

## IN EFFECT MAY 21

## Date When Acts of Last Legislature Become Laws.

## SOME IMPORTANT MEASURES

## Next Thursday Will Be the Ninetieth Day From Adjournment of the Legislature—Two Days More for Referendum Petitions.

SALEM, Or., May 18.—(Special).—A well-known operator in school lands has advertised that he will locate people on land at \$1.25 per acre until the evening of May 21, which indicates that there is a difference of opinion as to the time when the acts of the last Legislature go into effect. Secretary of State Dunbar holds that the new laws go into effect at midnight between May 20 and May 21, so that the new laws will be in force all day the 21st. Clerk George G. Brown, of the State Land Board, reaches the same conclusion, and when he opens his office on the morning of May 21 he will offer school lands for sale at \$1.25 per acre and no less.

Section 28 of article 4 of the constitution provides that "no act shall take effect until 90 days from the end of the session at which the same shall have been passed," etc. Secretary of State Dunbar was asked today how he computes the time when the new laws go into effect.

The Legislature adjourned on the night of February 20. Eight days remained in February, there were 31 in March and 30 in April, making 69 days up to the end of April. That leaves 21 days to complete the 90 days. On the 20th day, which will be Thursday, the 21st day of May, the new laws go into effect. If the constitution had said that no act shall go into effect until after the expiration of 90 days from the end of the session, I would think the new laws would take effect on May 22."

The Secretary of State is perhaps directly concerned with this question more than any other official, for he has to act under a large number of the laws.

## Lawyers May Make General Denials.

"Among the many laws which go into effect next Thursday morning is that which permits attorneys to make general denials of specific denials in answers and replies. Heretofore the law has required that every obligation in a pleading shall be specifically denied, and a failure to make a sufficient denial amounts to an admission. In compliance with the new law, drawing of denials is tedious work, and is sometimes quite difficult. Under the new law, answering a complaint will be an easy matter, and in Justice's Courts it is not probable that some defendants will undertake to conduct their own cases.

## Employers' Liability Act.

The employer-liability act, otherwise called the employers' liability act, takes effect on May 21, since the act bore no emergency clause. That act applies only to railroad corporations, and makes the companies liable to any employee for an injury resulting from the wrongful act, neglect or default of a fellow-servant. Heretofore it has been the law, as declared by the courts, that employees could not recover from employers for such injuries.

## Executions at State Prison.

All death warrants signed after May 20 must be executed within the walls of the penitentiary. Any warrants issued prior to May 21 will be executed by the sheriff, as prescribed by the old law. All executions must be conducted by the Superintendent or one of the wardens, and only the following persons may be present: One or more physicians, a stenographer, General Sheriff of the county in which judgment was rendered, if reputable citizens, to be selected by the Superintendent, not more than two ministers, who may be designated by the defendant; not more than five relatives, designated by the defendant, and such peace officers as the Superintendent may think expedient.

## Consolidation of School Districts.

Many school districts in this state have been discussing with great interest the question of consolidation. The new law authorizing consolidation and transportation of pupils goes into effect next Thursday morning, and then definite action may be taken.

## Child Labor Law.

The child labor law also takes effect May 21. It prohibits the employment of children under the age of 14 in factories, stores or workshops or as messengers. It prohibits the employment of children under 14 as an employment of children under 14 when the public schools are in session. Children under 16 must not be employed earlier than 8 A. M. or later than 5 P. M., nor more than one hour a day. No child under 16 shall be employed in any school unless he can read and write. It is thought by many that the second provision of this law will very materially interfere with the gathering of fruit and hops, as many children go to the orchards and hopyards during the first two or three weeks of school. School boards will likely be more careful in fixing the time for school to open, so as to give children an opportunity to work at these occupations.

## Fees for Marriage Licenses.

On the day that President Roosevelt visits Oregon a law will go into effect which will be construed as an attempt to encourage race suicide. The fee for marriage licenses will be increased from \$2.50 to \$5.

## Support for Insane Persons.

It will hereafter be the duty of all County Judges, when a person is committed to the asylum, to ascertain whether the parents, children or guardian are able to pay for the maintenance of such person, and, if they are, to make an order to that effect, whereupon it is the duty of such parents, children or guardian to take the insane person to the asylum. Suit may be brought to recover the money if not paid.

## Stealing Rides on Trains.

After May 20 any person who steals a ride on any railroad train will be subject to a fine of \$20 or imprisonment for 30 days, or both. Trainmen are authorized to make arrests, and to call upon bystanders for assistance. This law is not likely to be very vigorously enforced, for a tramp will rather steal a ride than the chance of being arrested than a trainman can be being compelled to attend court as a witness.

