HIS REGIME AT END

Machen Out of Free Delivery
Service for Good.

METHODS TOO QUESTIONABLE

Postal Department Will Probably
Take Care of the Deposed Official.
In Some Other Branch of the
Government.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, May 13.—It is the consensus of
opinion among those who have been watching
the investigation in the Postoffice Depart-
ment that A. W. Machen will not be re-
stored to the office of Superintendent of
Free Delivery, although it is quite prob-
able he will be offered some other office in
the department. Now that Machen is out
of his old office, it is a comparatively easy
matter to prevent his reinstatement, but
it will take a very concise showing of facts
to prevent his appointment to another of-
fice.

The action of the department today in
putting an end to the practice of inform-
ing manufacturing firms of the determina-
tion to establish new service, from time
to time, is a rebuke to Machen, and will
be a criticism of his methods. It is not evi-
dence that he was acting illegally. It was
a matter of discretion with him so long as
his superiors had no objection. It is be-
cause of his business methods, which are
quite generally criticized, that he will
probably be permanently relieved of the
charge of the free delivery service and
placed in a less responsible position.

Postmaster-General Payne is disposed to
deal leniently with Machen, as he is not
convinced that the deposed official is guilty
of any gross wrongdoing. He appreciates
that Machen's superiors are as much to
blame as he for methods which have been
adopted. At the same time, he realizes
the intense hostility that has grown up
between Machen and First Assistant Post-
master-General Wynne, and would not
want to humiliate either by bringing them
together again. Machen and Wynne no
longer speak when they meet, and this
fact will have its influence in causing
Machen to be given another position. He
himself may regard such a transfer as a
humiliation and resign when the investi-
gation is closed, but he will not resign
until the facts have been brought out, for
he earnestly maintains that he is guilty
of no wrong act.

MILES SEEKS INFORMATION. He Asks Root to Tell Him Who Gave Out His Reports.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Secretary Root
today received a letter from Lieutenant-
General Miles, asking what portion of his
reports were given to the press, by whom
made public and to whom furnished. The
Secretary called in the officer who fur-
nished the reports, and gave directions to
him to prepare a statement showing what
had been done. The reply to General
Miles will be sent tomorrow, and will
show that the Adjutant-General's office
furnished copies of that portion of Gen-
eral Miles' report bearing on the military
conditions in the islands, together with
replies of the heads of bureaus to whom
the report had been referred for remarks
concerning the matters under their direc-
tion. The reply also will show that the
Judge Advocate-General furnished a com-

plete copy of the report on cruelties and
atrocities, together with a copy of the
letter of the Judge Advocate-General to
the Secretary of War, which told what
the department had done concerning the
subjects treated on in General Miles' report.
It has been charged that all of General
Miles' reports were not furnished to the
press by the War Department.

STRENGTHENS AMERICAN CLAIM.

Ex-Alaskan Official Gives Testimony
in Boundary Dispute.

HONOLULU, T. H., May 6, via Victoria,
B. C., May 13.—An important affidavit in
the matter of the Alaskan boundary dis-
pute has been obtained by the American
Government from J. U. Smith, of Hilo,
Hawaii, who was United States Commis-
sioner for the District of Alaska in 1897.
Smith states his legal residence, by order
of the President of the United States, was
Dyea, which is within the disputed terri-
tory, and that he exercised jurisdiction
with the knowledge and consent of the
Canadian officials both in Dyea and Skag-
way.

In an interview published here he stated
that his authority was recognized by the
Canadians, and with his affidavit is sub-
mitted a map which was made by him and
a Canadian official, marking the boundary
line of British and American jurisdiction
in accordance with the American conten-
tions.

TO OUST NEGRO POSTMASTER.

Maryland Representative Will Ask
for Discontinuance of Office.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 13.—William H.
Jackson, Republican member of Congress
from the First Maryland District, an-
nounced today that he will ask for the
discontinuance of the postoffice at Quin-
doquia, in Somerset County, to which
Andrew J. Day, a negro, was recently
appointed. This is said to be the first
colored Postmaster appointed in this state.
Representative Jackson says he will ask
for the discontinuance of the postoffice
because it is unnecessary and because
Day is not a proper person to hold such
an office.

No Danger in Plague Situation.

LIMA, Peru, May 13.—There have been
no new developments in the alleged bu-
bolic plague situation at Lima and Callao.

