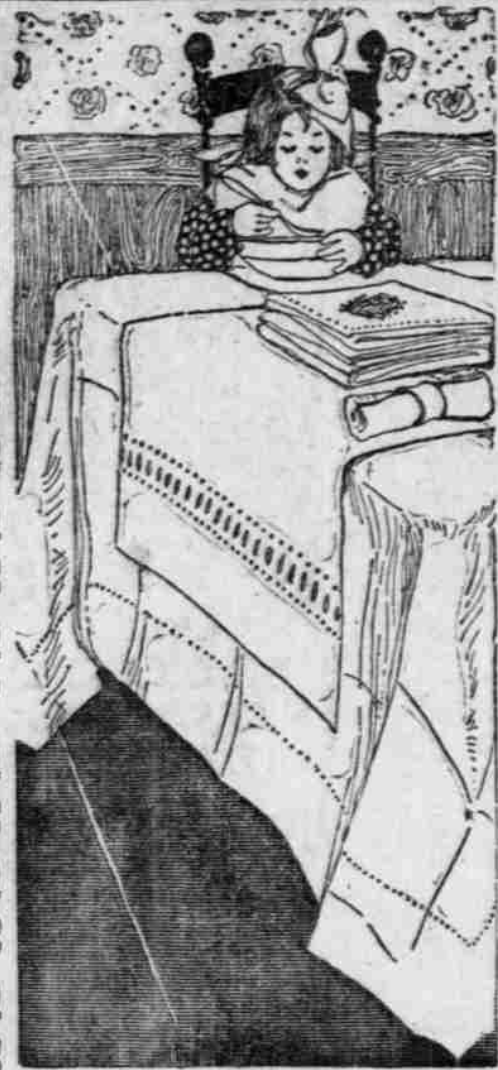

ROME IS JOYOUS

Tumultuous Welcome Is Given King Edward.

VICTOR EMMANUEL KISSES HIM

Francis Plaudits Call Him to Look Down on Surging Mob Between St. Peter's Dome and Ruins of the Ancient City.

ROME, April 27.—King Edward arrived here from Naples this afternoon and was received by King Victor Emmanuel in person, who escorted the visiting sovereign through the densely packed streets. Their Majesties received a great popular ovation.

King Edward, who was standing on the platform of his railroad car when the train reached the station, descended alone, almost before the train stopped. King Victor Emmanuel stepped quickly forward and the two monarchs embraced and kissed each other four times, the Italian King saying quite audibly in English: "I welcome you with all my heart to Rome."

The crowds along the route numbered 400,000, including 10,000 to 12,000 British and a great many Americans, as shown by the number of Stars and Stripes displayed. The diplomatic body not being among those who welcomed King Edward at the station, the Ambassadors, Ministers and foreign officials, witnessed the passing of the cortege from various points of vantage. The American Ambassador and his family had a balcony in the middle of the Via Nazionale. The center of the American manifestation was at the American Episcopal church of St. Paul, and was decorated with American and Italian flags. The church was on the route of the procession and the rector, Dr. Norin, erected a large stand, where about 50 guests were seated.

When the two sovereigns appeared at the church, they were pleasantly greeted by hearing the chiming of the church play "God Save the King," followed by the Italian royal march. King Edward recognized the courtesy of the Americans by saluting and smiling.

Seldom before has the city been so sumptuously decorated. The streets and buildings were brilliant with flowers, flags and bunting, and on all sides were to be seen entwined flags and arms of Italy and Great Britain. The most imposing event of the reception was shortly after King Edward entered the Quirinal. The plaza below was packed with 50,000 people, who acclaimed his majesty frantically until he was obliged to appear twice on a balcony with Queen Helena on his right and King Victor Emmanuel on his left and surrounded by Italian Princes. The spectacle which met the eyes of King Edward was a remarkable one. At his feet was the excited populace of Rome, waving the sentiments of all Italy. Against the horizon on his right was the colossal dome of St. Peter's, glistening under the flaming rays of the setting sun, while

frowning above was the historic Janiculum Hill, with the statue of the national hero, Garibaldi. In front was the Tower of Nero, to the left the ruins of Ancient Rome. King Edward, by his gestures, clearly expressed the deepest appreciation of the significance of the scene.

