TWO TAX PAYMENTS

Change in Law Concerning Collection.

MAY BE A SURPRISE TO SOME

Object of the Law Is That Tax Levies in Any Year Shall Become Collectible During the Same Period.

ALBANY, Or., April 19 .- (Special.)-"Will property-owners in Oregon have to pay double the usual amount of taxes in the Fall of 1904?" is a question that is discursed at some length by Linn County citizens nowadays, Not that there is room for a great deal of argument conrecent session of the Oregon Legislature, but the inevitable effects of the law fur-

It will be recalled that at the last sea-sion of the Legislature House bill No. 167, entitled "An act to provide more efficient nethod for the assessment and collection of taxes, etc., was passed, and later re-ceived the Governor's signature, thus be-coming a law. This new law provides that, beginning with January 1, 1564, the takes for each year shall become due and be collected at least in part before the end of that year. That is, that the takes for 1994 shall become due and be paid in 1994. ad of in the following year, as has been the practice in the past in Oregon. The specific provisions of the law are that the laxes for each year may be paid by the int day of December of that year; but if they are not paid before the ist day of February of the following year they shall become delinquent on that date provided, that if one-balf of the taxes are paid be-

that if one-bulf of the taxes are paid before the lat day of December, the remaining one-bulf may go over until the first day of the following April, becoming delinquent on the lat of day. Now, then, the contention is that in the Fall of the year 1994, when the new system of collecting taxes is installed, tax-payers will be burdened with a double payment of taxes. Under the old law the taxes for 1993 will be collected in 1994. One-half of these may be paid in the Spring of the year 1994, and the other half in the Fall. As the 1994 taxes must be paid at least in part before the lat day of in the Fall. As the 1904 taxes must be mald at least in part before the 1st day of December, 1904, it would seem that in the Fall of that year one-half of the 1904 taxes or the taxes of a full year must be paid. This position is maintained by some of the leading ability of Albany.

It is generally agreed that the new method, when once established, will be much more satisfactory than the old. But it is also agreed that the Goulding-up year will

also agreed that the doubling-up year will be a hard one for taxpayers. It is argued that this new law has not

been widely enough advertised. The genbeen widely enough advertised. The gen-eral public does not seem to be apprised of the conditions which it will have to face next year. The law should be given greater publicity, and the people warned that they should arrange to settle their 1905 taxes as early as possible after the assessment rolls are made up. In this way taxpayers will be prepared to meet the 1906 taxes which come in effect, as an the 1904 taxes, which come, in effect, as an extra assessment in that year. But, fortu-nately, the jump is made during an era of general prosperity in the state.