## New Road Law.

The new road law, which revises and harmonizes all the provisions of the road laws of the state, and makes numerous changes in procedure, will go into effect next Thursday. The road laws will be published in pamphlet form this Summer and distributed through the County Clerks, to the Road Supervisors.

## Supreme Court Opinions.

Heretofore the attorneys on each side of a case tried in the Supreme Court will be furnished a copy of the opinion of the court deciding the case. The opinions will be sent by mail immediately after the case is decided, and without cost to the litigants.

## BURGLARIES AT EUGENE. Professional Criminals Believed to Be Working the Town.

EUGENE, Or., May 18.—(Special).—The burglars who have been doing the town for several days past are believed by the police to be professionals at the business. They have entered at least half a dozen houses, but have taken nothing which, if found upon them, could be identified as stolen property. In only one instance have they secured much of value, and that was at the house of P. P. Palmer last night. They entered by the pantry window, as is their custom, went through several rooms, finding little, and then went to the bedroom of Mr. Palmer, took from his trousers pocket a key and with them went to his secretary's room, opened it and secured \$30 in cash that had been left there. The police are wholly at sea for a clue, and there is little chance to capture them, as they who will undoubtedly move on to another town as soon as they think it unsafe to remain here, and may have moved already.

## Big Runa Looked For If Weather Conditions Improve.

ASTORIA, Or., May 18.—(Special).—Reports from the mouth of the river this morning are to the effect that the catch of fish is a trifle better, but as the catch during the past week or ten days has been very small, this does not mean much. The time is fast approaching, however, when big runs are to be expected, provided, of course, that the weather and other conditions turn more favorable.

## Skeleton Found in Rattlesnake Den.

BOISE, Idaho, May 18.—While engaged in a pitched battle with a den of rattlesnakes, C. J. Matthews and some fellow workmen discovered the skull of a human skeleton on Black Creek, a few miles from Boise. The men have been engaged in shearing sheep, and while hunting they ran across the rattlers. They killed a number of the snakes, and finally one of the party threw a rock at a snake a short distance off. It struck something which gave forth a peculiar hollow sound. On investigation it was proved to be a human skull, which had been yellowed by age. There were what appeared to be two bullet holes in it. No solution of the mysterious find is known.

## Log-Rolling at La Grande.

LA GRANDE, Or., May 18.—(Special).—The Woodmen of the World log-rolling commenced here today. A team of 30 members is present from Elgin, and 40 more are expected to come in the evening from Union, Pendleton and Portland promised to send teams, but failed to do so. Another committee was selected to secure additional data to present to the Board of United States Engineers regarding the deepening of the channel.

## Location for Encampment.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 18.—(Special).—Major R. E. Evans has returned from a trip over the state with a view to ascertaining the best location for the annual encampment of the federal troops in conjunction with the state militia. He visited Astoria, La Grande, Tacoma, the Indian reservation in Yakima County and the Spokane Valley, near Spokane. He has declined to discuss the matter until he has decided in a few days. The report has been handed into General Funston for action.

## Two Suicides at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 18.—Two suicides have been committed here today. One was that of A. N. Smith, a well-connected Englishman, in receipt of a large retirement. He jumped into Beaver River, just above the falls at Beaver mouth, and was dashed to death on the rocks. The foaming waters below the falls. The motive for his suicide is unknown. The other case was that of a Japanese named Tsuchida, who, at the suggestion of a reunion, smiled at his relatives and then put a bullet in his ear.

## Preparing for Transfer.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 18.—The Express today says: Henry B. Huntington is arranging his affairs preparatory to the transferring his base of operations from Los Angeles to New York for a time. Mr. Huntington has partially completed the transfer of a large acreage of ranch property recently purchased by him to the Los Angeles Land Company, which corporation controls the real estate of the Huntington-Helmuth syndicate. Mr. Huntington will retain personally the old Shosh ranch, on the Monrovia line.

## Missoula Barber Disappears.

MISSOULA, Mont., May 18.—Theodore Michels, the Missoula barber, has disappeared. When last seen he was crossing the bridge over the river with two mysterious strangers. The officials believe Michels has been snatched away and murdered. Coming directly on the heels of the disappearance of County Assessor W. A. Gritz, this disappearance has caused great excitement.

