First Baptist Dissenters Turn Backs on Pastor.

REFUSE TO HEAR COVENANT

Rev. Alexander Blackburn Exhorts His Hearers to Renew Pledge of Faith, Which is Followed by an Exodus.

"I don't know why they should go. I am sure I mean that in good faith," the Rev. Alexander Blackburn commented as 20 or more of his congregation silently slipped away from the Thursday evening prayer meeting.

An elderly gentleman seated in the second row of chairs reached behind him, blindly groped about and finally picking up his hat and coat started down the center aisle. A woman, evidently his wife, followed in his rear. From the side aisle a gentleman and two or three women started toward the door. The pastor of the First Baptist Church of Portland gazed after them sorrowfully and then turned away. The exodus ceased and the pastor took up the service again.

The Rev. Mr. Blackburn had spoken to his congregation from the heart, as he put it, of the trouble into which the church had been plunged. He had pleaded earnestly and long for unity and strength; he had urged his people to stand by him in the church crisis which had been precipitated, and then as a climax he had volunteered to read anew the church covenant. He wanted all those who would join in the reading and the re-pledging of support to arise and remain standing while the reading proceeded.

That is what caused all the trouble. Earlier in the evening W. M. Wilder, organist for the church, had resigned. That was anticipated, for Mr. Wilder had antagonized the pastor and his friends and since the latter had won out the organist had to go. The congregation recognized the fact and when Professor Wilder's resignation was read it was accepted unanimously as a matter of fact. But when the reading of the covenant was suggested trouble arose.

The pastor had intimated to his congregation that he had a word to say to the members of the church. "I want to speak from the heart," the Rev. Mr. Blackburn said, "and I want to tell you that the church has been plunged into a crisis, and I want you to stand by me in this crisis. I want you to renew your pledge of support to me and to the church."

"I have received letters from pastors and friends wet with tears," the Rev. Mr. Blackburn stated, "expressing sympathy for us and urging us to go on." Then the pastor urged his congregation that in the event any one should refuse to stand by him he should be sent to the person of whom he was speaking to complete the yarn.

"Tell it to the members," is the way it would be expressed in the vernacular, but the Rev. Mr. Blackburn put it in a different way.

"People may come to you speaking of me. I wish you would send them to me. I may be disappointed; you may be surprised, but you will find that it is a better way of restoring church harmony and peace in Zion than in refusing to listen to tale-bearers."

The pastor continued at length to urge his congregation not to listen to discordant notes; to close their ears to anything that smacked of trouble and to work for the upbuilding of the church. Then he proceeded to read the covenant of the church. He proposed to read it while the congregation remained standing and waved his hands for the people to rise.

Here and there some remained seated, but the majority of those present rose to their feet. Over near the door an exodus was started and this seemed to grow as the people near those leaving realized that this was happening. Very few of those in the center of the auditorium attempted to leave the building; some remained seated, but most arose.

A deacon of the church, seated in the center of the room, arose and asked: "Just a moment. I want to ask you a question. If you please. Does this mean that you are to remain our pastor indefinitely?"

"Certainly," responded the Rev. Mr. Blackburn. "You voted two weeks ago that I should and I so understand it."

The deacon collapsed into his seat and two or three others followed his example, sitting throughout the remainder of the service with downcast eyes and a head held in the hand.

Just before he began reading the covenant, the pastor glanced sorrowfully toward the door where members of his flock were passing and made the exclamation quoted above. Then he read through the pledge the Baptists all take.

The following is a condensed rendering of the prayer meeting of the First Baptist Church of Portland. The meeting was fairly well attended, despite the trouble that had created a schism in the church. Merly in which Mr. Cameron is held by the Rev. Mr. Cameron, who was present to play for the congregation since the vote of confidence in the Rev. Mr. Blackburn was read and accepted. The following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That in view of the 11 years of faithful, conscientious and efficient services rendered to this church by our pastor, Mr. Alexander Blackburn, and in recognition of his many Christian character and devotion, both as an organist and as a church member, we, the members of the First Baptist Church, express in this manner our high esteem for him as an organist and a man and deeply regret his decision to discontinue his services."

FAVOR A SECOND FERRY

Citizens of Albina Discuss Transportation Problems at Mass Meeting.
