DEAD NUMBER SIX

Paris-Madrid Auto Race Has 13 Other Victims.

THREE DANGEROUSLY INJURED

Spain Orders a Discontinuance of the Contest—Vanderbilt Did Not Withdraw on Account of the Dangers of the Trip.

PARIS, May 25.—It is now possible to assemble from the many reports along the route of the first stage of the Paris-Madrid automobile race a complete list of casualties. This shows six persons killed, three as dangerously injured that they may die, and ten seriously injured. During the day it was ascertained that 17 persons had been killed and it was injured, but this was unwarranted. A carefully revised list of the casualties follows:

Dead: Pierre Roderic, Mr. Barrow's machinist; collision with a tree near Libourne. Nixson, Mr. Porter's machinist, burned under automobile. Norman, M. Tourand's machinist at Angoulême. Dupuy, soldier, at Angoulême. Caillon, cyclist, at Angoulême. Injured: Mr. Barrow, pelvis and thigh broken; amputation of foot necessary; Marcel Renault, injured about body and head; M. Porter, cut and bruised; Mr. Stead, overturned, badly contused; Mr. Stead's machinist, head cut; Lesau, champion cyclist, broken kneecap; George S. Richards, chest crushed, ribs broken; Henri Jeannot, Richards' machinist, shoulder fractured; E. Chard, head cut open; Tourand, severely bruised; Gaston Raffet, a boy, fractured skull, leg and arm broken; Marcel, Renault's machinist, severely bruised; Mme. Chaymas, both legs cut off.

Miraculous Escapes. Some miraculous escapes have been reported. M. Lerry's machine was burned at Cognieres, but he and his machinist were uninjured. M. Rodolphe Darzens and his machinist were thrown out near Bordeaux, and were practically unhurt, though the car was destroyed. Louis Renault telegraphed as follows to-night: "Marcel is better. Bringing him to Paris tonight. Deny report of his death officially."

Bordeaux reports that many of the competitors desired to abandon the race, but others insisted that their honor required them to resume it at the Spanish frontier if possible, but the Spanish government later forbade the race, and thus compelled its abandonment. The manufacturers have agreed that as a road race it is impossible the meeting will be resumed within a closed course.

Accidents End Speed Races. The correspondent of the Associated Press interviewed a number of the leading American and French automobilists and they all expressed horror at the series of accidents, and added that in their opinion it would end speed races in France and at other points on the Continent.

maintaining in the contest. He has only a touting car, but, nevertheless, made a fine race.

The speed limitations which have now been fixed by the French and Spanish governments will put an end to any chance of fast time being made between Bordeaux and Madrid, and the remainder of the race will be a run under tourist conditions. The stretches of road beyond Bordeaux are more difficult than the route covered yesterday from Versailles, owing to the many hills and sharp turnings. Clarence Moore, of Washington, has just returned from an inspection of the track, for which unusual privileges were granted him by the judges of yesterday's race. He gives a graphic description of the terrific speed of the racers. He timed Louis Renault's car as it passed him, and found it was making 115 miles an hour. "The automobile of M. Gabriel yesterday's winner, he says, gave forth a roar as it leaped the steep incline near Chartres like a huge rabbit bounding up a hill. He saw Jarrot approaching at lightning speed. A huge, black mass flung right in the path. Jarrot realized that to try to avoid the dog would throw his car against a tree, and he steered right ahead. He struck the dog squarely, and it was pinned in front of the automobile for a moment, then dropped to the ground between the wheels. Every bone in its body was broken."

SAYS AMERICA WRONG JEWS.

Baptist Minister Holds Its Skirts Are Not Clean of Anti-Semitism. BALTIMORE, Md., May 25.—Dr. Madison C. Peters, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle here, in his sermon last night denounced the persecution of the Jews in Russia, and then startled his audience by declaring that in a measure the people of the United States are guilty of the same crimes for which Russia and the Russians are censured. He said in part: "In America the Jew has a double claim to recognition—the claim of the man under the wide tolerance of the 20th century, and the claim of the American citizen under the broad spirit of the American Republic. Has he received the treatment he merits as a man, and the rights he deserves as a citizen? He is caricatured in the comic papers and on our stage. In our social, professional and even political clubs he is blackballed. 'I have seen Jewish children go home from our public schools in tears because of the offensive names with which they are taunted. Outrages are frequently perpetrated upon the Jews in our cities under the eyes of the police—outrages which are a disgrace to our republic. "Russian and Roumanian emigrants, who are striving with might and main to earn a livelihood, meet with a reception from the denizens of the street not at all creditable to American citizenship. "Our own skirts are far from clean of anti-Semitism."

Chinail is Again Denounced. PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—Resolutions have been adopted by the Jewish Publication Society of America deploring the Kishinev massacre, requesting President Roosevelt to use his good office in preventing a recurrence of similar events, and asking Congress and the Administration to take "such steps as will accord equal rights to all American citizens, without distinction of creed, in all treaties hereafter entered into with foreign powers, and the denunciation of all existing treaties in conflict with this principle."

