

IT BACKS DOWN

Bremerton Will Do as Navy Desires.

SALOONS WILL BE CLOSED

Councilmen Agree to Be Good From Now On.

MESSAGE IS SENT TO MOODY

If the Government Requests, Licenses Will Not Be Issued to Run Shops in Any Part of the Town.

The town of Bremerton will go to any extreme to prevent the closing of the saloons, and has so wired Secretary Moody. The Mayor and Councilmen pledge themselves to close all saloons and brothels near the navy-yard, and will even refuse to license run shops in any part of the city, if the Navy Department so requests.

SEATTLE, May 28.—After a conference this afternoon between the special committee from the Chamber of Commerce of Seattle, the Mayor and Councilmen of Bremerton, and Commander Blocker, of the Navy-Yard, the following telegram was sent to Secretary Moody, of the Navy Department:

"Secretary of the Navy, Washington, D. C. We, the Mayor and all of the members of the City Council of Bremerton, do hereby agree that no license shall be issued for any saloon on streets leading from the town wharf in Bremerton to the east gate of the Navy-Yard, and that if the Navy Department requests it, no license shall be issued for any saloon in the town of Bremerton during our term of office."

Mayor Croxson has employed a special attorney to prosecute the cases of saloons who are selling liquor illegally, and declares that there will be no more temporizing with that element. Attention will first be devoted to closing up the saloon of John Pulis, who was yesterday found guilty of running without a license, pending the decision of his case by a higher court. Unless the saloon can be closed by legal means within a few days, there are threats that other means will be employed.

PUSHING TOWARD SALT LAKE.

Gould Money Said to Be Behind Western Pacific.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—The Western Pacific Railroad is preparing to cover the distance between San Francisco and Salt Lake as rapidly as possible. Attorney Eugene T. Gault today stated that the City Council of Stockton had just granted a franchise which will open the north channel to the new road, the first railroad to enter the north side of Stockton.

Work was commenced at the western terminus in Oakland several days ago, and construction will be pushed from Salt Lake to meet that from the western terminus.

Mr. Barnett said that the syndicate which is now trying to block the Western Pacific between Oregon and Nevada would not interfere in any way with the project of the new enterprise, on which work is being actively pushed. While this activity prevails in Western Pacific construction, the rumors again state credence that the millions of George Gould are back of the project.

The Bulletin says that during the recent visit to this city of Vice-President Bird, of the Gould system, he called on General Manager Kruttschnitt, of the Southern Pacific, to discuss the situation. Gould demanded of Hartman a fair division of tonnage and a larger share for the Denver & Rio Grande. It is stated that he will build and operate a transcontinental road of his own, which will compete with the Southern Pacific for California traffic.

BRAVE STORM FOR THREE DAYS.

Forest Reserve Supervisor Nearly Lost His Life.

KALISPELL, Mont., May 28.—F. H. Haines, supervisor of the Flathead forest reserve, had a thrilling experience while going over the divide. He started from Browning to go to St. Mary's Lake. When he was about one day on his journey he encountered a severe snow storm, which was accompanied by a heavy wind. He was in the storm for three days, and several times lost his way and had to resort to his compass.

After floundering in snow for three days he finally reached the lake. Following the lake shore, he soon reached shelter and a warm fire. He had camped two days, and started for St. Mary's Lake.

Again encountering a snow storm, which lasted several hours, he reached Kalispell late Monday night, and is now nearly snowed out. The doctors think he will recover.

BEEF WILL BE POOR.

Range Stock Ill Fed in Northern Grant County.

PILOT ROCK, May 28.—(Special.)—H. H. Arbogast, a prominent stockman of Pilot Rock, near the Grant County line, arrived in this place yesterday with a head of beef cattle, which will be driven to Pendleton and then shipped to the Portland market. His stock is in good condition, and will average 300 pounds each.

In speaking of the outlook for Northern Grant County, Mr. Arbogast said that it was his opinion there would not be 100

head of beef cattle in that county ready for the market this season, owing to the bad condition of the range. There is little grass on the range, and the prospect is poor for the stockman. The past winter was severe on stock, and many farmers suffered heavy losses.

Mr. Arbogast was offered 45 cents by the Union stockyards, but he will insist upon 5 cents for the cattle he is now driving to market.

GOLD DUST IN ABUNDANCE.

Dawson Banks Make Record-Breaking Purchases.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 28.—A special from Dawson today says: Never before in the history of banking in Dawson have there been such heavy purchases of gold dust as yesterday, which was the banner day for gold receipts in the history of the Yukon. The amounts purchased by the two banks here, to say nothing of the hundreds of thousands left on deposit, aggregated in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

Today the purchases were not quite so heavy as were those of yesterday, although for the two days they will aggregate from \$800,000 to \$900,000. This amount, in connection with the large amounts deposited with the banks for safe keeping, will aggregate upwards of \$1,500,000 worth of gold dust brought into Dawson from the various creeks in the short space of two days. Compared with this time last year, the receipts of gold at the local banks up to date this season are greatly

PLEADS HIS OWN CAUSE

HERMANN ADDRESSES APPLAUDING GRANT'S PASS CROWD.

It Was He Who for so Long Prevented the Forest Reservation in Southern Oregon.

GRANT'S PASS, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—By far the largest and most enthusiastic audience during the present campaign greeted Congressman J. N. Williamson and Binger Hermann at the opera-house tonight. Mr. Williamson in his brief address urged the necessity of upholding the Administration by sending to Congress a man of tried ability.

