## RUSSIA IS WITH US

"Open Door" in the Far East  
Will Be Maintained.

## ASSURANCES TO M'CORMICK

American Ambassador Is Given to Understand That the Case Has No Desire to See Manchurian Ports Closed to United States.

LONDON, May 22.—Ambassador Mc Cormick is here for a few days on his way from St. Petersburg to America. He calls on the Russian Minister, Wednesday next, with his wife and Miss Patterson. The St. James' Gazette today prints an interview with him, in which he is quoted as saying:

"One of my last official acts before leaving St. Petersburg was to interrogate the Russian Government on its policy toward Manchuria. I was assured that Russia had no desire to see the Manchurian ports closed to the United States or to have its Consuls excluded. The Russian Government was emphatic in declaring that it was at one with America in the open-door policy in China, and what applies to the United States must apply to every other power. Your Government also received and accepted similar assurances. I know M. Witte is a firm advocate of the open-door policy, and I have every reason to believe that Russia is quite sincere in the matter. She points out that it is to her own interests to support that policy, and I think that is the case. The Russian statesmen are very anxious that the Siberian Railroad shall be a success, and to be so it must get freight in large quantities. Russia cannot of herself supply a sufficient amount to make the railroad the desired success."

"You do not consider the situation in the Far East is in any way serious on account of Russia's policy in Manchuria?"

"I do not," replied Mr. McCormick. "I can see nothing at present which need alarm us or any other country."

Mr. McCormick added that the relations between the United States and Russia at the present moment are of a most friendly character.

"Do you think the United States will view Mr. Chamberlain's policy in regard to protection with disfavor?" was the reporter's next question.

"I do not see why it should," answered Mr. McCormick. "We have set you the example. The suggestion that you give preferential treatment to the colonies is your own affair. Canada may one day be able to give you all the wheat you want, but not for some time. In the United States, too, we are a growing Nation, and we are consuming more of our own products. I believe the United States will not always send its raw material in cotton to England, but will offer you the finished article."

MORE FAVORABLE TO AMERICA.  
Progress Now Being Made in Securing Ports in Manchuria.  
WASHINGTON, May 22.—Treaty nego-

tations between the United States and Chinese commissioners are again moving forward, and the prospect is brightening for a successful issue. Practically only two points of importance remain to be agreed on, but one of these is the provision for the opening of three new ports in Manchuria. This has been the most serious obstacle to the consummation of the treaty. It is believed here that there will be a compromise on this point and the United States will secure one instead of three ports, the choice falling on Tatum Kou, at the mouth of the Yalu River.

## Japan's Fears Not Allayed.

TOKIO, May 22.—Reports from Peking are not calculated to allay the uneasiness in Japan as to Russia's intentions in Manchuria. While the Russian "seven demands" made by Russia on China as conditions for implementation of the second period evacuation clause of the Manchurian convention have been officially withdrawn, it is now stated that some new demands have been substituted. What these are is not stated, but it is rumored that they include the Chinese fulfillment of a concession to Russia to build a railroad from Mukden to the Yalu River, a project which is enabling Russia to concentrate troops as a constant menace to Korea, and a strenuously combated by the Japanese press.

## CHINESE REBELS INVEST CITY.

Anti-Dynastic Outbreak in Yunnan Province Is Serious.

PEKING, May 22.—The government is alarmed at the disquieting news of the anti-dynastic outbreak in Yunnan Province. The prefect has been killed and the city of Lin Nian Fu is invested by the rebels. The French Consul at Yunnan Fu confirms the report that the situation is serious. Telegraphic communication with the French frontier is interrupted.

## Ordered to Suppress Revolt.

PEKING, May 22.—An imperial edict, just issued, commanding that the rebels have captured the prefectural city of Lin-Nian Fu, Province of Yunnan, orders that the Viceroy of Yunnan suppress the insurrection immediately.

## Albanian Losses Confirmed.

LONDON, May 22.—The Times correspondent at Uskub, Turkey, confirms the report that the Albanians had over 200 killed in the recent fighting near Jakova. The Albanians are alarmed to find that the Turks are in earnest. The majority of their leaders have submitted, and it is believed that the Albanian movement has practically collapsed. The two principal ring-leaders, Husein and Muriz, have been arrested near Jakova, and will be exiled to Asia with the other disaffected chiefs.

