

GERMANY IS HURT

Because American Fleet Will Go to Marseilles.

MOODY EXPLAINS MATTERS

Fleet was going there anyway to take Admiral Cotton on board. Would have gone to Kiel, but has not been invited.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Reports of dissatisfaction expressed in Germany at the departure of the European Squadron for Marseilles, where it will participate in the welcome home for President Loubet, having been brought to the attention of officials here, the Associated Press is authorized on the highest authority to make this statement of the position of the Navy Department in the matter:

Nothing was further from the mind of Secretary Moody or any official of the Washington Government than giving offense to Germany by extending an appropriate courtesy to the Sovereign of a friendly nation. The suggestion came from the State Department that the squadron go to Marseilles to greet the President Loubet, especially as it would touch there to take on board the new commander-in-chief, Rear-Admiral Cotton.

As regards the visit of the American men-of-war to Kiel, no invitation reached the Navy Department from Berlin. On the same high authority it is stated that had such an invitation come it would have been accepted.

SALUTE PROPERLY OR DIE.

That seems to be the order to Privates in German Army.

BERLIN, April 17.—Emperor William has ordered that a thorough investigation be made into the case of Naval Ensign Huesner, who killed an artilleryman named Hartman with his sword at Essen for not saluting him properly, according to Huesner's version of the affair. The matter continues to attract much attention throughout the country. Huesner now claims that Hartman struck him before the fatal attack, but all the eye-witnesses of the killing contradict his statement. Hartman was buried yesterday at Essen.

The papers print an account of another military incident at the Monopol Hotel, Essen, in which an officer sharply accosted a one-year volunteer because the latter saluted him imperfectly. The officer used insulting language, whereupon several guests of the hotel intervened. Another volunteer who was present then went to the assistance of the officer, drew his sword and wounded several civilians. The next day the local governor ordered the hotel to be closed, the officer was placed temporarily on the retired list and an investigation against four of the civilians was ordered.

LOUBET ENTERS ORAN.

Algerians Welcome Him With Strange Mixture of Music.

ORAN, Algeria, April 17.—President Loubet arrived here today from Algeria. Everywhere along the route the natives gathered in crowds, owing to the Museum of the Sultan, which was the Sultan, as the President is termed, brings happiness.

M. Loubet was met by detachments of troops and mounted bands. The latter bearing banners representing the French colors and the Algerian crescent entwined. The President was conducted under a triumphal archway, the band playing the "Marseillaise" and native orchestras the strange music of the desert, through the main thoroughfare. He was warmly acclaimed by the large crowd assembled. The day was devoted to festivities, visits and banquets.

BESSON KEEPS SILENT.

Reserves His Testimony on Combes Bribery for the Jury.

PARIS, April 17.—M. Besson, editor of the Petit Dauphinois, of Grenoble, who charged Edouard Combes, the Premier's son, with having offered through an intermediary, to secure for a monetary consideration authorization for the monks of the Grande Chartreuse to remain in France, was questioned on the subject today by Magistrate Vallée. He declined to testify, claiming that the charge should go to the jury, where he would testify.

PRETENDER MARCHING ON FEZ.

Sultan of Morocco Again at Bay Before Rebels.

TANGIER, April 17.—The pretender is marching from Fez on Fez. Three thousand Moors have arrived at Melilla, seeking refuge from the pretender's troops. It is again stated that the Sultan has offered the crown to his brother Mulai, who has refused it.

Plenty of Money for Germany.

BERLIN, April 17.—The new imperial 3 percent loan, amounting to \$72,000,000, has been heavily oversubscribed. France subscribed heavily, and Great Britain and the United States made the lightest subscriptions. The applications reported up to tonight amount to \$2,438,800,000.

Will Not Propose Home Rule.

LONDON, April 17.—Premier Balfour, in a letter to an inquirer, emphatically repudiates any intention on the part of the government giving home rule to Ireland.

BOODLERS IN MAYAGUEZ.

Mayor and Other City Officials in Porto Rico City in Jail.

MAYAGUEZ, Porto Rico, April 17.—Chief Pami Hamill, of the Insular Police, has arrested Mateo Fajardo, the Mayor of Mayaguez, charged with money frauds of large amounts. His bond was fixed at \$20,000.

