FEW DELICACIES FOR EASTER DINNER.—It has long been the custom for people to have an extra fine dinner on Easter Sunday, and Marketmen have always taken pains to prepare for providing the delicacies. There is but very little in the way of extra in the markets this season, and purveyors are not happy. They are able to supply some good beef, but mutton and veal are scarce, and the Spring lamb, which is a standard dish for Easter dinner, is smaller than usual, and not so fat as it ought to be. There is pork, but this is not a dish for extraordinary occasions. It is barely possible to get a piece of first-class salmon, and there is an increasing supply of poultry, but turkey looks blue enough to give a purchaser the blues, and Spring chicken is not obtainable. Dealers say farmers are away behind the times in the matter of furnishing supplies. The city has grown to such size that they have not half enough of any kind of products to supply it, and yet they demand extravagant prices for everything. The situation of farmers, gardeners, dairymen, poultry-breeders, stockraisers and producers generally is called to this, and they are requested to get their own, and so benefit themselves and others.

PLANS FOR SHAM BATTLE.—The sham battle and night attack which the Veterans of the Spanish-American War propose to give for the benefit of the Soldiers' Home, is intended to be quite an elaborate entertainment. Besides the sham battle, many scenes of camp life will be given in realistic style. It has not yet been definitely decided whether the entertainment will be given, but it will doubtless be one of the best of the Multnomah or Portland Club, probably the latter, the date to be in the latter part of May, wind and weather permitting. In case of a real fight, the weather is not taken into consideration, but when people are required to pay 50 cents to see a sham fight, their comfort must be looked after. The committee of the Veterans has commenced negotiations with the Portland General Electric Company for a number of arc lights to illuminate the scene of the fight, and to enable spectators to understand the tactics governing the night attack.

SOLD CARLOAD OF FROZEN ORANGES.—The better quality of street vendors of fruit, etc., are very indignant at the jobbing firm which brought in a carload of frozen oranges and sold the worthless and worse than worthless truck to ill-used or disreputable vendors, who sold the oranges at 15 cents per dozen and robbed every one who bought any. These vendors have greatly injured the business of selling on the streets, the decent vendors say, and they are longing for some way to express their entire disapproval of the jobber and the peddlers who joined hands in this infamous robbery of the public. Many find it difficult to draw any dividing line between vendors, and have no regard for jobbers who encourage them in order to work stale, rotten or worthless goods off their hands. Some day the city will forbid peddlers with wagons from roaming the streets and spoiling the business of those who pay cents and taxes.

FUNERAL OF MRS. PILKINGTON.—The funeral of Mrs. Pilkington, widow of the late Dr. J. B. Pilkington, was held from the First Unitarian Church, yesterday afternoon. A resident of this city for the past 36 years, Mrs. Pilkington had a large circle of acquaintances and many tender friends. The casket, flower-laden, was borne by intimate friends of her late husband. Impressive funeral services were conducted by Dr. Cresser. The singing was by the Arian Club. At the conclusion of the services at the church the body accompanied only by a few friends and members of the family, was taken to the Portland Crematorium for final disposal. Mrs. Pilkington's life was a record of sterling worth, great fortitude under affliction and true womanliness. She is survived by five sons and one daughter.

SPRINGING NEWS OF OREGON.—Fifty pieces of Oregon literature, relative to the vast resources of the state, were sent out to different parts of Kansas by the Board of Trade yesterday. Scores of letters of inquiry received by Secretary Max M. Shillock every week evidence the fact that the literature is being directed to the proper locations. Letters of inquiry seeking every imaginable kind of employment, as well as letters in search of various business openings, are being received and promptly answered, the Board giving such encouragement as the openings will warrant.

TO REMOVE CITY WIRES.—The wires connected with the fire alarm and police patrol houses have generally been strung on the electric light poles, but owing to interruptions to their service caused by induction and leakage from the heavily-loaded electric light wires, the Executive Board has decided to have the wires of the fire alarm and police patrol boxes removed to the poles of the telegraph company. A committee of the Board has advertised for bids for making this removal.

