## EDWARD IN PARIS

French Capital Goes Into Ecstasy of Joy.

BLAZE OF COLOR AND LIGHT

Met on Arrival by President Loubet, British King Rides Between Glittering Lines of Soldiers and Cheering Throng to Embassy.

PARIS, May 1.—King Edward arrived here this afternoon and was accorded a hearty reception by the Republic. His Majesty's welcome at the Dauphine Railroad Station by President Loubet and the chief of staff and his drive through the Avenue of the Bole de Boulogne and the Champs Elysees presented a succession of brilliant spectacles. Everywhere the populace gave the King an enthusiastic greeting. King Edward showed the keenest appreciation of French good will.

Only scattered shouts of "Fashoda" and "Kruger" were heard, and they were lost in the tremendous volume of demonstrative approval.

Fast crowds filled the boulevards from the early hours, people struggling to gain vantage points along the route to be followed by the royal procession. On the square fronting the railroad station was a surging mass of humanity. A detachment of the First Cuirassiers kept back the crowds. The front of the station was draped with crimson and gold hangings and the interior was transformed into a superb reception room, hung with tapestry and decorated with flowers and plants. On the balcony was stationed the band of the Republican Guard.

President Loubet was surrounded by the Cabinet Ministers, the President of the Senate, the Chamber of Deputies, the Grand Commander of the Legion of Honor, the military and naval dignitaries and the diplomatic corps.

King and President Meet.  
As the train entered the station, the trumpets sounded a royal salute and the band played "God Save the King." King Edward descended from his car and advanced slowly and alone, smiling and saluting. He wore the scarlet uniform of a British Field Marshal, his chapeau topped by waving red and white plumes and his breast adorned with various insigne, including the Cross of Honor. President Loubet stepped forward and grasped the King's hand. The meeting between the sovereign and the President was cordial, almost demonstrative. M. Loubet welcomed the King to France, and the King expressed his thanks for the splendid manifestation in his honor.

King Edward and the members of his party entered state carriages with gorgeously-clad postilions and outriders, and, escorted by a regiment of Cuirassiers, drove to the British Embassy. The route of the procession was through the beautiful Avenue du Bois de Boulogne and the Avenue des Champs Elysees, arched with chestnut trees in full bloom. The lowering clouds which marked the earlier part of the day had broken up and the sun came forth.

Gleaming Banks of Soldiers.  
The avenues were lined with solid ranks of dragoons, cuirassiers, horse artillery, field batteries and infantry, guns, helmets and other trappings gleaming in the sunlight. Behind these martial walls the

people were banded, and all the trees, windows and balconies and house tops were crowded with spectators. It was estimated that 500,000 people gathered along the line. At the Arc de Triomphe the scene was majestic—long, shimmering lines of soldiery and forest of waving banners, with blaring bugles and rolling drums and succeeding bands taking up "God, Save the King."

The President and the King were continuously acclaimed as they passed through the lines of soldiery. Among the populace occasionally discordant shouts were heard, but the prevailing sentiment was strongly friendly.

King Edward alighted at the British Embassy on the Rue du Faubourg St. Honoré, where apartments had been prepared for him, including a throne-room furnished from the art treasures of the Borgheze Palace. Above the Embassy, transformed into a palace, the royal standard of Great Britain was raised. The Rue du Faubourg St. Honoré was densely packed, and the crowds continuously acclaimed his Majesty.

Pays Visit to Loubet.  
After a brief rest at the Embassy, King Edward proceeded with an escort to the Elysee Palace, where he was received by the President. They remained together alone for some time. When the King was on his way to the Elysee the crowds continued their friendly manifestations.

Paris today was given up to elaborate festivities, the government encouraging fetes similar to those of the 14th of July. The boulevards were ablaze with color, floral arches and artistic devices symbolized of royalty. Many American flags were displayed, and the United States Consulate was gay with bunting. Street amusements and dancing were proceeding everywhere, and the cafes teemed with merry-makers.

lights, the Column Vendome was crowned with lights, and along the boulevards arches supported flaming crowns and other devices of welcome to King Edward. The thoroughfares of the city were blocked with a good-natured crowd.

