LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 2.—Three errors, all counting for runs, were the cause of the Browns losing their opening game with Los Angeles this afternoon by the score of 4 to 3. In the opening inning Butler, who made his initial bow at Chutes Park, in attempting to catch one of Morley's bats, threw to Andrews. The ball landed in among the left bleachers and two men romped home. Jay Andrews and Zinssar were the bright and shining marks for the error columns. It was their blundering that cost the game for the Browns. The lamentable part of it was that they were committed on easy chances, and at a time when every player ought to have been on his toes.

Spies in the ninth canto popped up a skycraper that fell into the waiting hands of the third base guard, but it found no lodgment. It slipped through his hands like water through a creek. Lawler had singled and on Tomlin's out to Nadeau he went to second. Zinssar made a most inexcusable blunder of a weak little drive by Spies and Lawler galloped home with the winning run.

It was in the seventh inning that the Browns demonstrated to Mr. Morley's corporal guard that saw the opening game that they could win. Zinssar made a heavy stick that faced Dr. Newton. Van Buren swatted a teaser to Third Base man Smith, who did a most magnificent bit of juggling with the ball. In his attempt to make a garish one-hand stop he did a bit of juggling that would have done credit to the departed Hermann.

When he got through, Van Buren was safe at the first way station. Single was had taken Carlos Smith's place in the right field, was presented with free transportation to first base, sending Van Buren to the second station. Nadeau hit one on the seam and sent it to the center field fence. This filled the bases. Andrews, seeing that Newton's balloon was up, waited for four wide ones, which were forthcoming, and Van Buren was forced home. Shaffer made an infield hit and Nadeau, in order to stop a double play, crooked into the ball and was declared out. Andrews, in the meantime, was still passed to first and the bases were still full. Zinssar's hit scored Andrews and Harlow's gift of a wide one, which was that tied the game. Butler's infield hit forced Shaffer and the best Schmeer could do was to drive a high one to center field. Rusty Hall was the replacing albatross.

Schmeer drove a long one to Hoy and the chance of the Browns breaking the losing streak was passed. Pitcher Kostel was hit by his first game of the season tomorrow. Captain Vignoux will catch.

Butler pitched a splendid game and but for his error would undoubtedly have won his game. He also suffered at the hands of Umpire McDonald, whose judgment on balls and strikes was very bad.
