BUY WATER RIGHTSGovernment Ready to Pay
Reasonable Price**ON IRRIGATION PROJECTS**

Instructions to Engineers on Butte Creek—Hold-Up Will Cause Abandonment of Scheme—Private Work a Failure.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 9.—Hydrographer Newell, of the Geological Survey, has directed his field engineers, who are examining the withdrawn lands in Umatilla and Morrow Counties, in the Butte Creek country, to give special attention to all claims of individuals and companies who own or claim to own prior canal rights in that vicinity, and to determine whether or not these rights, if they exist, will interfere with Government reclamation. If the project as a whole proves to be practical, and only these private interests stand in the way, Mr. Newell says the Government will be willing to pay the owners a fair amount for their property, but if exorbitant prices are asked the Government will abandon the project altogether and look elsewhere for a site for a Government irrigation system, as it has nothing to lose save the time spent in investigation. There is a willingness to pay a fair price for any private property that may be absorbed or utilized by the Government in its irrigation works, but there are so many available sites and so many meritorious and attractive projects awaiting attention in various states that no work will be undertaken where attempts are made to hold up the Government.

The engineers have discovered, in the short time they have been on Butte Creek, that the irrigation works attempted in that vicinity years ago by private capital were not practical. Their proposals contemplated taking the water from Umatilla River and distributing it over the low lands, but no provision was made for storage reservoirs. Inasmuch as the water level in this stream is exceedingly low in the summer months, when water is necessary for irrigation purposes, their scheme would never have profited any.

The scheme roughly outlined by the Geological Survey contemplates the construction of storage reservoirs for impounding the flood water of Umatilla River and a number of smaller streams in that locality, and holding it in reserve until the summer, when it can be distributed as needed. If the investigation and surveys now in progress on Butte

Mr. Newell said that because of the controversy over the water rights on the Slivies River, in Harney County, the Government engineers will probably pass over that project, for the present at least. Private capital seems to be doing all that can be expected, in view of the diversified claims as to riparian and canal rights.

MONTGOMERY CASE ARGUED.

Federal Supreme Court Hears About Portland Harbor Lines.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 9.—The Supreme Court today heard arguments in the case of the City and Port of Portland against Montgomery, involving the right of the late J. R. Montgomery to extend his dock in East Portland between Randolph and Russell streets into the Willamette River, beyond the harbor line as fixed by the city and port. Montgomery, while the question was before the courts, built his dock out to the harbor line as fixed by the Secretary of War, outside of the harbor line laid down by the Port of Portland, and it has since remained there. Senator Mitchell argued for the Montgomery estate, C. E. S. Wood, of Portland, presenting the case of the city and port.

The State Circuit Court decided this case in favor of the Montgomery estate, but this decision was overturned by the State Supreme Court. It went to the United States Supreme Court on a writ of error filed by Mr. Mitchell.

DAILY WILL TAKE OFFICE.

Bond Approved by Acting Land Commissioner at Last.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 9.—The bond of John D. Daly, recently appointed Surveyor-General for Oregon, was received at the General Land Office today and approved by the Acting Commissioner. It did not reach Secretary Hitchcock, however, hence Mr. Meldrum's tenure of office is prolonged one day. Mr. Daly's bond is for \$50,000, furnished by the American Bonding Company, of Baltimore. When the bond is finally approved by Secretary Hitchcock, Daly will be advised by wire to relieve Meldrum of the care of office.

HOWZE ASKS INQUIRY.

Denies Charge of Cruelty to Filipinos Made by Antis.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Major Robert L. Howze, commanding the Porto Rican Regiment, arrived in Washington today and immediately demanded a court of inquiry. He was mentioned in the report of General Miles as charged with great cruelty to the Filipinos while in command of a post in the extreme north of Luzon. It was asserted that he caused several Filipinos to be beaten to death. One case was cited as especially revolting.

Hawaiian Language Legal.

HONOLULU, April 9.—The Legislature has passed over Governor Dole's veto a joint resolution making the Hawaiian

language the official language of the territory as well as English.

To Buy Silver for Philippines.
MANILA, April 9.—The United States Philippine Commission has appropriated \$1,000,000 for the purchase of silver bullion and copper to make the new subsidiary coins.

LAWSON IN PARLIAMENT.

Ardent Pro-Boer and Temperance Advocate Elected in Cornwall.

LONDON, April 9.—The Parliamentary vacancy in the Camborne division of Cornwall, due to the death of W. S. Chime, Progressive Liberal, was filled today by the return of Sir Wilfrid Lawson, with an increased Liberal majority. The figures were: Sir Wilfrid Lawson, Liberal, 3555; Arthur Strauss, Liberal Unionist, 2509. Considerable rowdiness marked the canvassing.

Sir Wilfrid Lawson's increased majority was not expected, as he was bitterly assailed for his so-called "little" England attitude. He openly declared the government ought to give back the Transvaal and Orange Free States to the Boers and he also identified himself with the ardent pro-Boer party. Mr. Strauss, who had already represented Camborne for five years, was considered to be a strong local candidate. The Liberal success was due to the disaffection of the non-conformist Cornishmen with the government's educational measures.

USURER SENT TO JAIL.

He Says He Enjoyed Gambling on Human Nature.

BERLIN, April 9.—Heinrich Pariser, a wealthy moneylender, was sentenced today to two years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$2500 for usury. Sixty applications were brought, including the complaints of several noblemen and army officers.

In one instance he charged a Baron von "E." (the court did not permit his full name to be known) 25 per cent, which the Baron paid, though he had an un-mortgaged income from a landed estate

amounting to \$5,000 yearly. Another exceptional case was that of a millionaire, who paid interest at the rate of 100 per cent for a short-term loan of \$5000.

Pariser admitted having charged the rates mentioned, but he said that the enormous risks reduced his profits to 10 per cent on the capital invested and said his "gambling on human nature" enabled him to make only 5 per cent more than in regular business. Part of his return for so hazardous an occupation was the pleasure which his "daily battle with unscrupulous noblemen and social humbugs" gave him.

EXCHANGE OF FAVORS.

Sought by Britain From United States on Isthmian Canal.

LONDON, April 9.—Negotiations are proceeding, according to the Birmingham Post, between the United States and Great Britain, with the view of obtaining certain privileges for British commerce in connection with the Panama Canal when

built. The Post says the concessions include opportunities for repairing and coal- ing ships, and privileges helpful to the British squadrons in North Atlantic and West Indian waters in return for facilities to be granted to the United States Navy.

Soldiers Must Be Vaccinated.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Major-General Davis, in command of the division of the Philippines, has issued an order directing that no troops be allowed to land at Manila until they have been vaccinated.

Dwight Benson Is Dead.

ROME, April 9.—Dwight Benson, artist and journalist and formerly United States Consul-General to Hawaii, died here today, aged 66 years.

Long Mayor of Des Moines.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 9.—John Campbell, Mayor of Des Moines 12 years, is dead at his home here, the result of a stroke of paralysis.