SALOONS ARE WANTED.

New Hampshire Votes to Legalize
the Liquor Traffic.

CONCORD, N. H., May 13.—Every one
New Hampshire's 11 cities yesterday
voted to grant licenses for the sale of
intoxicating liquors for the coming year.
Of the 13 towns so far heard from, 10
went for no license and the remainder
in its favor. This was the first time the
people of the cities and towns had
voted on license under the recently adopt-
ed repeal of the state prohibition law,
and the overwhelming vote in favor of the
sale of liquor in the cities was the sur-
prise of the day.

The "license" majorities as far as re-
ported were: Concord, 78; Somersworth,
28; Berlin, 24; Keene, 20; Dover, 78;
Nashua, 134; Rochester, 30; Manchester,
120; Portsmouth, 30.

The license fees under the new law
are fixed by law, and are very high, \$100
in the towns and more in the cities. The
number of saloons is limited by law.

French Deserter Arrested for Murder.

GLASGOW, May 13.—Paul Martin, a de-
serter from the French army, was arrest-
ed here today charged with the murder
in Paris of Mme. de Brienne, a well-
known person, who went to that city from
America and who was recently found
strangled in her room.

WARSHIPS WILL LEAVE

AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN SQUADRON TO
QUIT SALONICA.

Emperor Refuses Prince Ferdinand
an Audience—Chief Danger Now
Is Turbulence of Turks.

VIENNA, May 13.—The Austro-Hun-
garian squadron has been ordered to leave
Salonica. The turret-ship Wien, however,
will remain there.

The request of Prince Ferdinand of Bul-
garia for an audience with Emperor Fran-
cis Joseph has apparently been refused.
Prince Ferdinand has passed through
Vienna and Budapest, returning to Sofia,
where he arrived today. While here he
had no communication with the Austrian
Foreign Office. Recent happenings in
Macedonia have by no means strengthened
the Prince's position, and it is a ques-
tion in official circles here whether the
real authority at Sofia is not now lodged
in the Macedonian committee.

The chief danger in the Balkans is now
thought to lie in the turbulence of the
Turkish population, whose fury against
the Christians is now being fanned by
trouble. The attitude of the Turkish gov-
ernment is viewed with much interest by
diplomats here. It is feared that Turkey
will permit the massacre of Christians,
thereby enabling the Moslems to expand
their wrath.

Immediate developments are awaited
with the greatest anxiety. The resources
of Turkey are said to be so strained as to
compel the advance against the Albanians
to be suspended. It is believed that the
mobilization of 100,000 men was only ef-
fected with the aid of the Sultan's pri-
vate purse. The Sultan has just con-
firmed the ex-Vizier, Said Pasha, on the situation,
and it is rumored that His Majesty has
summoned a financial commission to con-
sider negotiations to effect the payment of
the troops in Macedonia and Albania, the
army contractors having refused further
supplies.

OUTRAGES PRESAGE WAR.

Feeling in Bulgaria Is Growing
Bitter Against Turkey.

LONDON, May 14.—The correspondent
of the Times at Sofia, says:
"Some of the most outrages during the
recent outbreak at Monastir were perpe-
trated by Jews, who, anxious to show
their sympathy with the stronger side,
joined the Bashi Bazouks in maltreating
Bulgarians. According to official accounts,
the slaughter of Bulgarians was consid-
erably greater than was at first supposed.
At Zaptari, 30 were killed or wounded. It
is useless to conceal the fact that these
occurrences are arousing an extremely
bitter spirit in Bulgaria and it is allowed to
continue the danger of conflict with
Turkey will be greatly increased."

Massacre of Jews Denied.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 13.—The report
published in the United States that a mas-
sacre of Jews similar to the one which
took place recently at Kishinef, capital
of Bessarabia, has occurred at Tirozol,
seven miles from Kishinef, is officially
denied and is universally discredited.

POWERS WILL REVIVE SCHEME.

Bagdad Railroad Likely to Be an In-
ternational Route.

PARIS, May 13.—The Bagdad Railroad
project, which was recently agitated by
the powers, is likely to be revived in an
important new form, internationalizing
a new route to India, somewhat similar
to the international status of the Suez
Canal.