At Theater in Evening.  
President Loubet proceeded to the British Embassy at 8 o'clock and escorted the King through the illuminated streets to the Theater Francaise to witness the production of "L'Autor Danco." The entire theater was occupied by invited guests of the government, and the audience was made up of the foremost men and women of France. Upon arriving at the theater, King Edward paused in the foyer to chat with Prince Murat and other old friends. The audience rose to its feet as the King and the President entered the Presidential box on the right. King Edward wore evening dress and seemed keenly to enjoy the performance.

Glad They Are Friends Again.  
LONDON, May 2.—King Edward's visit to Paris is chronicled in the daily papers this morning with unusual elaboration. In the editorial articles on the subject is noticed a tone of the deepest gratification over the occurrence, which is characterized as an event of the first importance, and showing that the estrangement between Great Britain and France has at last come to an end.

JEWS BRUTALLY SLAIN.

Women and Children Share Fate of Men in Russia.

VIENNA, May 1.—Horrible brutalities are reported to have occurred during the recent riots at Kischeneff. Many women and children were victims of the mob, which included even the better classes of the inhabitants. Some of the victims were thrown from windows to the pavement. The rioters also pillaged the

synagogues and killed the caretakers. The damage done to property is estimated at several million roubles.

OPPOSE COMMERCIAL TREATIES.  
Prussian Lords Adopt Resolution in Favor of Ending Them.

BERLIN, May 1.—The Prussian House of Lords, whose proceedings are usually so uneventful and uninteresting, was enlivened today by a resolution from the Conservatives asking Chancellor von Bulow to use his influence to bring about the denunciation of commercial treaties and all treaties giving the most favored nation treatment that can be denounced. After the presentation of the resolution, which greatly surprised the Ministerialists, the latter hastily withdrew so as to avoid participating in the debate on the subject. The discussion assumed an unusually stormy character.

May Day Riots in Spain.  
MADRID, May 1.—May day labor demonstrations occurred in many towns of Spain. At Almonara the rioters fired upon the municipal tax officers and stoned the gendarmes. The Civil Guard dispersed them, and many persons were injured by saber cuts.

At Jullia, in the Province of Murcia, the unemployed invaded the town hall, demanding work. They fired on the gendarmes, who returned the fire, killing two and wounding others. One soldier was severely wounded.

Socialists Celebrate May Day.  
BERLIN, May 1.—The Socialists celebrated May day throughout Germany by public meetings and speeches. At the

The messenger will soon be received by the pontiff to present this gift.

LONDON, May 1.—At a meeting of the directors of the Charles T. Yerkes railroad yesterday, the names of James Speyer, Charles Jefferson Coolidge, J. A. Blair, Leonard F. Loree, R. A. McCurdy, and James H. Hyde were added to the directorate.

Vanderbilts in Rome.  
ROME, May 1.—Ambassador and Mrs. Meyer gave a dinner last night in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt.

Fatal Election Riot in Spain.  
MADRID, May 1.—The publication of the result of the recent elections led to

riot at Infesta, in the Province of Oviedo. The electors tried to force their way into the Council House, the gendarmes prevented them, and a conflict resulted in which seven persons were killed, including a Lieutenant of Gendarmes, and several were wounded.

Engineers Strike on the Clyde.  
GLASGOW, May 1.—The Clyde engineers struck today against a reduction in wages of 25 cents on time work and 3 per cent on piece work per week. The strike is expected to spread.

Police Capture Monastery.  
MARSEILLES, May 1.—The barricaded monastery of the Capuchins here today was taken by the police, who arrested the friars and their sympathizers within the building.

Boltonmakers Win Strike.  
NEW YORK, May 1.—At 3:30 o'clock this morning, Business Agent McKay, of the Boltonmakers' organization, announced that the strike had been settled, and that all the men would return to work this morning. He said the Master Shipbuilders had agreed to pay them \$3 a day and to allow them 5 1/2 hours for each day overtime. He also said the union was recognized throughout the agreement, and that

the bosses promised to employ union men as far as the union could furnish them. The boltonmakers' helpers will receive an increase of five per cent.

Strike Fever in Kansas City.  
KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 1.—Eight hundred sewer workers and 300 iron molders struck in this city tonight. The total number of unionists on strike here is 1200.