BETTER CARRIER SERVICE COMING.—Merchants and the public generally have for some time been demanding increased service from letter-carriers. The business of the Postoffice here has increased rapidly of late, and has reached a magnitude which the force of carriers and clerks cannot handle efficiently. One of the carrier's routes has lately received an addition of 250 new residents, and he had about all he could attend to before. On several occasions there has been such a large amount of mail to distribute that he was not able to get all over his route once, while the people on it are entitled to two deliveries daily, so some of them have not been served at all. Postmaster Bancroft wrote to Washington in regard to the situation, and made a pressing demand for more help. He has received a dispatch informing him that at least 25 will be found necessary. Should this be so, it will be proof that the present force has been badly overworked.

ROSE COGHAN MUST BE POSSESSED of the secret of the office of youth. About the year—well more than a dozen years ago—she was the gifted, handsome, alluring, tragic Rose Coghlan, and she was the same again last night at the Marquam Theatre in presenting A. W. Pinero's satirical society drama, "The Second Mrs. Tanqueray." She gave a human portrayal of the part of that woman with a past, and aroused the large audience with enthusiasm, receiving several curtain recalls.

MR. PINERO HAS ALSO WRITTEN "Iris" and "The Notorious Mrs. Ebbelwhite," but the drama that has made his great reputation is "The Second Mrs. Tanqueray," which is about 15 years old. It is one of the great problem plays of our era, yet the story is so skilfully told about a sinful woman illustrating the truth that the wages of sin is death, and that one cannot never escape the results of sin, that nobody is shocked. It was about one year ago that Miss Coghlan last appeared in this city, when she presented "Forget Me Not."

"THE SECOND MRS. TANQUERAY" Rose Coghlan has an emotional play of the first water, where the satire, wit and truth sparkle like stars in the sky. True, Mrs. Patrick Campbell, Olga Netherland, Mrs. Kendall and Eleanor Duse have also appeared in the same title role, but it is a question if they could excel the stirring, human portrayal given by Rose Coghlan. The scarlet woman in "Clarelle" is an impossible, inartistic, weak consumptive. "Magda" is a mere doll, forced toward goodness by a ferocious father. But Rose Coghlan's "Mrs. Tanqueray" is a woman of flesh and blood; a creature of sin. Her iniquitous past stands out before her like a grim specter, although she is in after-life the respectable Mrs. Tanqueray, and her aroused conscience—no Pharisee complacency—shows her what a creature she is. Of course, she ought to have toiled to try to win the love of that angel of love, the goodly Eileen. Tanqueray's daughter by her first wife, was singularly pathetic. Rose Coghlan's Mrs. Tanqueray falls to a fitting ending—more the pity—for she lacks the courage to go on living.

AGNES ROSLYN, ROSE COGHAN'S adopted daughter, played "Eileen," and acted that chilly, saintlike part charmingly. Franklin Little, as Aubrey Tanqueray, has both power and ability, but it would be an improvement if he would not bite his words. He also drops his voice at critical periods, and the support is able. "The Second Mrs. Tanqueray" will be the attraction at the special matinee this afternoon, the last performance being tonight.

FAREWELL TO BAKER STOCK COMPANY.—This afternoon and tonight will mark the last two performances of the popular Baker Theater Stock Company, which closes a most successful season of 22 weeks. "A Night Off" is the bill and it has proved to be one of the best the company has presented. After the matinee today the company will receive their many friends on the stage, and it might be mentioned that those in attendance at the matinee, but the general public is invited. Those contemplating attending tonight's performance are respectfully requested to come early as the curtain will raise promptly at 8:15, as the company leaves immediately after the performance for Seattle. The theater orchestra has planned a surprise in the way of a "Little German" and will be at the depot tonight to blow a farewell and God-speed to their comrades for the past 22 weeks.
