programme in Clark County, while Dubois, who was regarded as a representative of the same faction, held aloof until the primaries had been held and the result of the fight between the two factions was made evident. Then he took up the Cushman-McBride cause with considerable energy.

The candidacy of both Crowley and Dubois from the same political faction created something of a division in the ranks of the forces opposed to the Ankeny-Foster men. But Cushman solved this apparently by selecting Crowley as his candidate. By this action he incidentally evened up the score of the Shaw men against Dubois, but the Shaw fight was not dropped on this account.

Crowley's indorsement by Cushman is said to have been due more to the fact that the two were old schoolmates and fellow-townsmen in Iowa than to any pressure from the Cushman-McBride faction in Clark County. Cushman has pushed the cause of Crowley actively, but he has been met by the constant opposition of Senators Foster and Ankeny.

Just to Worry Senators.
When the Register's office was made vacant, Cushman promptly picked up Shaw and pushed him forward as a candidate for the office. Politicians are only able to give the one interpretation that Cushman was anxious to embarrass the Senators, for he is known to be a bitter political enemy of Shaw, and would not, in all probability, make the recommendation in seriousness. But if he can tie up Shaw for a time in the Register's fight he figured he might have a better chance to win the postoffice for Crowley.

The Vancouver Land Office position was paroled out by the Foster-Ankeny forces to George H. Baker, of Goldendale, and Shaw realized this fact, and was tacitly, at least, a party to it. The allotment of the position to Baker was made so firmly that even George H. Stevenson, the real manager of Ankeny's last fight, refused to recommend his own brother for the position when the move was suggested to him. Stevenson might have desired to see his brother holding the job, but he would not interfere in any way with Baker's programme, and he so declared when the proposal was made to him.

This incident is merely an illustration of the way the Ankeny-Foster faction has conceded the place to Baker and will insist upon the appointment of H. C. Phillips, of Goldendale, as Register. It is generally believed that when the President's trip is concluded Phillips' name will again be suggested and an effort made to land him. However, Vaughn is likely to stay at least until Congress meets.

TRUXILLA IS TAKEN.
Coghlan Reports Continued Success of President Bonilla.
WASHINGTON, April 2.—The Navy Department today received the following cablegram from Admiral Coghlan, dated Guatemala, April 1:
"Following sent by Marietta en route to Belize for stores: Raleigh arrived at Truxilla on the 25th. The Panther, which returned from Puerto Cortes, reports Truxilla captured by the revolutionists on the 24th. Our interests protected. Conditions unsettled. Communication uncertain and another collision needed. Brutus nearly empty."
The collier Marcellus will probably be sent to Admiral Coghlan.

Can't Telegraph to Honduras.
WASHINGTON, April 2.—United States Minister Merry cabled today from San Salvador that telegraphic communication from that city to the interior of Honduras is impossible. This is an answer to the request of the State Department that he endeavor to communicate with Admiral Coghlan, who is supposed to be at Puerto Cortes, Honduras, with his fleet. The department desires to instruct the Admiral respecting the protection of American interests in that country.

Trial Trip of New Balloon.
PARIS, April 2.—The Petit Parisien states that the steerable balloon belonging to the brothers Pierre and Paul Lebaudy was again successfully tried yesterday at Molsen. The airship ascended, executed a number of maneuvers and followed the course of the Seine for some distance. It then returned and was brought to the ground easily 100 yards from the starting point.

Eleventh Plague of Egypt.
CAIRO, Egypt, April 2.—The bubonic plague has reappeared in some parts of Egypt. Cholera cases are reported at Alexandria.

TURKEY SENDS AN ARMY

WILL PUT DOWN THE REBELLION OF ALBANIANS.

Fanatical Outbreak Leads to Wounding of Russian Consul—Russia Warns Bulgaria to Keep Quiet.

PARIS, April 2.—The French Foreign Office has been officially advised that the Sultan of Turkey has ordered a division of troops to the scene of the recent outbreak of Albanians. Official advices also confirm the reports of the wounding of the Russian Consul at Mitrovitz during the unsuccessful attack which the Albanians made on that town. The attacking party numbered 300 men, representing the element opposing the plan of reform which the powers jointly formulated and which Turkey accepted.

