IN WATERY GRAVES

Fifteen Lives Lost With a Fishing Schooner.

REEF STRUCK DURING A FOG

Three Men Escape by Leaping to Rocks, but Rebound of Ship Carries Companions Out to Sea and Death.

CANSON, C. B., May 6.—The American fishing schooner, *Gloriana*, Captain George Stoddard, of Gloucester, Mass., ran ashore last night during a thick fog on the cliffs at Vale Cove, near White Point Ledges, and 15 of the crew, including the captain, were drowned, out of a total of 18. The survivors are: John Richards, Eugene Leblanc and Frank Nickerson.

The drowned are: Captain George Stoddard, of Gloucester; Armstrong Thomas, Eli Moulson, Amos Goodwin, Reuben Surrette, Harry French, Fred Doucette, Thomas Franklin, George V. Mulse, Martin Goodwin, Alex. Benson, Charles Pierce, John Moulson, Arthur Bonaghan, one unknown.

When the *Gloriana* struck on the ledge, she passed over the outer one, but upon the inner reef, butted against a cliff of rocks, and then fell off into the sea. When the vessel struck the cliff, Richards, Leblanc and Nickerson were on deck and they ran forward, rushed out on the bowsprit and clung to the edge of the vessel, and then fell off into the sea. The high seas were breaking clean over the vessel, and she swung broadside on the ledge and commenced pounding heavily. Lines were thrown ashore from the schooner several times, but they were either broken or torn from their fastenings on the rocks by the surging of the vessel. Four of the crew jumped overboard and attempted to swim ashore, but they were caught in the breakers, dashed on the rocks, and killed in the attempt. The others, who were on the vessel, took to the rigging and clung there while their strength lasted, but the enormous seas were more than they could battle against, and one by one they were swept away. The three men on the rocks could see their companions clinging to the rigging and hear their shouts for help above the roar of the sea, but it was impossible to do anything to save them.

The three survivors spent a terrible night on the cliff. When daylight dawned they saw one after another, and the rigging and made their way to the mainland for assistance. The shore folk hurried to the scene of the wreck and the man was taken from the rigging, but he was dead.

The place where the *Gloriana* was wrecked is one of the most dangerous on the Nova Scotia Coast. It is less than a mile from where the steamer *Bismarck* was wrecked last year, and only half a mile from the scene of the wreck of the steamer *Tiber* in February, 1902, when 22 lives were lost. The three survivors were brought here this afternoon, and are being cared for by the United States Consul. They say that the vessel is a total wreck. None of the bodies have been recovered.

No Report on Saginaw Wreck.
PHILADELPHIA, May 6.—Captain

James I. Tunnell, of the Clyde steamer *Saginaw*, which was sunk yesterday by the steamer *Hamilton* off the Virginia coast, was brought here today from Norfolk. Two of Captain Tunnell's ribs are fractured and his head is badly lacerated. He is also internally injured and suffers from shock. He was removed to his home.

A RACE AGAINST DEATH

Effort of Man Stricken With Consumption to Meet His Son.

CHICAGO, May 6.—J. T. Toohy, an Australian brewer, died today, but it was after a desperate struggle with death, in which he remained alive almost a week by the sheer strength of his will. Mr. Toohy was en route from England to Australia. He knew he would never reach his native land, but he had a son in San Francisco who had hurried to that city from Australia, and he was determined to live to see his boy. A year ago Mr. Toohy realized that the end was near. He was 67 years of age and ill of consumption. He decided to visit England and consult famous specialists. They told him there was no hope and warned him that he soon would die. He announced his intention of returning to Australia. The physicians told him it was foolhardy; that he would never survive the voyage across the Atlantic. Mr. Toohy defied his doctors. He told the world he would meet his son in San Francisco. He and his wife, Mrs. Toohy, and their three daughters reached Chicago Saturday morning. The father wanted to proceed, but physicians would not allow it. "I must go to San Francisco," he said. Early this morning he died.

A few minutes before a telegram arrived from San Francisco. It read: "I beat you here. When will you arrive?" On a journey to Sydney, Australia. Mr. Toohy was one of the wealthiest men in Australia.

WILL STOP BULLFIGHTS.

New Mexican Governor Also Proposes to Suppress Gambling.

