

SITE FOR HATCHERY

Wallowa Land May Be Se-
lected.

CHINOOK ARE PLENTIFUL THERE

Proposed Yachina Project May Be
Abandoned—Fish Warden Says
Closed Season Has Been Very
Generally Observed.

SALEM, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—The report of Master Fish Warden H. G. Van Dusen for the month of March shows that the request for a hatchery site at the mouth of the Wallowa River, near the mouth of the Snake River, and the Department of the Interior has withdrawn from entry two small tracts of land in northern Wallowa County, on the Grand Ronde and Wallowa Rivers, in order that the state may secure them for hatchery purposes. The land is well situated for hatchery purposes, being less than two miles from the Wallowa River bridge, and about 12 miles from Elgin, and easy of access. The land is in section 6, township 5 north, range 42 east, and sections 19, 20 and 30, township 2 north, range 43 east. Concerning the land the fish warden says:

"The sites are both very desirable properties for hatchery work, and nothing should be left undone in the matter of securing the properties permanently, especially the Wallowa River site, for it is a very promising property. Here we will not get as many chinook salmon as we would like, and not near as many as at some of our other new plants, but for a general hatchery it should be the equal of any, with the exception of the Ontario hatchery, for in addition to the chinooks we will be able to stop the bluebacks that may be on their way to the Wallowa Lake for spawning purposes, the small sockeye salmon that frequent that river every fall in such great numbers, and the steelheads that come along in the early spring.

"It is a natural spawning stream and is frequented to a fair extent by all of the varieties of salmon mentioned above for spawning purposes. It is also a great trout stream, and is in close proximity to some of the best trout streams that the state has, and there is no reason why trout eggs should not be collected at the station, if properly established for it, and as good a work carried on with them as with the salmon. My plan is to work along the line with the station and arrange to do trout work as well as salmon work and make it a general fish hatchery station."

Concerning the work at Ontario, where a new hatchery is to be built, the report says:

"At Ontario we have been delayed some, what in getting a title to the property desired for hatchery purposes on account of the survey, but in the course of another week we should have the matter satisfactory and the deed ready for delivery. Everything pertaining to the matter has been agreed upon, and the title to the property and the delay is caused entirely by the surveyor, who has been unable to get at the work and get the survey and a correct description for it, while we have been waiting for the title to the property at Ontario, and we are beginning to fear that we will not be able to, so as to get at permanent buildings for this coming season's work. I was in hopes of getting everything arranged before the permanent Smith left the station last season, so that we could get at the work of building early this spring, and be all ready for spawning work in the early fall, but contentions have arisen over the matter of the water supply. I now fear that the matter of the water supply at its best is a very small affair, and that the requirements now contended for by the owner are such that it would hardly warrant the additional expense that we would have to go to in order properly to stock it, and I am beginning to fear that we will not be able to do so.

Concerning the observance of the close season Mr. Van Dusen says:

"We are nearing the end of another spring close season, and, while we have not been able to enforce it as strictly as the law requires, still the season has been fairly well respected considering the disadvantage that we are at in not having a launch at our command for patrol service.

"A great many complaints have been made, principally through the newspapers, of direct and open violations of the law, but upon careful investigation all were found to have been greatly exaggerated, some were simply conjectures, while others had been based upon hearsay, and were apparently given to the papers for a misleading and malicious purpose. That some fishing goes on all must admit, and it always will, as long as there are any anglers in the state, and upon the river covers a vast extent of territory and is altogether too extensive with all its by-ways and sloughs to be covered properly by three or four patrol boats with no means of transport point to point except in a 15-foot skiff or rowboat. A few perpetrators have been run down and prosecuted, and we have had a launch in hand and are in hopes of landing a few more of them before the end of the season."

Friends Deny That He Is Working
Toward District Attorneyship.

EUGENE, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—Advances agents for the several candidates for the Congressional nomination to be bestowed by the convention here Thursday are beginning to arrive, and the work of buttonholing delegates in the hope of turning them to one or the other is already in progress. That there will be strife for the nomination is certain, and just how the matter will end is in very great doubt at the present time. The partisans of each of the four prominent candidates are all predicting how it will end—each one has his favorite nominated, and some will even tell just how many votes their particular candidate will have, and on what ballot he will be nominated. Notwithstanding, there is no man who can make any reliable prediction as to the result, and perhaps the guess of one is as good as the other. Here in Lane County the fact that Hermann will get the votes of the entire delegation is disputed. At the time of the election of the delegates it was fully believed by Hermann's friends that every man on the delegation would support him, and the ticket was gotten up by the friends of Hermann and in his interests, so, if they were not all Hermann men, there must have been some error of judgment.

LINE WILL SURELY BE BUILT

OREGON & PACIFIC TO PUT SUR-
VEYING CREWS IN FIELD.

Said to Be Opening Wedge for Coast
Road From Portland to
San Francisco.