The officials here consider that the Albanian opposition to the reforms creates a serious complication and they accept the Sultan's action dispatching large reinforcements to Albania as evidence of the Turkish Government's determination to carry out the reform project. Another official dispatch announces that Russia has given Bulgaria a definite and emphatic notification that in case the resistance of the Bulgarian settlers in Turkey to the Sultan's reforms brings on a Turkish-Bulgarian conflict, Bulgaria must not count on any support, moral or material, from Russia. This is considered further evidence of the purpose of the powers not to interfere with the Sultan's plans so long as he is carrying out in good faith the powers' project for reform.

How Russian Consul Was Shot.
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 2.—Details of the attack on M. St. Cherbina, the Russian Consul at Mitrovitz, show that it was made by an Albanian soldier, one of whose relatives had been killed in the fighting at Mitrovitz. The Consul, who was accompanied by a Turkish escort, was on his way to inspect the batteries which finally repulsed the Albanians who attacked Mitrovitz, when a sentry at the powder magazine deliberately shot M. St. Cherbina in the back, the bullet traversing the renal region and inflicting a serious wound. The sentry also fired at the Russian military courier, but missed him. The other soldiers of the guard then hurried up and shot the Albanian sentinel, inflicting mortal wounds.

BETWEEN TWO GREAT FORCES.
Italian Statesman Says They Will Compel Europe to Unite.

ROME, April 2.—Senator Villari, in an address delivered today before the King and Queen at the opening of the International Historical Congress, made several allusions to the United States. He said Europe was shut in between two great, powerful countries—Russia on the east and the United States on the west. The latter, from a population of 30,000,000, had reached a number of 100,000,000, and was likely to reach 200,000,000. He said that the United States also had taken the lead in all works of progress and civilization. These two forces, acting on Europe, were likely to render necessary a union of the different European countries, which would completely change the geographical situation to the universal advantage of Europe. The Senator added that

he forewarned and predicted the 20th century will perhaps see the solution of many problems.

"The mixing of the white and black races," he continued, "brought about the liberation of the negroes from slavery; but this had not harmonized or amalgamated the two races, which hate each other now perhaps more than ever before. The United States probably will be the first to give us an indication how to deal with such grave and important questions, which Europe must meet throughout the two immense continents of Africa and Asia."

DARE NOT VISIT ROME.
Czar's Trip Abandoned on Account of Anarchist Plots.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 29.—(Sunday)—It is asserted in Russian official circles that the postponement of the Czar's proposed visit to Rome was due to reports from Russian detectives to the effect that there are so many suspects in Italy at present that the Czar's safety would be endangered if he went to that country.

ROME, April 2.—A dispatch from Milan says a demonstration occurred yesterday following a socialist meeting called to protest against the arrest of Michael Goetz, a Russian, at Naples, March 26, on the charge of being implicated in a plot to kill the Czar during his approaching visit to Rome. A mob of about a hundred Socialists proceeded to the Russian consulate at Milan singing the Socialist hymn and shouting "Down with Czarism." The police attempted to disperse the Socialists and during the fighting which followed a stone was hurled at the escutcheon on the consulate, the flagstaff was broken, a police officer was injured and four men were arrested.

PACKING TRUST NOT SHUT OUT.
New German Meat Inspection Law Is in Effect.

BERLIN, April 2.—The last provisions of the meat-inspection law of June 3, 1900, went into effect quietly yesterday at the ports and throughout the empire. This most far-reaching and sumptuary measure was put in operation piecemeal by

occasional decrees, because of the Ministry of the Interior having to create the inspection machinery. The exporters will endeavor to cure beef with borax, and thus comply with the German law, which, as it now appears, by no means destroys the American meat trade here, and it is not improbable that the total American meat imports this year will equal those of 1901, when the total valuation was about \$8,000,000. Owing to high prices and insufficient home supplies, more than three-quarters of the imports of American meats are preserved.
