TURN OF THE TIDE IN SPECULATION AT NEW YORK. Downward Course of Prices Belleved to Be Arrested-The Professional

This expectation conduced materially to the recovery by restraining the professional bear element from further attacks on prices. NEW YORK COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, May 19.-The cotton market opened at an advance of 4 to 9 points. May closed at 11.64c: July, 11.24c; August, 10.85c, and September at 8.78c. November scored the biggest advance, closing at 8.22c, against 8.95c last night. Total sales futures estimated at 800,000 bales.

800,000 bales. The enormous gains of yesterday effected no decrease in builtsh excitement and enthusiasm, and the opening of the market today was one of the most notable of an eventful season. The irregularity of Liverpool after our pronounced advance, the prospects for receipts again more than double last year, and the expectations of a bearink weakly bureau report, as opposed to a bearish weekly bureau report, as opposed to the bullish utisrances credited to the New Orleans Leader, all added to the rush and cou-Orleans Leader, all added to the rush and cou-fusion. Stret prices here were 6409 points high-er, and immediately following the call buil sa-gressivences and further covering by shorts sent prices to another new high level for the season, July selling at 11.36c. 