The resolutions conclude as follows: "That we denounce the heartless attempt made by the Russian Ambassador to spread among the American people, by means of the public press, misleading and calumnious statements as to the character of the Jews of Russia and other countries."

JAPAN STILL EXPECTS WAR.

Preparations for a Brush With Russia Are Still Going On. VICTORIA, B. C., May 25.—The steamer Empress brought news from the Orient last night of continued war preparations. Japan correspondents at Peking tell of

large guns arriving over the trans-Berberian Railway for Niu Chwang. The war feeling in Japan continues, and war preparations are still going on.

Heart-rending details of suffering and death as a result of the famine in Kwang Si were given in Hong Kong papers received by the Indravell. Mr. Hess, a missionary at Wu Chow, who has been investigating on behalf of the Hong Kong charities, says that owing to three successive failures of crops, people are starving and dying. During March and April, it is computed that 20,000 people were sold, men selling themselves for employment in the Straits Settlements, and women and children being sold into slavery and for brothels on the coast. Story after story of distress was told by the missionary. He told of famished people dying in the act of eating when relief was brought them; of babies reduced to skeletons being abandoned in numbers by the roadside, and of mothers selling daughters into lives of shame for a mere bowl of rice. It was shown by one missionary's report that thousands would perish unless speedy relief was given.

Hong Kong papers tell of the prayer of fishing junk by armed Chinese just outside Hong Kong harbor. The junk was overpowered and the vessel looted. Manila papers publish details of the wreck of the Norwegian bark Prince George, which was on the overdue list some time ago. She went ashore on the south coast of Basilan on April 8. Her crew of three were picked up by the United States Coast Guard cutter Tablan and landed at Zamboanga.

KAISER REPLIES TO CRITICS.

Sarcastic Statement in Connection With Charles V. Monument. BERLIN, May 25.—The newspapers have been printing items to the effect that a statue of Emperor Charles V was to be placed in the new cathedral of Berlin, and a number of Protestants have expressed themselves as being pained and surprised. Emperor William wrote on the margin of a clipping of this kind: "Be sides him, Diocletian, Nero, Turquemada and Alva will be placed in the Pantheon. Lucifer himself has been proposed, only we do not know whether to place him in the pulpit or in the Emperor's box."

ENGLAND CAN'T STOP CHINESE.

Against Their Importation Into South Africa, but is Powerless. LONDON, May 25.—Replying to a question on Chinese labor in South Africa, in the House of Commons today, Colonial Secretary Chamberlain said the government had not sanctioned and was not supporting the movement of the mine-owners to import Chinese and other Asiatic laborers in the Transvaal. In this particular the speaker said he thought every source of supply in South Africa ought to be exhausted before Chinese or other Asiatics were introduced. If, however, the Transvaal and other self-governing colonies concluded that they required to import Asiatic labor, the imperial government had no power to prevent it.

CLUBMEN FIGHT DUEL.

Quarrel Over Cards Causes Shooting, Which Is in No Way Fatal. PARIS, May 25.—A duel with pistols was fought this morning at Villenave, near Paris, between Prince Radziwill, an attaché of the Russian Embassy in London, and Count Edward Sizzo, of Paris, an Australian nobleman and well-known London clubman. The duel was the outcome of a quarrel over cards, and Count Sizzo was the challenger. Shots were three times exchanged at 15 paces, but neither of the duellists was injured. The principals were reconciled on the ground.

Seagulls Open Favorably.

LONDON, May 25.—The Sofia correspondent of the Times says that negotiations between Bulgaria and Turkey have

opened favorably in that city. It is evident, he adds, that there is a slackening in the struggle in Macedonia, but fighting is reported from the districts of Kilevo and Nevrokop, while several villages are blockaded. Macedonian circles in Sofia are disposed to await the result of the recent pacific overtures.

POWERS ARE HARD ON CHINA.

Only America and Britain Would Lighten Boxer-Payment Load.

BEIJING, May 25.—Apparently the United States and Great Britain are alone willing to make the payment of the debt easier to China, the other governments consulted having disapproved of the indemnity scheme proposed by Great Britain.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT FROM RACES.

Woman's Horse Took Fright and She Was Dangerously Hurt.

PARIS, May 25 (midnight).—A late dispatch from Bordeaux adds another terrible accident to the long list of casualties. Mme. Chaymas, accompanied by her husband, both riding bicycles, were watching the passage of the automobiles at St. Andre de Cubzac, 12 miles from Bordeaux, when a horse, frightened by the noise, bolted and overturned the woman, who fell under a racing automobile. Her legs were cut off. The hope of saving her life is slight.

Powers Asked to Step In.

VIENNA, May 25.—It is reported that the Bulgarian Government has presented a note to Russia, Austria and France, announcing its intention of asking for their support towards the conclusion of an agreement with Turkey regarding Macedonia.

Spain Terms the Dyak Martyrs.