## Fatally Hurt by Falling Tree.

ALBANY, Or., May 18.—(Special).—Ben Holmes, a prominent farmer, residing near Albany, was seriously injured yesterday by a falling tree. While some other men were cutting down a big tree, when the tree unexpectedly fell, pinning Holmes to the ground. He was extricated with some difficulty, and was found to have been badly smashed in the chest and injured internally.

## Holds Reserve Act Is Illegal.

HELENA, Mont., May 18.—Judge Knowles, in the United States Court, today decided that about 100 settlers on the set aside for the Little Bighorn reserve were entitled to perfect their entries. Most of the settlers had been on the land for 30 years. Their entries were refused by the local Land Office. Judge Knowles holds that the act creating the reserve was illegal.

## Fight With Wolves.

MILES CITY, Mont., May 18.—Henry Martin, a farmer here, had an exciting adventure with eight wolves, which he unexpectedly came upon in a den in the bluffs along the river. Martin was badly bitten and his clothes all killed the beasts with a revolver and knife. There were two parent wolves and six cubs.

## SENSATION AT TACOMA

## EX-STATE FISH COMMISSIONER ARRESTED FOR IMMORALITY.

## A. C. Little Also Defendant in Civil Action to Restrain Him From Disposing of Community Property.

TACOMA, Wash., May 18.—(Special).—Citizens of Tacoma were astounded today when they learned that A. C. Little, ex-state fish commissioner, and his wife, Mrs. Little, had been arrested and committed to the County Jail on a charge of adultery, sworn out by Mrs. Little. Before they had recovered from their surprise Mrs. Little obtained from Judge Snell a temporary restraining order enjoining Little and the concerns in which he is interested from disposing of any of the community property.

Mrs. Little alleges her husband is worth \$20,000. They have been married 21 years and have five children. She asks that a decree be made awarding her \$10,000, or that he be not practicable, that she be given \$100 per month for the maintenance of herself and family. A number of business firms with which Mr. Little is connected are co-defendants in the civil action. The defendant is required to show cause May 25, why a temporary injunction should not be issued in this cause as prayed for in the complaint.

Walter M. Harvey is attorney for Mrs. Little. A. R. Titlow has been retained by Mr. Little.

Little and Mrs. Wood were arrested at a room in the Mason block, corner of A and Tenth streets, this morning. Mrs. Wood was formerly the wife of George H. Wood, a grocer doing business at the Junction Store, corner of Seventeenth, C streets and Jefferson avenue. Little, accompanied by the sheriff and Attorney Titlow, appeared before Justice Griffin this morning and was committed to the County Jail for \$2000 for Little, which was promptly given.

Mrs. Little was a lawyer and political manager for the late Governor Rogers, and is one of the shrewdest politicians on the coast. He has large interests at Sumner, Or., and South Bend, Wash. Mrs. Wood is rather a pretty woman and has been divorced several times in the few years ago she caused a sensation by marrying Captain Kenny, a retired sea captain, 55 years old. After living together several months she secured a divorce. Captain Kenny making no defense, and it was reported paid his wife \$2000 at the time.

There is a good deal of criticism of Mrs. Little's lawyer in the civil action, who is also deputy prosecuting attorney, because it is claimed, the criminal suit was brought in order to force a settlement in the civil action, and it is reported the former will not be pressed if a division of the community property is made. Mrs. Little, in her complaint, alleges that her husband has refused to live with her for nearly two years.

## REAMES ASSAULTS THE TRUSTS.

## Salaries of the Democratic Nominee Approved by Salem Audience.

He quoted the late Congressman Tongue as in favor of the removal of protective tariffs from trust-made goods. ## ADMIRAL IS THANKFUL

## COMMANDER OF OREGON RECEIVES HIS SWORD.

## Deeply Affected by the Feeling of the People of This State Toward Him.

SALEM, Or., May 18.—(Special).—Governor Chamberlain today received from Admiral Clark, formerly of the Oregon, the following letter thanking the people of his state for the sword presented to him:

"United States Naval Home, Philadelphia, Pa., May 11, 1903.—Hon. George H. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon—Dear Sir: Your very kind letter, which affected me deeply by its allusions to my services and to the feeling of the people of Oregon towards me, came duly and in due time, and I am glad to receive it.

"I wish I could express to you, to the presentation committee, to the contributors and to the people of Oregon, the gratitude I feel for the beautiful sword that has been presented to me and for the great honor thereby conferred. It is deepened by the thought that in all this, and through me the services of my compatriots, the officers and men of the Oregon have been signally recognized.