It is learned in authoritative quarters
that the recent negotiations on the sub-

ject were stopped because of the objec-
tions of France and Great Britain to ac-
cede to Germany's wish to have prepon-
derating control over the route and also
because Russia intimated her usual will-
ingness to have her French ally co-oper-
ate in a project having German pre-
dominance.

Overtures are now being made to re-
move this objectionable feature by inter-
nationalizing the route, each of the in-
terested powers alternating in the presi-
dency and preponderance in the direc-
torate. There is reason to believe that
French and Russian official and financial
interests approve of the plan, which, if
acceptable to Germany, will be the basis
for an agreement between the powers.

REBELS DRIVEN FROM TETUAN.

Imperial Forces Are Inflicting Great
Losses on the Rebels.

MADRID, May 13.—A dispatch from
Ceuta, Morocco, announces that the tribes
who attacked Tetuan Monday were re-
pulsed. They stubbornly fought their way
through the suburbs to the foot of the
walls, but the imperial forces eventually
regained their lost position and drove off
the rebels with heavy losses on both sides.

In a later dispatch from Ceuta says a con-
siderable number of rebels are dispersed on
the hills who have arrived there by sea. Re-
tuan states that the battle was sus-
pended in order to allow the opposing
forces to bury their dead, numbering 300.
Many houses are destroyed on the walls
of Tetuan, which still has three days' supply
of ammunition.

Advices from Tangier announce that the
imperial forces have routed the rebel
mountaineers, near, inflicting great
losses upon the enemy.

POWERS MADE DEMANDS.

Russia Was Warned Not to Re-
occupy Manchuria.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 13.—Mail advices
from the Orient state that when it was
learned that Russia was endeavoring to
secure a secret treaty with China in-
volving Russian dominance in Manchuria,
the British and Japanese Ministers at
Peking, the British and Japanese Ministers
addressed a joint note to Prince Ching to
the effect that further delay by Russia
in evacuating Manchuria would necessitate
the two countries taking measures to
expedite the evacuation.

The joint note of the two Ministers fur-
ther stated that their governments would
not approve of any agreement regarding
the administration of Manchuria prej-
udicial to their interests.

LARGEST BATTLESHIP AFLOAT.

Great Britain Launches the Com-
monwealth on the Clyde.

LONDON, May 13.—The Commonwealth,
the largest battleship afloat, was launched
at Govan, on the Clyde, today. She is the
first vessel of the British navy to have
her ten-inch guns protected by an exten-
ded barbettes. Instead of casemates. Her
other armament consists of four 12-inch
guns, four 8.2-inch guns and 24 small guns.
The new battleship's speed is to be 18.5
knots per hour and she will carry a crew
of 750 men. The Commonwealth's 16,000
tons displacement, and her engines are to
be of 10,000 horsepower.

Missionaries Abandon Mequinez.

LONDON, May 13.—Advices from Mo-
rocco say the American missionaries have
practically abandoned Mequinez owing to
the critical situation, but there is no an-
xiety regarding the missionaries elsewhere.

Letters received here from Fez this week
say the surrounding country is quiet and
that the outlook is more hopeful in con-
sequence of the rains having improved the
agricultural prospects.

Making Ready for War.

military district of Odessa included a list

WORK ON FAIR EXHIBIT.

China Is Making Ready to Come to
St. Louis.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Under date of
Pekin, March 30, Minister Conger reports
that he has been informed by Prince Pu
Lun, General Imperial Commissioner of
the Chinese government to the Louisiana
Purchase Exposition, that he had directed
the Chinese Assistant Commissioner, Mr.
Hung Kai Chia, to go to Shanghai and
prepare a collection for the exposition. He
is later to proceed to the United States
with Chinese mechanics and erect a
building in the World's Fair grounds for
the Chinese exhibit. The Treasury De-
partment has been requested to permit the
entry of the Chinese.

Church Emity Grows Pliercer.

ROME, May 13.—Various documents re-
ceived by the Vatican, as well as by the
cardinals, by every mail from the Philip-
pines tend to prove that the enmity be-
tween the secular clergy and the friars

in the archipelago is far from abating.
One of the most recent and most violent
accusations against the friars was sent by
Salvador Torres, a professor in the
college at Dagupan, Luzon. The general
feeling in the Vatican is unfavorable to
the friars. They have, however, some
very strong supporters, led by Cardinal
Vives y Tuto.