MADRID, May 25.—The news of the accidents to the contestants in the Paris-Madrid automobile race made a deep impression here. The Royal Automobile Club is exhibiting bulletins which the public is anxiously watching. The competitors in the tour in the second section of the race, who are arriving here, are received with great sympathy, and there was a great demand for tickets to the race. The action of the French government in stopping the speed contest is generally approved here. The impartial blames the Spanish government for not taking steps to obtain official bulletins of the accidents, and describes the men killed as "martyrs in the cause of commercial enterprise."

Riotous Austrians Stone Palace.

LAIBACH, Austria, May 25.—A turbulent mob rioted in the streets last night, yelling "Down with the Ban," and cheering for Croatia. A crowd in front of the German Club sang the Slav anthem and hooted the Ban. Several shots were fired. The rioters also stoned Prince von Auersperg's palace. Troops and gendarmes finally routed the rioters.

Must Answer for Favoring Russia.

SEOUL, May 25.—A dispatch from Seoul says the government of Korea has ordered the officials at Wiju to arrest the Koreans who were concerned in the sale of land and buildings to Russians or Chinese.

Wind and Rain Do \$75,000 Damage.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 25.—Twenty buildings were damaged here tonight by a heavy windstorm accompanied by a rain, which amounted practically to a cloudburst. The loss is probably \$75,000.

IN HONOR OF EMERSON

NEW YORK DINNER IN COMMEMORATION OF HIS BIRTH.

Colonel Henry Watterson Delivers the Principal Address and Edwin Markham Reads a Poem.

NEW YORK, May 25.—A dinner in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Ralph Waldo Emerson was given by the Society of American Authors at the Waldorf-Astoria tonight. A collection of books, portraits, manuscripts and other relics, including rare editions of Emerson's books, was on exhibition. Among those at the guests' table were Edwin Markham, Henry Watterson, Chancellor Mackracken, of the University of New York; President Schurman, of Cornell; and Dr. William T. Harris, United States Commissioner of Education. A poem of commemoration was read by Edwin Markham. Colonel Watterson made the principal address, taking as his subject, "The Ideal in Public Life."

CHICAGO MINISTERS PRAISE HIM.

A Truly Good Man, and a Great Writer and Speaker. CHICAGO, May 25.—The 100th anniversary of the birth of Ralph Waldo Emerson was made the occasion of many sermons by Chicago pastors on the philosopher. At All Saints' Church last night Emerson was the subject of five addresses. Jenkin Lloyd Jones presiding, Emerson was the theme at other churches during the day.

"When he wrote, drops of light fell from his pen. When he spoke, vast horizons began to glow as at daybreak," said Dr. Camden M. Coburn, in St. James' Methodist Church. "Just to see him for one hour was to get sudden knowledge of what he was and of what you might be."

HERBERT IS HONOURED.

Notable Men Attend Dinner for the British Ambassador. NEW YORK, May 25.—A distinguished company attended the dinner tonight by the Pilgrims of the United States, at Delmonico's, in honor of the British Ambassador, Sir Michael Herbert. Among the speakers were: Bishop Potter, Ambassador Herbert, Secretary Root, Wayne Mac-Vaugh and General Joseph Wheeler.

CONCORD HONORS HIS MEMORY.

Many Prominent Men Take Part in the Exercises. CONCORD, Mass., May 25.—Concord today gave itself up to a general celebration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Ralph Waldo Emerson. A large number of visitors came to mingle their homage with those residing here. The forenoon exercises were planned exclusively for

the school children. The principal speaker of the morning was LeBaron Russell Briggs, of Harvard. In the afternoon, President Charles Eliot, of Harvard; Colonel Thomas Wentworth Higginson, Professor William James, of Harvard, and Senator Hoar were among the speakers.

TO WAVE ABOVE OTHERS

Columbia Students Will Plant Their Flag on Mount McKinley.

NEW YORK, May 25.—To plant the flag of the 18th class of Columbia at the top of the highest mountain of North America, Ralph Shainwald, Jr., a junior, will go with the Cooke expedition into Alaska. Primarily the object of the expedition is to surmount Mount McKinley, which is 400 miles inland on the southern border of Alaska, and is 20,446 feet high, although the perilous feat has been attempted many times, a human being has never yet succeeded in reaching its highest elevation. Two young men, both students of Columbia, will be the only companions of Dr. Cooke in this expedition. They are young Shainwald, who, though scarcely out of his teens, is a skillful botanist and biologist, and Robert Dunn, a Harvard graduate, who has just completed a course in geology.

BOWEN AGAIN AT CARACAS

American Minister Is Given an Enthusiastic Welcome.

CARACAS, May 25.—United States Minister Bowen arrived at La Guayra today on the Red D. Line steamer Philadelphia. He was received enthusiastically by the populace and the local authorities. At Caracas, he was met at the station by President Castro, the members of the cabinet and all the foreign residents.

CABINET RESIGNS IN BODY.

Haytian Ministers Opposed to Prohibiting Foreign Fruit. PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, May 25.—The entire Haytian Ministry, with the exception of the Minister of War, has resigned. The ministry is opposed to con-

tinuing the investigation into the alleged frauds in the issuing of Haytian government securities amounting to \$2,000,000.

PERU ELECTS MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.