After a short rest at the Quirinal, King Edward re-entered his carriage, and, escorted by the cuirassiers, visited the queen-mother and then returned to the palace. Later he went to the British Embassy, where he remained until 7 o'clock, holding a reception to the English residents of Rome. He then returned to the Quirinal and dined with the King and Queen of Italy. The dinner was a strictly family repast.

All along the thoroughfare to the queen-mother's, to the embassy and back to the Quirinal, the streets were lined with enormous crowds who wildly cheered the British sovereign. The ovation was continuous. The decoration of the streets and public and private buildings was on a scale of lavish splendor, and was carried out under the direction of Signor Biffarelli, the sculptor, and Signor Mataloma, the painter. Their plan of decoration carried out the idea of fetes commemorating the peace of the world and Italy, as the birthplace of the fine arts and poetry, welcoming the royal and imperial guest.

Protestants Protest Again. LONDON, April 27.—The Protestant Alliance has telegraphed to the Secretary, who will be in attendance on King Edward at Rome, expressing his "intense regret that our Protestant King intends to visit the pope, who is described in the homilies of our established church as anti-Christ. We sincerely hope the rumors are absolutely unfounded."

NEW STYLE OF BOXERS

Has Enrolled Four-Fifths of One Province Against Foreigners. BERLIN, April 27.—The Cologne Volks Zeitung today prints a letter from a Catholic missionary in Shanghai, Province, China, saying that a new sect similar to the Boxers, has assumed enormous proportions in Kiang Naen. Eighty per cent of the population already are members, including many soldiers and officials. The writer adds that he expects a wholesale rising against foreigners and asserts that the Mandarins are using their influence to

Cotton Takes Command Today. PARIS, April 27.—Rear-Admiral Charles S. Cotton, commander-in-chief of the United States European squadron, arrived here today and visited the embassy to learn the details of the squadron as to participation in the recreation of President Loubet at Marseilles. Admiral Cotton said he would leave Paris tonight for Ville Franche, where he will assume command of the squadron tomorrow, and the warships will sail in the afternoon for Marseilles.

Wood Starts for Constantinople. VENICE, April 27.—Brigadier-General Leonard Wood, Major Scott and Lieutenant McCoy left here today by rail for Constantinople, whence they will sail for Egypt.

WEDDED AFTER LONG WAIT

EARL OF YARMOUTH AND MISS THAW MADE ONE.

Grand Ceremony at Pittsburgh Married by Delay, Change of Programme and Suit for Debt.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 27.—Amid scenes as impressive as a lavish display of wealth, the dignity of society and the solemnity of the ritual of the Protestant Episcopal Church could provide the marriage of George Francis Alexander Seymour, the Earl of Yarmouth, of England, and Alice Cornelia Thaw, of Pittsburgh, daughter of the late William Thaw, who was solemnized this afternoon in the Calvary Church.

The church was magnificently decorated for the occasion with palms, white drapings, white lilies and other potted plants, and the audience the most brilliant ever seen at a wedding in Pittsburgh. The bride wore a magnificent gown of ivory satin, trimmed with duchesse lace, made high-necked and with a court train. She wore the fine string of pearls that was her brother's wedding gift. The bridegroom wore the conventional frock coat and light trousers.

Joseph C. Thaw gave the bride away, and the Rev. W. L. McKean, assisted by the Rev. John H. Melville, were the officiating clergymen. Mrs. George Lauder Carnegie was her sister's matron of honor, while Miss Nancy Carnegie, Miss Martha Ferguson, Lady Jane Seymour, Miss Isobel May, Miss Elmer Wilson and Miss Mary Thaw Thompson served as bridesmaids. They wore white chiffon gowns, white leg-horn hats trimmed with white flowers and carried bunches of white and purple lilacs. Lord Edward Seymour was his brother's best man, and the ushers were J. Deniston Lyon, Dallas Byers, H. C. Norman, second secretary of the British Embassy; Count de la Gharraleska, H. Persch, of Philadelphia, and R. Haven Tebb, of London.