He was taken to jail tonight, followed by a large crowd, including women and children, crying, wailing and decrying the police. The public prosecutor called on the president of the Council, Juan Rivera, the next in authority, and demanded that he turn over the city government to him.

Governor Hunt is directing matters by telegraph through Chief of Police Hamill, who was sent here for that purpose. In addition to the Mayor, the Superintendent of Public Works, the former Chief of Police, the Market Superintendent and four other employees of the Public Works Department were taken to jail.

BANDITS ARE DISPERSED.

Severe Penalty for Attack on Surigao—Revolt in New Quarter.

MANILA, April 17.—The band which raided Surigao, Island of Mindanao, March 23, is practically dispersed. The troops and constabulary pursued the men into the Lake Manit country, and defeated them five times, killing 30 and wounding many others. Most of the arms stolen at Surigao were recovered.

The disorder which recently broke out in the Province of Misamis, Island of Mindanao, is spreading. The civil authorities have appealed for military assistance. People are leaving the towns and going to the mountains and many are proclaiming the natives rebels. The troops have entered and dispersed a band of 400.

Wolfe was a member of the brokerage firm of Wolfe, Wrede & Co., and disappeared from this city about four years ago. Search for him was made all over the Coast, but without avail, and as nothing was heard from him it was believed that he had perished in the gold fields of Alaska.

Outman informed Judge Coffey that he would appear in court next Monday and prove that Wolfe was not dead. Outman said:

"We think we can prove that Wolfe was alive in the Spring of 1899, several months later than the date the suicide was identified at Seattle. An Oakland man who knew the missing San Francisco man intimately told me that he saw and conversed with Wolfe near Dawson in May of 1899."

FIVE DIVORCES GRANTED

JUDGE SEARS GRANTS A FEW MATRIMONIAL KNOTS.

Tales of Desertion, Infidelity, Cruelty, and Failure to Provide Told in Court.

Judge Sears disposed of five divorce cases yesterday.

A decree was announced in favor of Claude Babb dissolving the matrimonial bonds existing between her and W. H. Babb, a gambler, because of infidelity. Judge Laybourn was named as correspondent.

Mrs. Babb testified that when she ascertained her husband was untrue to her he acknowledged it and remarked that he had no excuse to offer. May Paley, a sister of the plaintiff, corroborated her evidence. The Babb case was transferred to Vancouver, Wash., August 30, 1907.

Eva Ashley, an actress, was divorced from William J. Ashley, to whom she was married in New York in June, 1897, because of desertion beginning in November, 1898. She testified that the last she heard of her husband was two years ago when he was about to die from the use of morphine, to which he was addicted.

"If the man is dead the court cannot grant a divorce," remarked Judge Sears. "To the best knowledge of the plaintiff," answered W. A. Coland, counsel in the case, "the man is living, and if he happens to be dead the divorce will not hurt him."

The court coincided with this view. The depositions of Evelyn Hunter and William Henry Parsons, taken in New York City, were read. Mrs. Ashley was restored to her maiden name, Harrison. Nancy Morrell testified that her husband, James G. Morrell, threatened to kill her, did not provide for her wants, and squandered her money in saloons.

They were married in February, 1902. May Schaefer and Anna Jewell were called as witnesses to substantiate these statements. The decree was not entered because all of the fees have not been paid.

S. A. Cason was granted a divorce from Lucinda Cason and was granted the custody of their three children. He testified that his wife was unfaithful to her marriage vows, and frequented saloons and lodgings. He further stated that she associated with one Lovell, and he saw a roomer in the house named Gibson kissing her. The Casons were married in 1890 in Nebraska.

Vina Harrison testified that her lord and master A. H. Harrison, constantly ill-treated her and falsely accused her of infidelity in the presence of Mrs. C. H. Harris and others. Mrs. Harrison further stated that her husband came home one day and told her their faces would soon be side by side, meaning that he would kill her, and he went to bed with his boots on and frightened her so that she fled from the house. They were united in marriage October 1, 1898, and got along amicably together only a very short time.
