

## DURBAR IN DESERT

President Loubet Reviews  
Nomadic Tribes.

## SCENE OF BARBARIC SPLENDOR

In Tent of Camelhair and Arab  
Tapestry, He Sees 7000 Men on  
Camels Pass Before Him, Then  
Feasts at Desert Banquet.

EL KREIDER, Algeria, April 21.—President Loubet participated today in a veritable durbar of the nomadic tribesmen of the desert. The tribesmen gathered in thousands from all parts of Southern Algeria for a ceremony of Oriental splendor.

Up to the present time M. Loubet has visited only those sections of Algeria which show the advance of French colonization. Today, however, he entered the desert country, with its sparse and burned vegetation. The stretches of sand and hot sun produced the curious effect of mirage.

The ceremony was held on a vast plateau. Here the tribesmen assembled from all quarters, some of them having journeyed 80 or 40 miles across the desert. Their tents were arranged in circles after the Arab custom, each tribe occupying a large circle, in the center of which were groups of richly harnessed camels. The chiefs were mounted on horses, but the tribesmen were on camels, and formed great caravans. Over 7000 men participated in the gathering. A superb tent of camelhair fabrics and Arab tapestries had been erected for President Loubet.

As each tribe passed in review its chief dismounted and paid homage to the President of France, who distributed decorations to the principal leaders. After the review came a native fantasia or exhibition of sports. There were feasts of horse-manship and much burning of gunpowder. The ceremonies were brought to a conclusion by a grand "diffe" or Arab banquet, given by the chiefs. The menu included such desert delicacies as roast gazelle, "couscous," camel's milk, milk, dances, executed by celebrated native beauties, followed the banquet. The President then started on his return journey to Saida.

The day's entertainment presented a spectacle of barbaric splendor as seldom had been seen by European eyes.

## Holy War by Sahara Tribes.

MADRID, April 21.—It has been reported here from Algeria that the French troops which were assembled at El Kreider have been ordered to the Sahara Desert, because of the proclamation of a holy war by the Sahara tribes.

## SECRET BALLOT IN GERMANY.

Debate on Bill Revives Old Claims of  
House of Hanover.

BERLIN, April 21.—The train on which Count von Ballestrom was traveling was dug out of the snow in Silesia in time for him to reach Berlin and open the Reichstag today. The general election will not remain for several weeks, but so little remains to be done that the House probably will adjourn early in May.

Most of the session today was devoted to a discussion of the proposed changes in the election regulations, which have been submitted to the Bundestag, and which are intended to provide greater security in balloting.

Reactor Delors, Alsatian, said his group would vote for the bill because Alsace-Lorraine was the country par excellence where elections were improperly influenced, and he hoped the bill would remove the most gross excesses.

Baron von Scheele, the old Guelph leader, gave examples of the improper influencing of elections in the Province of Hanover, concluding:

"It is monstrous that the authorities interpose great obstacles in the way of the Guelph Societies, which only defend their hereditary monarchy and advocate the restoration of the Kingdom of Hanover."

President von Ballestrom thereupon said:

"The restoration of the Kingdom of Hanover has absolutely no connection with the bill and its restoration must not be proclaimed here as a programme."

Interior Secretary von Posadowski-Wentner later said:

"When Baron von Scheele uses the tribune of this House for expressions, which outside the House, would have an exceedingly dangerous effect, he does not serve the cause of the peace of the province which he represents."

The bill was then passed against the votes of the members of the Right party and those of some Conservatives.

The Kingdom of Hanover was annexed to Prussia by Bismarck in 1866, having been conquered in revenge for the position of Hanover in the war between Prussia and Austria in that year. The two great powers quarreled about Schleswig-Holstein, which province they had taken from Denmark in 1864. The last King of Hanover was George V, who died in exile at Hildesheim, Duke of Cumberland, still asserts his claim to the throne. Guelph is the name of the de-throned royal family, hence its adherents are called the Guelph party.

## GENERAL WOOD IN ROME.

Cordially Welcomed by King and  
Invited to Visit Eritrea.

ROME, April 21.—Brigadier-General Leonard Wood was received in audience today by King Victor Emmanuel. The General had a most gracious and cordial conversation with the King, who took great interest in the Philippine Islands. General Wood explained that he was going to the Philippines to perform his military duty, and said he had the greatest admiration for Governor Taft. He felt that the results which the Governor had accomplished there were excellent.

The King said that should General Wood go to Eritrea, the Italian African colony on the Red Sea, he would be given instructions to the authorities there to put themselves entirely at his disposal. General Wood thanked the King warmly, and said he was gratified when the Foreign Office here invited him to visit Eritrea.

Major Scott and Lieutenant McCoy, who accompanied General Wood, also were received by the King.

## FIGHTING IN TURKEY.

Insurgents Badly Beaten—Albanians  
Shoot Redly Judges.

SALONICA, European Turkey, April 21.—A band of about 500 insurgents, partly in Bulgarian uniform, was defeated by a Turkish force near Rodovitz, April 18. Thirty insurgents and nine Turks were killed.

The Kouklis Asia Minor, division of Red-its, numbering 18 battalions, has been called out for active service in Macedonia and Albania.

The new judges appointed under the reform scheme of the powers are being terrorized by the Albanians. Two of the judges were shot with revolvers in the streets of Scutari. One of them was killed.

## MESSENGER BOYS RIOT

THEY SMASH WESTERN UNION WIN-  
DOWS AT BUTTE.

