COMPERS FAVORS IT

Union of Employers Would Promote Peace.

UNION WOULD BE UNDERSTOOD

President of the American Federation Believes Every Dispute is an Influence Toward Better Conditions in the Future.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—President Samuel Compers, of the American Federation of Labor, is an advocate of the organization of employers as well as of workmen. Speaking on this topic to a Post reporter today, Mr. Compers said: "Employers will find it to their advantage to be organized, and not only this, but to deal with organized labor. The movement to form unions among the business men will tend rather to prevent conflict than to promote trouble. The better the organization on both sides, the better it will be for both. Organized employers will be better able to understand the demand of organized labor and to meet these demands without friction. There has been much hot talk about the increasing demands of labor. My experience has taught me not to be an alarmist, and I am not alarmed over this particular situation in general. So long as human nature is as it is, there will be manifestations of discontent both from laborers and from employers. But I believe that every day is making for better conditions. We hear more of labor troubles now than we did years ago, but we must not judge too hastily from this that laborers are any more widely discontented or that they are unreasonable. When an industrial dispute occurs in our time it involves so much that it must attract attention. But every dispute is an influence toward a better condition of things in the future."

CEBU FANATICS ROUTED.

Americans Defeat Several Bands—Lieutenant Is Missing.

MANILA, May 18.—Colonel Taylor, with a force of constabulary, defeated several bands of fanatics in the interior of Cebu island, May 18, killing 30 and wounding several of them. A few of the constabulary were wounded. Lieutenant Walker is missing. The fanatics reportedly charged the constabulary line.

STRIKERS LET CARS RUN

Trolley Lines at Bridgeport Are Again in Operation.

Two Nonunion Men, Guarded by Deputy Sheriffs, Are Fired Upon! but No One Is Hurt.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., May 18.—With very few exceptions, the running of trolley cars on the lines of the Connecticut Railway & Lighting Company, manned by nonunion motormen and conductors, was not interfered with today. There were 15 men and boys locked up during the day on charges of intimidation. The majority of the prisoners were using offensive language to the strike-breakers at the time of their arrest. The men were placed under \$1000 bonds each, and the boys were obliged to furnish a \$500 bond. A trolley car manned by nonunion men was fired upon by two Deputy Sheriffs fired upon by a man upon the West Side this afternoon. No damage was done, and the man escaped after a chase by the officers. It is announced that Mayor Mulvihill has agreed not to interfere with the conduct of the police during the strike, and that Superintendent Birmingham, of the police, and Sheriff Hawley, would be allowed to work together unhampered for the preservation of order.

RAILROAD STRIKE NEARING END.

Strikers' Attorney Makes Peace Move in Injunction Proceeding.

JACKSON, Tenn., May 18.—When the Federal Court met here today to hear the arguments in the injunction proceeding against the striking employees of the Mobile & Ohio Railroad, Judge W. T. Irwin, of Peoria, Ill., spoke for the strikers. He said on the face of the bill any Judge would have to grant the restraining order issued by Judge Hammond. It was the same as that approved by the Supreme Court in the Debe case and that the strikers in this case had no intention of ever having any desire to do any of the things prohibited by the restraining order and they reserved their defense for the hearing. Judge Irwin, on behalf of the strikers, then submitted to an order for a temporary injunction in the final hearing to be in the same language as the restraining order, and they reserved their defense for the hearing. The inference is general that this insures a speedy settlement of the strike.

VOTES MONEY TO STRIKERS.

Central Labor Union Will Aid the New York Subway Men.

NEW YORK, May 18.—The Central Federated Union of America declared today that it stood by and aid with money the subway strikers in their demands upon the contractors for a workday of eight hours at \$2 a day. The police were called out today to quell a riot at Broadway and 68th street, where several Italian women, evidently strike sympathizers, had been intimidating the men at work on the subway. Stones were thrown indiscriminately at the women, and one of the women was injured, one of which was two feet long.

The police in the Bronx borough, who were on the lookout all night for any signs of disturbances along the subway, arrested two batches of Italian strikers early today. The men, 21 in number, who were arrested, were loitering along the excavation. One of them had a loaded revolver in his pocket.

The police reported that a gang of strikers attacked a house in which dynamite

is stored, but were fought off by the watchmen who called the police by blowing the steamwhistle.

BUILDING IS NOW TIED UP.

Denver Teamworkers' Association Votes to Go Out.

DENVER, May 18.—There have been few developments of an important nature today in the strike situation. It is said the National Teamworkers' Association, for the payment of strike benefits. Work by the building trades is being hampered by the teamsters' strike, and tonight the Teamworkers' Association voted to go out, so that building will be practically tied up, even though the other union workmen should take no action. The State Board of Arbitration and Conciliation of the Chamber of Commerce and the Allied Printing Trades continued their efforts today to bring about an agreement between the Citizens' Alliance and the labor unions, but apparently with little prospect of adjusting matters, as the general committee of organized labor adheres to its determination not to recognize the alliance.

Confirm Pledge to Aid Strikers.

