One of the greatest Bohemian-American violinists now residing in this country, Wenzel Kopta, of San Francisco, Cal., made his first appearance in Portland last night at the Marquam Grand Theatre when he fairly surprised the audience by his wonderful violin playing. For some time past Kopta has led a pastoral existence, with his family, at the seashore in California, and it was only at the entreaty of his admirers that the virtuoso agreed to come out of seclusion and play in public again. Recently he appeared before the students of Stanford University and met with a great ovation. But up to now, he has not been very well known in this section, and that is probably why the seating capacity of the theatre was not taxed. The concert was a very pleasant one, and Miss Lora Steers, under whose direction it was given, is entitled to congratulations.

Kopta is now about 45 years old, and he has not the usual outward marks of the violin virtuoso about him, for he wears ordinary clothes and his hair is not long. He is ruddy faced and is not at all shrouded in a spiritual air. He plays on a 1600 Stradivarius, and when he first began Paganini's "Second Concerto" it was clearly evident that one was listening to a violin wizard. His tone is singularly pure and sweet, and he does all that one can expect of a virtuoso. He delights in showing how easily he can overcome technical difficulties, and his bowing is a revelation in double harmony. MUSIC FOR PRESIDENT.

Bids to be in Tomorrow—Programme for Reception.

All musicians wishing to participate in the Presidential reception parade are requested to file their bids with Colonel O. Summers, chairman of the committee on music, at the Custom House, not later than Wednesday at noon, as there will be a meeting of the music committee at 4 o'clock that afternoon at the Commercial Club rooms to consider the bids. The committee consists of Colonel Summers, Paul Wessinger and George Taylor. This committee has received a large number of bids for music for that occasion, a good number of them satisfactory as to cost. It is therefore necessary that all bids should be in at that time to be considered by the committee as a whole.

The committee on details of the programme for the President's reception, consisting of Colonel Summers, John H. Hall, R. W. Mitchell, H. C. Breeden, I. N. Fieschner and C. H. McLean, will meet at the Commercial Club rooms together with General Charles F. Beebe, grand marshal, to take up matters of detail so far as relate to the reception.
