

Sellwood Will Fail,


Seliwood Will Fail. The Milwaukie road, or street, cannot be widened to 30 feet between Holgate street and Seliwood. This is the report of D. M. Donaugh, president of the Seli-wood Improvement Association and chair-man of the street committee. It is neces-sary that a strip of land ten feet wide and over half a mile long be taken off the Ladd tract, but Mr. Ladd says he holds his land at H000 an acre, and is not concerned about the widening of the Mil-waukie road. waukle road.

This seems to settle the widening of this street. If Mr. Ladd will not donate the strip from his land, none of the others on the opposite side will make a contri-builon without pay. There seems no way to get another street opened through to Sellwood until it becomes so densely settied that another street is an actual ne-cessity. It will probably be a rather nig-rag street when it is opened. However, the problem will have to be met in time.