Mr. Hermann made the principal address of the evening. He confined himself largely to exemplifying the conditions which now exist under the Republican party and those which existed eight years ago. He also mentioned a subject which is of great and vital interest to the people of Southern Oregon, and to which much objection is being made, the proposed forest reservation, explaining that he antagonized such reserve and protested as Commissioner to the department against it. Quoting from the official record containing his adverse report made

port of Mr. Hermann for Congressman. After eulogizing the late Mr. Tongue, he spoke of present needs of Oregon from a political standpoint and demonstrated why Oregonians should support Binger Hermann and Republican policies at the polls next Monday. He ridiculed the Democrats for their alleged consideration of the feelings of a Republican Executive, but strongly intimated that they need not worry on that score, since President Roosevelt has come out strongly for the election of Hermann. The Democratic party been shown up as the party of exploded theories.

PORTAGE BOARD ORGANIZES.

Civil Engineer Hammond Invited to Conference.

SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The Board of Commissioners for the construction of a Portage railway from The Dalles to Celilo, held its first meeting this morning and organized by electing Governor George E. Chamberlain chairman, Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar, secretary, State Treasurer C. S. Moore, treasurer, and W. M. Galters clerk. The board instructed the clerk to write to A. E. Hammond, a civil engineer of Portland, to meet the members of the board at the Capitol on June 4 to confer with them regarding the work of constructing the Portage railway.

The board has not formulated any plan of procedure and will not do so until after consulting with the engineer. It is the desire to go ahead with the work as early as possible, and this probably means that preliminary surveys will be made at once, and then the problem of securing a right of way will come up for solution.

TAX WELL PAID UP.

Clatsop County Has Comparatively Little to Collect.

ASTORIA, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The collections on the 1902 tax roll up to today amount to \$115,000.37 out of a total of \$134,412.57, leaving a balance of \$19,412.20. Of this latter sum \$1,500.00 is in the second half of taxes on which the first half has been paid, and under the present law the property-owners are allowed until the first Monday in October to pay the balance before any additional penalty is incurred. This leaves \$18,912.20 which can be classed as delinquent, and on which a penalty of 1 per cent and interest at the rate of 1 per cent a month is charged. Fully half of this is owing by a few large property-owners, who are certain to redeem their holdings before the sale.

CHARGE AGAINST PREMIER PRYOR

Malfeasance Alleged While Acting as Land Commissioner.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 28.—The crisis continues in the Columbia legislation, and as the opposition defeated the Premier's motion to vote supply bills today the province may have to run without funds for some months. The motion was defeated by a vote of 15 to 12.

Another investigation is to follow the one just closed. Smith Curtis, for Roseland, moved that a committee investigate charges preferred by a Vancouver newspaper editor, that the Premier is in the habit of his firm secured a contract for a \$500 cable for Chimney Creek bridge by putting in a low tender after he had access to other bids, while the Premier was acting as chief Commissioner of Lands and Works.

GREAT INTEREST IN GEOLOGY.

Dr. Condon, of Eugene, to Be Given an Assistant.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 28.—(Special.)—The growth of the geological department is so great that Dr. Condon is no longer able to hear the various classes, and arrangements have been made whereby an assistant instructor will be appointed for the purpose of taking charge of the metallurgical department. Dr. Condon, with the unanimous desire of his students, will still remain as the head of the geological department.

The board has not yet taken action on a number of applications that have been made for the position.

DO NOT WANT HIM BACK.

BURIED THEIR OWN DEAD

PARENTS IN NORTH YAKIMA, ACT AS UNDERTAKERS.

Magnetic Healers' Certificates Are Not Recognized by City Health Officer.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., May 28.—(Special.)—The county and city authorities are after parties here who have been violating the burial law. A number of deaths have occurred in which the magnetic healers were called in attendance at the bedside. In some of the cases the healers issued a death certificate, but the health officers have refused to honor them and to issue a permit.

On Sunday the little daughter of Peter Neveu died. It had been attended by a healer, but when the father applied for a burial permit the health officer refused to issue it. The father then buried the child himself in the Catholic cemetery.

The owners of the cemetery will be prosecuted for permitting the burial without a permit. On Tuesday another death occurred, in which the same healer had been called. In this instance he issued a death certificate, and the father, after his name, moved southward, and the health officer refused to issue a permit, but the Coroner came to his rescue for decency's sake. The matter has been laid before the County Attorney, who is expected to prosecute those violating the law.

Eight deaths occurred here during the month of April in which healers had been called, but no death certificates were issued, the parents invariably acting as undertakers.

NOW THEY WILL LOOK AT IT.

Buyers of School Land Will See What They Purchased.

SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—As anticipated, the raise in the price of state school land has put an end to the demand for that class of property. A week ago today the price was doubled, and has been raised three times since, having been raised 250 per cent. For 30 days prior to the raise the lands sold at the rate of 3000 acres a day.

Probably the only sales that will be made hereafter will be to persons who want the land for homes, or, in a few cases, to persons who find an unusually good tract of land. The sales during the rush were largely to persons who wished to buy at the low price and hold for future advances in value. Undoubtedly many of those who bought will eventually make their homes upon the land, though few purchased with that intention.

Since the rush is over scores of the purchasers are going out to look at their land in order to learn whether it is worth the price they paid.

FELL A THOUSAND FEET.

Bette Miners Knocked From Cage in Shaft.
