# SHOW A LARGE CAIN

No Diminution in Increase of Railway Earnings.

### THIRTEEN PER CENT LARGER

Trade and Industry Progress Well Despite Drawbacks in the Shape of Numerous Labor Troubles-Local Produce Quotations.

NEW YORK, April 24.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s NEW YORK, April 24.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say: Trade responded promptly to better weather in many sections of the country, notable activity appearing in seasonable lines of wearing apparel, yet wholessiers report conservation as compared with earlier months this year, although business is more active than it was a year ago. Some branches are still backward, and there is more or less complaint regarding collections, while renewals are frequently used.

Gutdoor work is vigorously prosecuted, agri-cultural communities endeavoring to make up-lost time, and structural undertakings call for large quantities of lumber and building mate-rials, sustaining quotations. Labor problems are being carried on with celerity. Lake nav-igation has had the expected effect in reducing rail freight congestion, and shipments are more prompt, yet there is no finituation in the splen-did increase of gross railway earnings, which thus far show a gain of 13.1 per cent over last year's figures for April and 25.3 per cent over 2001.

A fact that is especially noteworthy as to the situation in the iron and steel industry is that the scarcity of coke is no longer cause for compiaint; on the contrary, in some cases deliveries are so large as to threaten accumulation, and predictions as to the permanence of high prices have coased.

Cothlers complain of tardy deliveries of samples, which may afford subsequent business. New England manufacturers of boots and shoes report a seasonable lack of new business, and turther contracts from Jobbers as not expected during the next fortnight. Increased activity and strength has come in Chicago packer hides with the advancing season. Fluctuations in quotations of the great staples have been less extensive during the past week, with a slightly higher level as the net result, and only a fair degree of activity.