DENVER, May 6.—A special to the News from El Paso, Tex., says: It is learned from absolutely reliable sources that Don Luis Terrazas, the new Governor of the State of Chihuahua, will not only refuse consent for prizefights to be held in his state, but will also endeavor to suppress all forms of gambling. The said Governor has been in the United States for some time, and he has put an end to the movement to hold prizefights in Juarez, Mexico, across the border from this city.

Young Clark Buys Valuable Mine.

HELENA, Mont., May 6.—Charles W. Clark, of California, son of Senator W. A. Clark, has bought the Rosario Mine, at Guadalupe Calvo, Chihuahua, Mex. Announcement of the deal was made today by Frank L. Sizer, mining engineer. The ore is low grade gold and silver. The purchase is said to have been for \$500,000.

Famous Hunter Dying.

LIVINGSTON, Mont., May 6.—Uncle Dan Yancey, who has lived in Yellowstone Park for 30 years, and whom President Roosevelt visited on his trip there, is dying of old age. He is 79 years old. He is one of the most famous characters of the place and a famous hunter.

WHITES ADMIT NEGROES

ALABAMA REPUBLICANS ESTABLISH A PRECEDENT.

Colored Men Are Admitted to Conference—Name of Roosevelt Loudly Cheered.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., May 6.—For the first time in the history of the Republican party in this state negroes were given recognition at the conference of the Republicans held here today. The whites took seats on one side of the hall, and the negroes on the other. Referees W. F. Aldrich, Charles H. Scott and J. Thompson organized the conference.

In calling the convention to order, Mr. Aldrich explained the object of the meeting. The referees had been appointed, he said, to correct mistakes and right the wrongs of the recent Birmingham convention. The speakers paid a tribute to President Roosevelt, and urged that only one delegation be sent to the next National convention, and that pledged for Roosevelt. His reference to the President received a loud applause.

Mr. Hundley, in assuming the chair, said he desired to refute certain charges. He assailed the Birmingham convention for denying the right of the negro to participate in that convention. He said he had further trust this country in the hands of the negro with a plow and hoe than the white man with the torch and bomb.

The conference adopted a plan advised by the referees, which in effect is a repudiation of the action of the Birmingham convention in barring qualified negro voters from participation. The negroes urged that recognition of the present state executive committee be withheld, but this proposition was voted down.

A meeting of the state executive committee, called by Chairman Wilman, chief of the Idaho White Citizens' League, at Birmingham May 12, and at that meeting the new amalgamation of negroes and Administration Republicans will attempt to capture the party machinery.

WILL CONTEST ELECTION.

Baltimore Republicans Allege Fraud in Majority Contest.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 6.—The ballots in 304 of the election precincts cast at yesterday's municipal election in this city, give Robert M. McLane, Democrat, for Mayor, a plurality of 528 over Frank M. Wachter, Republican. The ballots in the remaining four precincts are still uncounted, owing to the disputes among the judges of elections. They are now in possession of the Board of Election Supervisors, who announce today that the boxes will not be opened until tomorrow. It is not thought probable that the count of these ballots will materially change the result in favor of McLane.

It was announced tonight that counsel had been engaged by the Republican leaders to contest the apparent election of McLane. Mr. Wachter, the Republican candidate, and his party leaders, charge that many ballots cast in his favor have been illegally thrown out, and they announce they will appeal to the courts.

ANOTHER CLEVELAND BOOM.

Boston Post Says His Success Means Democrats Are Again Sane.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, May 6.—The Boston Herald is another independent paper that comes out editorially today and says the people are demanding the nomination of Cleveland,

and calls it a restoration of sanity in the Democratic party. The Cleveland candidacy, or rather the talk of bringing out Cleveland for a fourth nomination, engenders about all the political discussion there is in the papers at present.

KEY TO ROOSEVELT'S SUCCESS.

Dr. Wilson Says He Was a Politician Not Seeking Office.

CHICAGO, May 6.—"President Roosevelt owes his high position to the fact that he was a politician who did not want to hold office," said Dr. Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton University, last night, in addressing the annual meeting of the Twentieth Century Club in the Fine Arts building. The subject of the address was "Patriotism."

"Roosevelt was a thorn in the side of the politicians," continued the speaker. "He attended their meetings and became one of them, but if things did not suit him he said so. He was so sure he knew how it ought to be done and he was so much trouble to the politicians that they gave him a position to get rid of him. 'If men would study politics, not striving for office, it would change the face of affairs all over the country. The danger of our age is not partisanship, but that our thoughtful men will belong to no party. Don't isolate yourself. Go into the arena and take your active part.'"

