PUNISH THE GUILTY

Payne Tells Purpose in Post-office Scandal.

INVESTIGATION IS THOROUGH

Bristow and Corps of Inspectors at Work—Arrests Expected in New York, Where the "Graft" Is Estimated at Large Sum.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Postmaster-General Payne tonight gave out a statement in which he announced that investigation of the affairs of the Postoffice Department will be continued, and that any person found guilty of wrongdoing will be dealt with summarily. The statement follows:

"During the months of January and February information and reports reached me which I deemed it for the public interest to investigate, and I personally gathered such information and facts as would enable the officers of the department to undertake a proper investigation into the truth or falsity of these reports. I directed Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General Bristow to take the proper steps to institute the necessary inquiry, using for that purpose the postoffice inspectors' division and such other methods as would thoroughly ascertain the truth or falsity of the charges or insinuations made, and he was instructed to proceed promptly and with vigor during his absence."

Justice Will Be Summary.

"Since my return this morning I have not seen General Bristow, so that I am not advised of the progress. The investigation will continue, and, if any wrongdoing is disclosed, the parties guilty of such wrongdoing will be summarily dealt with. If the system or method of doing business in the department is faulty, the proper remedies will be applied without fear or favor. I inaugurate the investigation with the determination that it should be exhaustive. It is for me to add that I laid before the President the information which I had in my possession, and that he fully approved of the action proposed by me."

The whole administration of the Postoffice Department is made subject to the investigation under the Postmaster-General's direction, and every division will be probed thoroughly and the inquiry be made as thorough as the department's expert inspectors can make it. At the same time Mr. Payne's purpose is to give fair and just treatment to all concerned, and not to act arbitrarily and with undue haste. For that reason it can be stated that no immediate changes of importance in the personnel of the service are now contemplated."

No Successor to Tyner Yet.

The office of the Assistant Attorney-General for the Postoffice Department is among those included in the general inquiry, and until the investigation of affairs generally is completed it is probable that no successor to Assistant Attorney-General Tyner will be named. Postmaster-General Payne did not reach the department until late afternoon. A score of newsmen were awaiting him with queries concerning the postoffice investigation, but he parried all questions with remarks on his trip to the West Indies. Mr. Payne later summoned a number of officers of the department and held

RAISED FROM THE DEEP

ONE OF THE SPANISH SHIPS SUNK BY DEWEY'S FLEET.

Skeletons of 80 of Her Crew on Board—They May Be Returned to Spain for Burial.

MANILA, April 12.—The warship Reina Christina, the flagship of Admiral Monteforte, which was sunk by Admiral Dewey, was floated and beached yesterday. The skeletons of about 80 of her crew were found in the hull. One skeleton was evidently that of an officer, for it had a sword by its side. There are 35 shell holes in the hull of the Reina Christina, one made by an eight-inch and others smaller. The magazine injection valve is missing, showing the ship was scuttled when abandoned. The hull is in fair condition. Captain Albert R. Couden, commanding the naval station at Cavite, took charge of the remains of the sailors, expressing a desire to give them an American naval funeral. The Spanish residents are anxious, however, to ship the skeletons to Spain, and it is suggested that the transport Summer convey them to Spain by the way of the Suez Canal in June. A wrecking company is endeavoring to raise all the sunken Spanish warships.

AFFAIRS IN HAWAII.

Opium Habit Spreads—Boycott on Asiatics—Allowance to Queen Liliuokalani. HONOLULU, April 7.—A House Committee report on an act to regulate the sale and use of opium contains the statement that the opium-smoking habit is spreading alarmingly among the natives. The movement against the competition of Asiatic labor is increasing all over the islands. At a meeting of mechanics and other workers in Hilo, resolutions were adopted by which all agreed not to work with any Asiatics, not to employ or contract with Asiatics and not to work on any job begun by Asiatics. In Honolulu there is a movement against Asiatic storekeepers, of whom there are large numbers.

NO ARRESTS MADE YET.

New York Postmaster Can't See How Scheme Was Worked.

NEW YORK, April 12.—No arrests have as yet been made as a result of the investigation said to be in progress of the charges that an alleged promotion syndicate has been operating to secure pay-patch for employees of the New York Postoffice for increases in salaries. Postmaster Van Cott said today that he had heard nothing official from Washington yet concerning the alleged postoffice scandals. He is still loth, he said, to believe that any such syndicate could operate in the New York Postoffice without his knowledge, and he cannot see by what argument the men were induced to part with their money, if such were the case. According to the Washington dispatches many promotions recommended by the postoffice have been held up. "As a matter of fact," said Mr. Van Cott, when this statement was shown him, "these promotions or increases in salary would not in any event take effect until June 1, 1903, and no 'hold-up' would therefore be necessary."

J. J. Hart, of St. Louis Church, St. Louis, Mo., is considered likely to be the new Archbishop of Manila.

Brigand and Traitor Captured.

MANILA, April 12.—Marino Linares, formerly an exile on the Island of Guam, has been arrested in Pampanga, Province of Luzon. He joined the revolutionary organization and accepted a commission from that body. Linares was charged with brigandage and possibly with treason, as he took the oath of allegiance when he left Guam.

GREAT FRAUD AT MAYAGUEZ.

Municipal Official Arrested and City Police Removed Bodily. SAN JUAN, P. R., April 12.—Governor ex-Quero Lillokalanai has taken possession of Mayaguez and supplanted the municipal police at noon, April 12.

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LAND QUESTION IN TUTUILA.

Neglect of United States to Settle It Causes Trouble.

TUTUILA, March 20, via San Francisco, April 12.—The natives of Tutuila have been much agitated lately over the claims of German Samoans to land in Tutuila. One of the chiefs advocated the assault and slaughter of all Upolu people who might come over to this island and claim land. Several young men set out with the determination of carrying out the desire of the chiefs. They were promptly arrested by order of the Secretary of Native Affairs, and a political imbroglio between the Government of the United States and German Government in Samoa was averted. This land question was anticipated when the flag was first hoisted, and in the deed of omission of Tutuila to the United States the natives stipulated that there shall be an investigation into the land question by the United States Government, and the hopes of the Tutuila Samoans are now with the United States to redeem the lands for them after adjudication before a court or commission of competent jurisdiction. The German government has appointed a commission of mixed people—Germans, British and Samoans—but so far the United States Government has done nothing to settle the vital question.