DENVER, May 18.—The executive board of the Western Federation of Miners, preparatory to the annual convention of the body in Denver next week, met this morning at the general headquarters and discussed the local strike situation in all its phases. The federation had, through President Mercer and Secretary-Treasurer, agreed to stand by labor here in its trouble, and the board today confirmed that pledge. It is said, to the extent of \$25,000 if needed. The executive board of the American Labor Union will meet in Denver Wednesday preparatory to the annual convention in this city next Monday. These two conventions will bring representatives of the American Federation of Labor to Denver to confer on a plan which has for its purpose the complete settlement of the differences between the American Labor Union and the American Federation of Labor, which have existed for nearly two years.

CARPENTERS' WAR TO END.

Seceding Union Will Return to the Amalgamated Order.

NEW YORK, May 18.—After a bitter fight that lasted nearly two months, the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners today made application for admission to the United Board of Building Trades, which they left in a huff at the beginning of the feud against the Amalgamated Union. The defeat of the Brotherhood of Carpenters is admitted the men now on strike must be ordered back to work.

More Men in Strikers' Places.

OMAHA, May 18.—Although there were more men at work today for employers against whom a strike was declared three weeks ago than at any time since the struggle began, there was far from a general resumption of business. The large restaurants, which had announced they would open today, failed to do so, and the laundries did little if anything. The employing teamsters, however, had a good force at work, although drivers were guarded by deputies.

Strike Out of Sympathy.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., May 18.—Two hundred punch press operators of the General Electric Company went on strike today demanding the reinstatement of several of the leading members of the union, who, it is declared by the men, were discharged because of their aggressiveness. The men assert that the company is trying to disintegrate their union. There is a strong probability that the

holders in the employ of the company will strike tomorrow to enforce their demands for a 10 per cent increase in wages.

DENOUNCED BY LABOR.

Arbitration Boards Declared to Be Snarls and Humbugs.

CHICAGO, May 18.—Arbitration boards, employers' associations and labor commissioners were denounced in the Chicago Federation of Labor last night as being "snarls, humbugs and industrial pitfalls designed to crush the labor union." The members of the central body were indignant at the recent decision of the Chicago Board of Arbitration, which is composed of seven teamsters and seven employers, in the gas strike hearing. The board's finding was declared to be "unjust and detestable." The delegates refused to accept the board's finding as final and decided to ask all the unions of the city to bar out of the labor war hereafter "all self-constituted arbitration boards." It was agreed that a substitute must be found and the executive board of the Federation was suggested.

Unions in Conflict With Yale.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 18.—Union labor and Yale student interests have come into conflict by the adventure of six undergraduates of Yale who recently took the places of striking truckmen. Complaints from the trades-union have asked President Hadley to call the students from the trucks. Yale's president has declined on the ground that the constitution of the Yale union forbids any student from taking the place of a worker in a sympathetic strike, are heard among the strikers.

Toronto Railway Strike in Sight.

TORONTO, Ontario, May 18.—After three weeks of practically fruitless negotiations matters now appear ripe for another strike on the Toronto street railways. The company has flatly refused a new demands for 23 cents an hour, and a grievance committee, though certain minor points were conceded, the men are determined on the grievance committee or some form of recognition of their union and trouble seems inevitable. The men will present a final ultimatum to the company today and a strike may be precipitated at any time.

Sympathetic Lookout at Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 18.—By their action in voting to strike in sympathy with the colored waiters of the same firm, the bakers in the wholesale plant of H. H. Kohlsaat & Co. have precipitated a look-out. The bakery and the one remaining restaurant were closed today for an indefinite period. More than 700 employees are thrown out of work.

Blacksmiths' Helpers Strike.

CHICAGO, May 18.—Five hundred blacksmiths' helpers struck today to compel their employers to accept a wage scale, after having refused to accept a recommendation of a committee of their number to submit their difficulties to arbitration. Nearly as many blacksmiths are also said to have followed in a sympathetic strike.

Wage Scale Conference.

PITTSBURGH, May 18.—The iron wage scale conference between the Republic Iron & Steel Company and the officers of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel & Tinworkers has been arranged for Detroit, May 25 and 26.

Striking Butchers Return to Work.

CHICAGO, May 18.—The striking butchers' clerks returned to work today, their

demand for the early closing the markets having been granted by all but a few of the shops.

PATTERNMAKERS' STRIKE.

PITTSBURGH, May 18.—The members of the Patternmakers' Association of North America, in this city, struck today for an advance of from \$2.70 to \$3.50 a day and a nine-hour day. Sixteen firms so far have signed the scale.

Mine Advances Wages.

EL PASO, Tex., May 18.—On and after June 1, 1933, all underground men and women at Santa Rita, N. M., will receive an advance of 50 cents per day in wages. The arrangement holds good so long as copper maintains its present price.

Strikers Give In to Government.

MELBOURNE, May 18.—The railroad strikers by ballot decided today by an overwhelming majority to resume work on the government's terms.

SPANISH PARLIAMENT OPEN