GRANTS PASS, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—A correspondent of The Oregonian was today informed by A. C. Hough, of this city, attorney for the Oregon & Pacific Railroad, that the new line is positively to be built and that the construction work will begin as soon as arrangements can be completed for the securing of right of way. It is judged that this will require some \$10 to \$20 days. Mr. Hough has just returned from San Francisco where he attended a meeting of the directors and leading stockholders of the Oregon & Pacific Railroad Company.

Three surveying parties will be put on the line in a few days, the first of which will arrive by the last of this week. The purpose of these surveying crews is to make surveys for an extension of the line over what was the Oregon & Pacific. Originally, it was decided to build the road only to Crescent City, Cal., from here, but now the company has decided to con-

ELECTED HERMANN DELEGATES.

Lincoln County Convention Also In-
dorses Hermann.

TOLEDO, Or., April 7.—The Republican County Convention met here today and elected the following delegates to the district convention at Eugene: Hon. B. F. Jones, of Toledo; Captain H. M. McEwen, of Waldport; T. C. Jackson, of Siletz; J. C. Fletcher, of Otis.

A resolution was adopted pledging delegates to use all honorable means to secure the nomination of Hermann. The following resolution endorsing the Lewis and Clark Fair was introduced by Hon. R. A. Bensell, and unanimously adopted: "Whereas, it is a fact notorious and lamentable that no place in Oregon has been discriminated against in its desired improvements and commercial interests by the metropolitan press as has Yachina Bay, and

"Resolved, That we believe the Lewis and Clark Fair a matter of vast importance to the State of Oregon, that the extension of the appropriation made for that purpose is wise and patriotic, that the referendum would delay early and prompt action in necessary arrangements and that we earnestly deprecate the use of the referendum as a device to delay the success of the Fair and a useless expense and a reflection on the intelligence of the people's representatives."

Hon. Jefferson Meyers, one of the members of the Fair board of directors, was called upon. In responding he made a brief address explaining the manner in which the appropriation was to be expended and other interesting details.

A resolution introduced by E. F. Jones asking the County Court to appropriate \$100 for an exhibit with the Bureau of Information at Portland, was also passed.

GREAT CAVE DISCOVERED.

Gorgeous Interior Shown When Lit
Up by Explorers.

GRANTS PASS, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—Another limestone cave that promises to be as extensive and deep as the remarkable limestone caves of Grayback Mountain has been discovered in Josephine County. Guy Weatherly and Roy Humphrey, two young men, while out hunting a few days ago in the Upper Deer Creek region, uncovered from beneath a mass of manzanita and chinquapin a narrow entrance into the mountain side.

By the aid of candles and lanterns they penetrated the labyrinth to a depth of 150 feet. They could have gone farther but for the fear of becoming lost in the intricate number of chambers, rooms and tunnels, all of limestone and rock crystal. From all appearances the newly found caves are very extensive, the explorers believing the entire mountain to be one vast honeycomb of limestone. Beautiful stalactites hang from the ceilings of the chambers, and the pools of water covering the floors are filled with a floral growth of corallike waterlilies and blue, resembling in their matchless beauty some petrifaction underground flower garden. QUERIES FOR MISS GAUSE

PROPOSED BY UNIVERSITY OF
OREGON HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

Not to Cause More Trouble, but
Merely for the Sake of His-
torical Accuracy.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., April 7.—(Special.)—The decision rendered at the oratorical contest held here March 12, was perfectly satisfactory to the students and faculty of the local institution, and while the admirers of true, original oratory are pleased with the action taken in regard to Smith's plagiarism, yet the Historical Society of the University of Oregon begs to ask a few questions concerning the validity of some of the historical statements made by the lady orator from Pacific College, who now is recognized as the winner of the intercollegiate oratorical contest.

First—it is true that John Marshall answered the arguments of James Monroe and Patrick Henry, who opposed the adoption of the Constitution? Were these arguments not especially answered by Madison, who was the great champion of the cause in the Virginia convention? Second—What authority has Miss Gause in stating that France learned from the lips of John Marshall that America would pay "millions for defense, but not one cent for tribute"? Has not the credit of this statement been given to Pickney, who made the statement in an after-dinner speech where John Marshall was nothing more than an invited guest? Third—What cause has the Pacific College orator to offer for the statement that John Marshall was the first Supreme Judge of the United States, when history informs us that Jay was the first Supreme Judge of the United States? The University of Oregon's Historical Society does not ask these questions to cause more trouble, but the society is asking for information and also for fairness toward the great history-making characters of our country.

Headed Towards Burns.

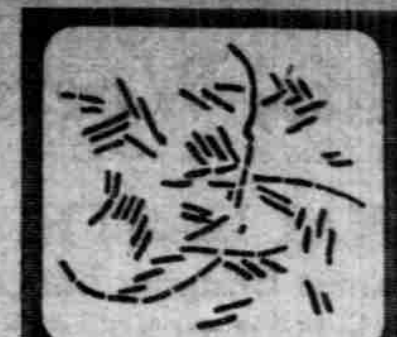