Mob in Full Control, for Police Do  
Not Interfere—Strikers Threat-  
en to Cut the Wires.

BUTTE, Mont., April 21.—As a result of the strike of the Western Union and American District Telegraph messenger boys, a mob of boys and labor men assailed the telegraph office this afternoon and closed it. Windows were smashed, the doors barricaded and the messengers of the A. D. T., and operators were imprisoned in the building.

The police are indifferent to the acts of the mob, and the strikers are in control. Threats were made this afternoon that tonight all Western Union wires, including the press lines, would be cut.

## ALL MINERS MUST WORK.

Dispute in Anthracite Region Re-  
ferred to Board of Conciliation.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 21.—The executive boards of the three anthracite districts of the United Mineworkers of America in Pennsylvania today issued instructions today that all mineworkers now on strike or locked out return to work immediately, pending an adjustment of all differences by the board of conciliation provided for the Anthracite Coal Commission. District directors Nicholas of Scranton, Detroy of Hazleton and Faby of Shamokin were selected as the miners' representatives on the board of conciliation. The board is to consist of six members, three appointed by the operators and three by the miners.

When the meeting of executive boards adjourned tonight, President Mitchell said he had nothing to say beyond the instructions issued to the men except that he expects the coal companies to appoint a similar conciliation committee.

President Mitchell has appointed Rev. T. R. Watkins, of Scranton, to be National organizer for the United Mineworkers. He is the only miner-preacher in the anthracite region.

## STRIKE LEADER SHOT DEAD.

Bloody Duel With Officers Outcome

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 21.—Another tragedy growing out of the battle between strikers and police in the United States Marshall at Stanfords City last February took place near that place today, when John Harless, one of the strikers, was shot and killed by John Laing and a man named George, who went with deputy Marshall Cunningham and Summers to arrest Harless on a warrant issued by the Federal Court. When the officers in the party approached the house Harless ran out. He was commanded to halt, but instead he dodged behind a tree, drew his pistol and began firing. Laing and George returned the fire and Harless fell dead.

## WILL MEET THE COMMITTEE.

Manager of Great Northern to Dis-  
cuss Trainmen's Wages.

ST. PAUL, April 21.—There is probability of a quiet settlement of the difficulties between the Great Northern Railroad Company and its trainmen. This afternoon the Great Northern trainmen's committee, at present in St. Paul, received a communication from General Manager Ward stating that he was willing to receive and confer with the representatives of the men—the Trainmen's committee. Date of the conference has not yet been arranged. The members of the trainmen's committee are much pleased with the position now taken by the Great Northern and are exceedingly hopeful that the differences will be adjusted.

## Coal Strike Delays Warship.

HONOLULU, April 21.—(By Pacific Ca-  
ble.)—The coal strike in British Columbia is responsible for the nonarrival of a shipment of 150 tons of coal for the U. S. S. Amphitrite, which is here. H. M. S. Amphitrite has appealed to the local naval station to give her 200 tons to enable her to make the return trip to Hong Kong, towing the torpedo-boat destroyers due there from Esquimaux. The naval station wired to the Navy Department at Washington for permission to grant the request.

## SILKWORKERS' REQUEST REFUSED.

TORONTO, April 21.—At today's session of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor a delegate from the United States Silkworkers asked for an independent charter, but the request was refused, and they will come under the jurisdiction of the United Textile Workers. The committee decided that the Federation would give its support to the textile workers now on strike at Lowell.

## Engine-Builder's Strike Ended.

NEW YORK, April 21.—The strike of employees of the Quincy Engine Works, of Quincy, Ill., who have been engaged in installing the engines of the battleships in the power-house at the New York Navy Yard, is off, as a result of the announcement that the strike to the home works of the company has been settled.

## Takes Its Old Men Back.

PHILADELPHIA, April 21.—An order has been issued by the Lehigh Coal & Navigation Company, which operates several collieries in the Panther Creek Valley, reinstating all of its old employees who have been laid off since the outbreak of the strike. About 30 men and boys, whose positions had been filled, will find work in and about the mines.

## GREAT FIRE IN LA CROSSE.

Department Store Burned and Loss  
of Half a Million Sustained.

LA CROSSE, Wis., April 21.—Fire which broke out late tonight in the Park store, the largest department store in La Crosse, destroyed that building and damaged several other large stores. The loss is estimated at \$500,000, partly covered by insurance.

LOS ANGELES, April 21.—In an interview printed in the Express today, David B. Henderson, ex-Speaker of the National House of Representatives, said:

"President Roosevelt will be nominated, in my opinion, by the next Republican national convention. That he will be re-nominated goes without saying, and he will have no opposition. No other name will go before the convention."

Henderson is at present visiting a son who resides at Long Beach, and will probably remain in Southern California until June 25, when he will leave for New York.

## HANEET IS TURNED DOWN.

Illinois Supreme Court Orders Count  
of Disputed Ballots.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 21.—The Supreme Court today settled the Lorimer-Durbin election contest by handing down an opinion in which they hold that the Circuit Court of Cook County has no jurisdiction to count the disputed ballots in the case. The Supreme Court ordered the habeas corpus proceedings against Sheriff Barnett, of Cook County, for the release of the election commissioners who were cited for contempt of court, dismissed.

## STONE STANDS ON PLATFORM.

"There will be no abandonment or re-organization, and no man unworthy to hold up the old Jefferson flag will be nominated. And if he is, God pity us, for he will be defeated."