Preceding the ceremony an organ recital was rendered, while the 300 invited guests were being seated. When the scheduled time for the ceremonial, 4 o'clock, arrived, the wedding march was begun, but the bride party did not appear. For some reason the party was delayed, and did not arrive at the church until 4:45. In the meantime the wedding march had been repeated several times, and the audience plainly showed its anxiety. Many rumors were put in circulation, but nothing tangible could be learned to account for the delay. When the waiting became irksome the doors were thrown open to the public, and the edifice was quickly filled almost to suffocation.

Finally the bride party arrived, and at 4:45 the ceremony was begun. Harry Kornall Thaw, the bride's older brother, who was to have given her away, failed to put in an appearance, and her younger brother, Joseph, performed that portion of the ceremony, while Dallas Byers took the place of Joseph Thaw as one of the ushers. Aside from these unlooked-for changes, the wedding programme was carried out to the letter.

After the church ceremony, there was a reception at Lyndhurst, the Thaw residence, for 150 people. The house was splendidly decorated, and the collection of gifts

was most magnificent. The bride gave to her attendants diamond and amethyst bracelets.

The newly wedded couple left this evening for a brief honeymoon trip before leaving for England. The Earl of Yarmouth's father, the Marquis of Hertford, and his family, who came from England for the wedding, are to return to London at once. At noon today Congressman H. K. Foster and wife entertained the visiting guests at luncheon at the Union Club.

SUED ON HIS WEDDING DAY.

Earl of Yarmouth Takes Coolly English Summons for Debt.

PITTSBURGH, April 27.—The Earl of Yarmouth, who was today wedded to Miss Alice Thaw, had a disagreeable experience at his hotel shortly after his return from the Courthouse, where he had gone to procure his marriage license. When the Earl entered the Hotel Schenley about noon he was confronted by two Constables, who served him with a writ from the High Court of Justice, King's Bench Division, London, England, commanding the Earl to cause an appearance to be entered for him within 40 days in an action at the suit of the Rev. John H. Melville, General Securities Company, Limited.

In the bill of particulars the plaintiff's claim is for principal and interest due from the defendant under a covenant of the defendant contained in an indenture of mortgage dated September 8, 1902. The amount due under the covenant on December 11, 1902, is £200; interest at 20 per cent from that date until March 26, 1903, £27 5s 2d. The plaintiff also claims £300 at 20 per cent per annum until payment of judgment.

The Earl apparently took the matter coolly, and said at the conclusion of the reading: "That's all right; I'll attend to it."

B. B. Stafford, of Cadillac, Mich., a deputy game warden, yesterday shot and killed Chris Mechin, who with his son and three other men were resting on a porch for catching fish out of season.

Beattie Knecht, of Salt Lake, awoke from a 57-days' sleep yesterday, her weight having declined from 127 to 96 pounds. An abscess on the brain is the cause stated by doctors.

Judge Kilpatrick, of the United States Supreme Court, in New York, yesterday ordered receivers of the American Bicycle Company to accept the offer of \$100,000 made by the reorganization committee.

The indictment of Captain Sam Boyd, of the St. Louis police, charging him with wilful neglect in allowing a den of vice to exist in his district, was quashed yesterday by Judge Moore. The state will appeal.

Two more bodies, almost entirely con-

sumed, were found yesterday in the ruins of the Northwestern Star Oil Company's plant at Minneapolis. All the ten known victims of the explosion and fire are now accounted for.

Miss Jane Hawkins committed suicide at Bridgeport, Conn., yesterday, leaving a note saying that she was innocently the cause of separating a husband and wife, and hoped her death would remove the barrier between them.