SUIT TO DISPOSSESS MAYOR.

Republican Official at Anaconda Will Not Surrender to Socialists.

ANACONDA, Mont., May 6.—John W. Frinke, Socialist Mayor of Anaconda, is the District Court today to dispossess H. W. Stephens, the Republican holdover. Stephens refused to give up his office to Frinke on the ground that the latter failed to qualify in the time required by law. Frinke asks that he be given the office to which he was elected by a majority of the voters. Frinke should have qualified in the days after receiving notice of his election. He alleges he got notice April 22 and qualified May 2. The City Clerk maintains that he mailed the notice April 20.

PLATT MOVES AGAINST LOW.

"Easy" Boss Will Ask Republicans Not to Meet Citizens.

NEW YORK, May 6.—Senator T. C. Platt today announced that he would exercise his influence with the Republican county committee to prevent that organization being represented at the Citizens' Union conference next Monday night. The proposed conference is for the purpose of considering an anti-Tamm campaign for Mayor. Senator Platt considered it too early to begin holding conferences, and declared he never said he favored the renomination of Low.

LAWMAKERS CALLED TO MEET.

Montana Legislators Will Make Appropriation for 1904 Rate.

HELENA, Mont., May 6.—Governor Toole called the Legislature in extra session on May 28. The proclamation and summons is for the purpose of passing an appropriation for a Montana exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, and for appropriating funds for the maintenance and care of the Capitol grounds and building during 1903 and 1904.

Complete Returns at Omaha.

OMAHA, May 6.—Complete returns from yesterday's city election give Mayor Moore a plurality over Benson, the Citizens' candidate of 560, and 1000 over Howell, the Democratic nominee. The majority also elected City Clerk and Treasurer, and the Democrats elected the Controller, Tax Commissioner, City Attorney and Building Inspector. The City Council will stand seven Republicans and two Democrats. The vote was the largest ever polled at a city election here.

Reno Goes Republican.

RENO, Nev., May 6.—The city election yesterday resulted in the election of a Republican Mayor, City Clerk and City Attorney. The Republicans elected two

AMERICANS ARE HISSED.

Nicaraguans Show Their Feeling Against President Roosevelt.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—Reports received by the Pacific Mail steamer *Colon*, from Panama, indicate that General Emiliano Chamorro, the conservative leader of Nicaragua, is making great progress against the forces of President Zelaya. Passengers on the *Colon* relate the state of affairs in Nicaragua. General Chamorro has captured the vessels of General Zelaya, the newly proclaimed President, was at last accounts on the march from Honduras with a large force to attack the government forces at Leon.

WILL DELAY CANAL TREATY.

President of Colombia Will Not Call Extra Session of Congress.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The latest advices received indicate that President Marroquin, of Colombia, has almost decided not to call a special session of the Colombian Congress to act on the canal treaty. In the election in progress the opposition continues to gain and the prospects for a government majority are so doubtful that President Marroquin seems disposed to act.

REPORT OF GOMES' LANDING CORRECT.

PUERTO CABELLO, May 6.—The report from Caracas that the Vice-President of Venezuela, General Gomez, had landed 200 Venezuelan Government troops at Tucacas is correct. The troops will go to Barquisimeto, where General Matos, the revolutionary leader, is supposed to be, and attempt to destroy the nucleus of the revolution in the West and open the railroad to traffic.

EUGENE, Or., May 6.—(Special.)—The Eugene High School has accepted a challenge from the Seattle High School for a competitive track meet. The meet will be held in this city May 30. Negotiations are also in progress for a field meet with the McMinnville High School, but no final arrangements have been made.

taken up, but in view of the sentiment existing, much doubt is felt here as to whether it will be acted upon.
The outlook, however, does not discourage the officials here. The United States Government has gone so far in its negotiations with Colombia that confidence is felt here that President Marroquin will feel himself bound to carry out the engagements into which he has entered. The Colombian Constitution contains a provision enlarging the powers of the executive in case of disturbed conditions, and if there is the slightest sign of forcible opposition to the government or of revolutionary uprising, such as are hinted at in the stories from Kingston, Jamaica, and from Isthmian points, indicative of a purpose to sever the isthmus from Colombian sovereignty, the President may arrogate to himself dictatorial power and go to the length of ratifying the canal treaty without assent of Congress. If he does so, the United States Government will sustain the title thus acquired.