## Fighting Near Salonica.

SALONICA, May 22.—Fighting is reported to have occurred at Dorjan, 38 miles north of here. Bulgarian aggressing 200 men recently crossed the frontier, and will operate in different regions of Macedonia.

## JEWS IN FEAR OF LIVES

PRESENCE OF MOB KEEPS WOUND-  
ED FROM VENTURING OUT.Kishinev People Give Further De-  
tails of the Awful Massacre by  
the Russians.

SEATTLE, May 22.—Two Seattle people, whose relatives suffered in the recent outrages in Kishinev, are Mrs. M. Goldstein, and her sister, Miss Anna Pearlstone. A letter was received yesterday bringing the news that their relatives were living, although both Mr. and Mrs. Pearlstone were attacked and wounded by the frenzied Russians.

Mrs. Goldstein's father, mother, two brothers and one sister are residents of Kishinev, the father being engaged in the grocery business. The letter in part reads as follows: "The Russian people broke into a sudden fury on the first day of the holiday season (Easter). They first began to break windows, and soon began to assault the Jewish residents. For a distance of two miles they left very little of any Jewish house. They entered my house and threw everything out into the street, and for hours she was between life and death. They knocked me down with a club, but did not molest the children. Then they went away, and the children took care of their mother."

The next day, while we lay hidden for a period of four hours, we could hear the shouts and shrieks of the injured people. The populace entered every house and store, and threw everything out into the streets and tore up the goods in the dry goods stores and literally wrecked every Jewish place of business in the city. The Jews did not offer any resistance, and were slaughtered right and left. All the synagogues and places of worship were destroyed. Fifty-seven I know of were killed outright in the streets, and their bodies left lying about. There are several hundred in the hospitals, and these are dying all the time. Many young girls were assaulted and killed. There has never been a massacre like this for thousands of years.

"The survivors are in a bad way for the actual necessities of life. We have not been able to call a doctor to attend your mother or myself for fear of a mob."

## Jews Flocking to London.

## Russian Poles Form a Good Addition to the Population.

LONDON, May 22.—In view of the Jew-

## leth troubles in Eastern Europe considerable interest is shown in the Royal Commission on alien immigration, which was appointed a year ago and whose sittings concluded yesterday. The evidence taken has shown that there is an enormous growth of the Jewish population in the East End of London, mainly through the influx of Russian Poles, and this influx has resulted in serious overcrowding of the population and unsanitary conditions. On the whole, however, the immigrants are industrious and respectable and with a tendency to improve their social conditions. The greatest complaint against them is that they work cheaply and reduce the standard of wages in certain trades.

The evidence taken also showed that the Jewish Board of Guardians is compelled in self-defense to repatriate thousands of Jews yearly who arrive in absolutely destitute condition. Leonard Cohen, the chairman of the Jewish Board, advocated the passing of legislation to exclude these destitute immigrants. It is expected, however, that the commission will only report in favor of the exclusion of criminals and the mentally defective and diseased aliens.

## Photographs Contradict Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 22.—Photographs from Kishinev which have been received here, besides fully sustaining the reports that the worst atrocities were committed during the outbreak against the Jews there, contradict the official account of the massacre and the stories printed in the Nationalist press. The people of Kishinev declare that no Christian received a gunshot wound, and that there are no Christians in the hospitals.

## Cranks After Hay and Cassini.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Cranks letters are appearing in the mail of the Russian Ambassador, Count Cassini. They criticize his utterances and attack his arguments concerning the character of the Russian Jews. Secretary Hay is also getting his share of such communications. These letters, however, give no serious concern to either the Secretary or the Ambassador.

## Coolie Labor Asked For.

JOHANNESBURG, May 22.—The Chamber of Mines today adopted a resolution urging the Government to import indentured coolie labor for the construction of the proposed new railways. Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, the president of the chamber, in supporting the resolution urged that this course was preferable to bringing into the country unskilled white labor.
